

Appeals Court Advances Town's Water Rate Suit

The Mt. Vernon City Council got its first good news to date on its water rate suit when the Court of Appeals this week advanced the suit on the court calendar.

The council also had one other bit of good news from the high tribunal. The court told the city it could continue to charge its increased water rate pending a final decision by the court on the water rate case.

In October 1962, the council raised the base water rate from \$2 for 2,000 gallons to \$3.30 to improve water service and build half-million dollar sewer system.

Several water customers sued the city, asking Rockcastle Circuit Court to roll back the water rate.

In court action, Judge R. C. Tartar ruled the water rates were "exorbitant and out of line" and told the council to roll back the rates to the pre-October level.

The city then appealed the case to the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

Advancing the water rate suit on the court calendar was probably the most important of the decisions. An early decision by the court could possibly allow the council to proceed with its sewer system construction. Bids on the system have been awarded, but the council would have to re-bid the project if it had to wait the usual 12 to 18 months for a decision.

A re-bid would probably increase the cost of the sewer system.

Continuing to collect the increased rate also was good news in that the council will not lose the increased revenue should the council overturn Judge Tartar's ruling in the Circuit Court hearing, city attorneys asked.

ATTEMPT FUTILE ATTORNEY SAYS

Attorneys for the State Health Department advised the Rockcastle County Health Department this week the department's efforts probably would prove futile if it tried to force its health tax on the November ballot.

According to Dr. M. A. Shepherd, county health officer, the possible court action that could follow if the department asked for a Writ of Mandamus from Rockcastle Circuit Court might take several months before a final decision could be reached.

"A Writ or Mandamus is a direct order from circuit court.

"The time limit required to get a resolution on the ballot will pass if considerable litigation were necessary," Dr. Shepherd said. "Resolutions must be approved for the ballot 45 days prior to election."

The health officer stressed the Rockcastle Board of Health has not had a major heart and still hopes the Rockcastle Circuit Court will reverse its stand and allow the measure on the ballot.

However, he believed the board recognizes its legal effort would probably prove futile if it attempted to force the issue. On that basis, he does not believe the matter will be pursued further at this time.

"But this would be left strictly to the board," he declared. "The board will meet next Wednesday for a final decision."

The fiscal court voted at its July meeting 3 to 3 on a resolution to put the tax measure on the ballot. A tie vote constituted a "no" majority and the resolution died.

The proposed health tax measure called for 10 cents on the \$100 property tax in Rockcastle County Health Department to set up a taxing district. The money realized from the tax would go to maintain present services and expand its services.

The Health Department currently receives about \$2,000 from local sources and \$18,757 from the state. With the added tax, the county would supply about \$4,300 and the state about \$36,200.

At the time of the vote by fiscal court, County Judge C. C. Cackel told the court he did not believe the tax measure was Constitutional, and on that ground was voting not to include the tax on the ballot. His vote tied the vote at 3-3.

What effect, if any, the tie vote on the health department will have on the thinking of the Board of Directors of the Bookmobile and library on a similar tax measure remains to be seen.

Work Progresses On Railroad Project

A 1,800,000 rail clearance already been raised.

The railroad spokesman said a minimum clearance of 19 feet, seven inches in height is required by today's big freight cars. To permit this, the two tunnels on double track near Livingston, in Rockcastle County known as Roundstone No. 4 are being eliminated. They have been "daylighted." By far the biggest earth moving job on the entire project, this tunnel work is being done by Codell Construction Company.

Track is being lowered in tunnels near DeCoursey, Kentucky; Berry, Harrison County; Riverside, Clark County; and Hazel Patch and Kufa near East Bernstadt in Laurel County. The remainder of the tunnel work is north of Knoxville in Caldwell and Anderson counties Tennessee.

When the job is complete, a total of 13,460 feet of track will have been lowered, some as much as 30 inches, and nearly 3,200 feet of tunnel will have been daylighted. All big freight cars will be without serious interruption to regular train traffic.

Although not a direct part of this clearance program, some track changes are being made. (Continued on page 4)

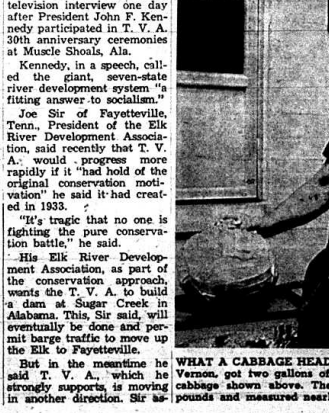
"It's tragic that no one is fighting the pure conservation battle," he said.

But in the meantime he said T. V. A., which he strongly supports, is moving in another direction. Sir said:

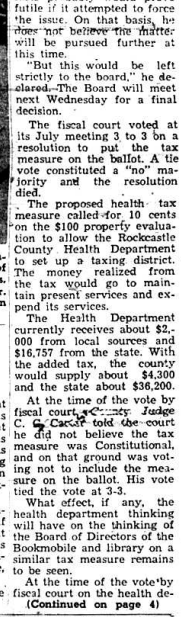

partment tax, the court also included a Bookmobile tax measure in the vote. The Bookmobile wanted five cents on the \$100 property evaluation to continue its present services.

It is generally believed that court action could tie up the health department tax long enough to keep it off the ballot, then chances are it will be on the ballot. One tax measure is expected to be on the November ballot. The court is expected to ask voters to approve a 15 cents on the \$100 property evaluation tax to issue general obligation bonds to build a new courthouse-jail. The measure will be on the ballot only if the Public Works Committee approves a \$232,000 grant for partial payment on the \$400,000 project. The county would supply \$168,000 of its share in the project.

To take the Public Works Committee has not approved the grant, but approval (or disapproval) is expected in the next few days.

When these projects have been completed, the L & N said that its service between Cincinnati and Atlanta would be greatly improved, particularly in the movement of tri-level railcars of automobiles.
