Council Meets

The Upper Cumberland Valley Development Council, which includes Rockcastle County, urged formation of the proposed federal Appalachian Authority for development of this region at its meeting held at Barbourville last Thursday night.

The Council is composed of community and business leaders from an eight-county Eastern Kentucky area including Rockcastle, Jackson, Laurel, Knox, Whitley, Bell, Clay and Harlan counties.

Creation of an autonomous Appalachian Authority with an independent budget to carry out a total resource development program to relieve economic distress in the region was asked.

In a resolution unanimously adopted, the council requested that the authority, immediately upon its formation, begin a study of the Upper Cumberland, Big Sandy, Kentucky, Clinch and Powell rivers for flood control, recreation, and production of low-cost electrical power "for distribution by private or public power companies."

William Sowder Buried At Brodhead

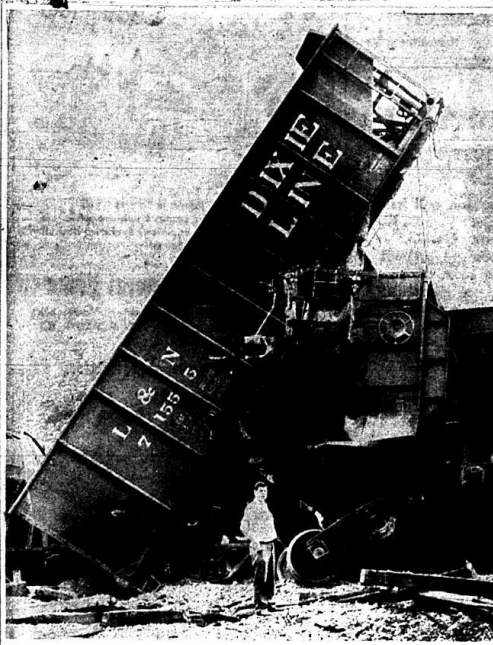
William Sowder, 62, of Brodhead, died July 30 at his home.

TRAIN WRECK AT BRODHEAD - One Coal Car Paved Ploopy-Back

The Louisville & Nashville Railroad took the second costly beating in seven weeks Sunday when a local jumbled the tracks about two miles west of Brodhead piling cars along the right-of-way and five into Dix River.

The wreck tore up about a quarter of a mile of track and occurred at the same location where a rock slide caused a million dollar wreck on June 9.

To date, railroad officials have not reported the exact cause of the accident, but no rock slide was involved in the second wreck. The new railroad bed used since the previous wreck may have become loosened by frequent rain weakening the tracks. Damage to the track in the Sunday wreck could run near \$300,000. Damage was less in the Sunday wreck since no engines were involved. The cars off the track were in the middle of the train. The engine and remaining cars at the front of the train went on to Corbin. Several rear end cars also remained on the track.

On the train were empty coal cars and cars containing powdered sugar, insulation materials, wheat, appliances and stoves.

A new track was laid Monday and rail traffic resumed Tuesday.

490 Cans Of Beer Missing

What happened to the evidence?

This question puzzled Rockcastle Circuit Court officials Wednesday when a liquor case against a Pineville man was called for trial.

A check of the county's liquor storeroom in the courthouse showed a total of 490 cans of Budweiser and Schlitz beer were missing.

Slate Trooper Johnny Sims reported he took the missing beer from Grant Brown Jr., 39, of Pineville, on August 21, 1962 when he stopped Brown on a traffic charge. The beer was placed in the storeroom and a release was signed turning the beer over to the county.

Brown posted bond then failed to appear when the trial was docketed. He was located later in Harlan jail and a bench warrant issued for his return to Rockcastle County. The case was called Wednesday.

When Trooper Sims went to the storeroom Wednesday to get the beer to be used as evidence in court, he was unable to find the cases he had marked with the citation number.

Earlier in Circuit Court, Brown's case was continued until next Wednesday because an important witness was injured in an auto accident.

The storeroom in which the liquor is stored is at the rear of the courthouse on an accessible through a door leading to a room used by the grand jury. There are bars over the windows. One door leading outside is also barred.

Investigation of the storeroom by Trooper Sims, Trooper Paul Blevins, Deputy Sheriff Flip Beason, County Judge C. C. Carter and Jailer Sam Hoskins showed the storeroom had not been forcibly entered.

The lock on the door is of the night-latch variety. Judge Carter and Jailer Hoskins have the only known keys to the storeroom.

Announce 1964 Feed-Grain Program Rules

The United States Department of Agriculture today announced the major provisions of the 1964 voluntary feed grain program, designed to continue the progress made since 1961 in balancing supplies with needs and to protect incomes of feed grain and wheat producers as fully as possible in 1963 (it was 49 percent) and in 1964, a producer may divert as much as 50 percent of his feed grain base acreage and to increase their income. In 1964, a producer may divert 49 to 50 percent will receive to the lowest consistent with

law and economic circumstances. As before, the maximum acreage diversion will be 25 acres if this is less than 50 percent of the base.

Because of a new provision of law for determining average yields used in computing payments, state and county yields for 1961 and 1962 will be averaged with the 1959 and 1960 yields, which were previously used.

Officials said that in preparing the 1964 Feed Grain Program careful consideration was given to the alteration of diversion payments at the

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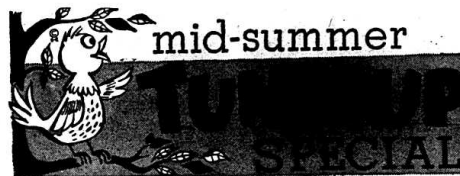

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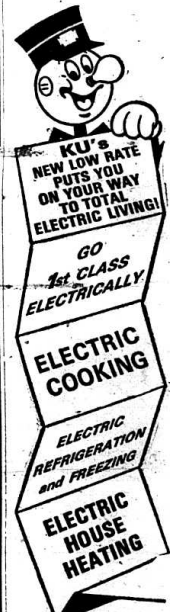

 natives which could help maintain income from wheat while continuing progress in meeting the feed grain program objectives—increasing farm income, reducing government stocks, and reducing costs to taxpayers.
 The program announced today assures cooperating corn producers of price support at \$1.25 per bushel, national averages compared with an estimated 80 cents which could have been expected if new feed grain legislation had not been enacted by congress last spring. Wheat prices can also be expected to stay above the estimated 85-90 cents a bushel that would have been likely without an effective feed grain program. However, department officials pointed out, even the improved program for feed grains with its cushioning effects on wheat prices will not prevent a drop in wheat income.
 The total national average price support levels in 1963 will be the same as in 1962, with a slightly larger proportion of this support to be made available in the form of loans.
 Two rates of diversion payment will be offered as before, but the higher rate may be applied to more acres. The payments will be computed as follows:

- (1) Producers who divert at least 20 percent of their base acres are eligible for payments computed by multiplying the diverted acres by 20 percent of normal yield times the county's yield price support rate for the feed grain diverted.
- (2) For diversion between 20 and 40 percent of their acreage, participants will earn payments on this part of the diversion at a rate of 50 percent of the farm's normal yield times the county support rate.
- (3) Those who divert 40 to 50 percent of the base (or 25 acres if this is greater) will receive the 50 percent maximum rate of payment on all acres diverted.
- (4) Under a new legal provision, payments may not exceed 20 percent of the value of the land diverted. Payments in kind for both

diversion and the non-loan part of the price support will again be made in the form of negotiable certificates with which the producer may receive grain from CCC stocks or cash at the county ASCS office if he wishes the assistance of commodity order practices, including summer follow and idle land. Also as in the past, a producer who owns or operates more than one farm will be eligible to participate in the program on one farm at his own option, but the feed grain base is not exceeded.
 Regarding the normal acreage to be maintained in corn, a new use insures that any planting of wheat in excess of the allotment on a corn-planted farm will have to be at the expense of some other soil-depleting crop. Thus, after extensive consideration, the department has decided not to make eligibility for feed grain contingent on staying exactly within the wheat allotment, if any, for the signed farm.
 Producers who planted up to 30 acres of wheat for home use under the so-called feed wheat exemption during any one of the years 1959, 1960 and 1961 will have their 1964 feed grain base increased to the extent that the 3-year average of such wheat plantings exceeded 15 acres, which has been allowed them as wheat history. This is a provision of law. In view of the above-average level of barley stocks on July 1, and an expected harvest sufficient for all purposes during the current marketing year, maling barley acreage in 1964 will not be excluded from the diversion requirements of the feed grain program. A decision will be announced later with respect to the production of minor non-surplus crops on acreage diverted from feed grains.
 As in 1963, participating farmers will be required to

state intentions at time of sign-up and will designate their diverted acres at completion time.
 The sign-up period for both fall and spring sown crops is planned for early 1964.
