Area Planning Topic For C Of C Visitors



CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEETING -- As Many Visitors As Local People --

Mt. Vernon has one of the best opportunities to promote "tourism" as does any town in Kentucky. So said Mrs. Catherine Wycoff, a member of the Tourist Information and Travel Division of the State Department of Commerce, Frankfort, at a meeting of the Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce recently at the Kentucky Utilities office.

Mrs. Wycoff told the group residents of Rockcastle County as well as all Kentucky should sell every tourist they contact on the remaining in the area for their vacation and returning.

She said that Renfro Valley offered a great opportunity for promotion and that local residents should sell the Valley to everyone with whom they come in contact.

She also suggested that all employers instruct all employees to be courteous and helpful to tourists.

"Tourists remember all the little things that are done for them while they are in an area. To remember an area makes the chances more likely that they will return," she said.

She also suggested that towns continue to keep their areas clean and well kept.

Malcolm Mason, chairman of community development for the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, and Kentucky Utilities development engineer, talked briefly to the group. He said each town must have a program of development and the program should be local as possible and put into effect by local people.

1963 Crop Corn Support Rate Told

The 1963 total support price represents an average of \$1.07 per bushel through loans and purchase agreements plus 18 cents per bushel through payments in kind.

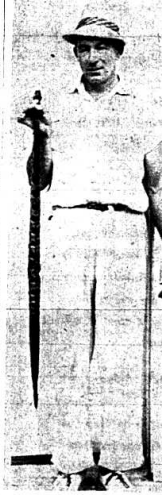
Basic method for determining county support rates remains unchanged but, as in the past, some adjustments are being made in county and statewide differentials between various pricing areas as justified by changing conditions.

Current analyses of price, utilization and movements of corn in the various areas indicate the need for certain adjustments in order to achieve a more equitable price support structure.

John Lair Discusses Renfro.

(Because of the interest in changes that may occur at Renfro Valley in the next few months, we reprint an editorial by John Lair, which Mr. Lair delivered over radio station WYVK last Friday.)

"In view of the reports going around concerning the future of Renfro Valley, I assume I will be expected to make some mention of the subject this morning. It will be strictly in a general way. I have no particular announcement to make.

It is true there seems to be a sudden rash of other sections of the country interested in getting Renfro Valley into their own business community. Two of them in particular are showing more than passing interest and one has made a definite offer that we are bound to consider.

This, however, is nothing new. When radio showed down a few years ago and we doubted being able to hang on without a little help, one community not too many miles away offered me a big cash bonus and all the help needed in building a new Renfro Valley community within a radius of 10 miles of a spot they designated.

We passed that up and struggled along and it now appears that we guessed right in doing so. Renfro Valley radio programs now have a greater value than they have ever had before and our real estate values have greatly increased with the possibilities offered by the proposed new interstate highway. That, apparently, is the moving force in any thinking concerning moving Renfro Valley. Government money seems available in considerable quantity to some of these towns and locations where big things are being planned, and it seems to be the opinion of many that if the offer of Renfro Valley activities into their orbit they can profit by it greatly.

On the other hand, there is the possibility that Renfro Valley might slip into the federal bag and come up with enough to what we want to do in a tourist way right here at home. It is true that we wouldn't have the help and co-operation here we would find elsewhere. Renfro Valley is an old story to the folks in this community and they by no means value it as highly as would the folks getting the benefits of it for the first time. A wideawake, enthusiastic group would do a lot for such a venture and would make a lot of it.

There are drawbacks to this location. Business people around us have profited shamefully on the tourists we have brought in, especially in the past. You can remember a time when some motels charged \$25 for a room on Saturday night. You may remember that certain garages charged entirely unreasonable prices for towing in a car or working on one. There is no question but what this drove tourists

adjustments, and increase in the overall support price, increases in 1963 total county support prices will be from four to five cents per bushel in the major production areas of the corn belt and generally from seven to 10 cents in the northeast and southeast. Prices in most of the other counties are up five cents per bushel from last year.

Since the payment in kind portion in all counties will be 18 cents per bushel, the differences among them on levels of total price support will be reflected only in the loan and purchase agreements rates. Also, since the total price support in 1963 is higher by average of five cents per bushel, the 1963 loan and purchase agreement portion will average 13 cents, rather than 18 cents per bushel lower than in 1962, when the loan rate represented the total support price.

Price support loan program for corn will be carried out as in the past through farm and warehouse stored loans and purchase agreements. These will be available from harvest time through May 31, 1964, in most areas. Loans will mature in most areas on July 31, 1964.

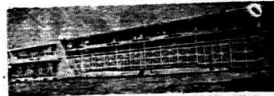
Corn producers who participate in the 1963 feed-grain program will be eligible for the price support loan on their 1963 production, providing it meets grade, moisture and storage standards. Non-participants will be ineligible.

Under legislation authorizing 1963 feed-grain program, all 1963 production of corn from participating farms

away, cut down our attendance through the years, and reduced our income.
In many cases those who have profited most by the drawing power of Renfro Valley radio activities have been the least appreciative of it.

Naturally we would hesitate a long time about dropping our activities here, but trying to survive through the changing period until the pendulum swings back to a returning appreciation of radio by commercial sponsors has been a bit tough. We have not asked for any particular expression of appreciation or co-operation from our homefolks, but when outsiders with a fresher and broader viewpoint can see such possibilities in having this set-up in their community and are willing to pay liberally for it we are naturally going to listen to such propositions as they make.

Let me repeat that there's no definite plan on foot to make a move but certain other communities and tourist promotion groups all the way into the Nation's capital are apparently giving serious consideration to offering important inducement for such a move. At this point we cannot say positively what will happen.

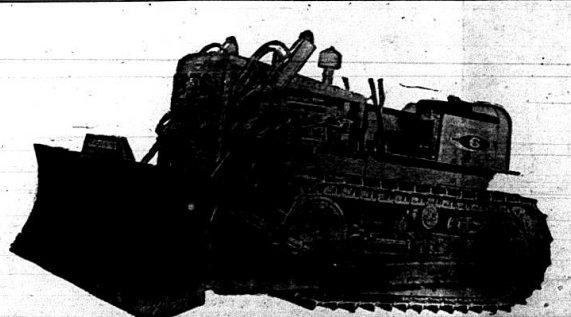
