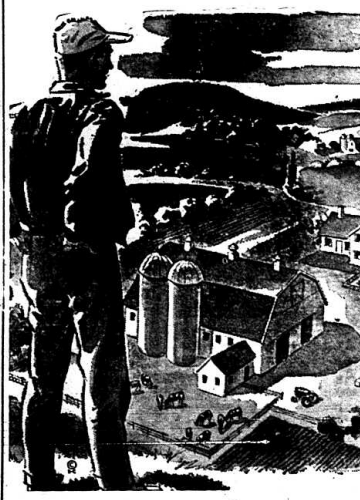

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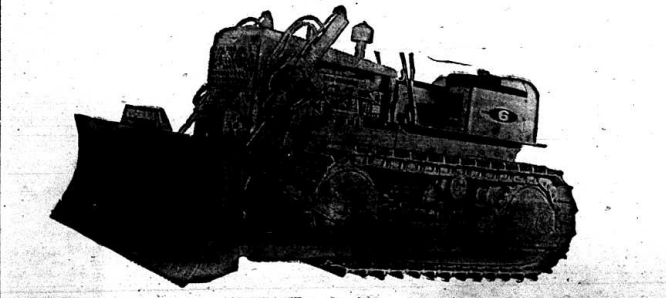

## Attorney General Gives Opinion On Health Department Tax Bill

In the eyes of Attorney General John Breckinridge, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court must comply with a Rockcastle County Health Department demand that a health tax measure be on the November ballot.  
This was the opinion of Attorney Breckinridge and Assistant Attorney General W. S. Riley reported in a letter to Dr. M. A. Shepherd, county health officer, last week.  
The attorney general wrote that the word "shall" means "mandatory" as interpreted by the Supreme Court. He expressed opinions in ruling on Kentucky Revised Statute 212-720.  
The local health department has asked the fiscal court several times to include a health tax district on the November ballot. The tax would call for up to 10 cents on the poll property evaluation to pay for current services and expanded facilities.  
Breckinridge said the court has on the request to include the tax on the ballot, but the measure has been defeated by a 3-3 tie vote.  
In releasing the letter from the attorney general, Dr. Shepherd did not comment on possible future action, if any, will be taken by the local department.  
The letter from Mr. Riley, and for Attorney General Breckinridge, reads as follows:  
"In your recent letter to the Attorney General, it is stated that some confusion has arisen in Rockcastle County concerning whether it is "mandatory" or "discretionary" for the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court to adopt a resolution submitting the public health tax on the November ballot of the county after it has received a certified copy of the request from the county board of health directing that the question be placed on the ballot at the next general election.  
The fiscal court has refused to comply with the request of the Rockcastle County Board of Health apparently on the theory that it is within the court's discretion as to whether such question be placed on the ballot. You ask if the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court has any objection in complying with the request of the county board of health or whether it is mandatory for the court to place such question on the ballot if requested by the board.  
Under KRS 212.720, we find the following:  
"Upon the request of any county or city-county board of health except in counties containing a city of the first class, the fiscal court of the county shall adopt a resolution submitting to the qualified voters of the county, the question as to whether a public health taxing district shall be established for the county..." (Emphasis ours.)

## Committee Readies Report Cromer Resigns Policeman Job

The President's Appalachian Regional Commission formed to describe and recommend a development program for the region, will present its proposal to President Kennedy in December.  
Rockcastle County is included in the region.  
John Whisman, recently appointed executive secretary of the Commission and Washington representative of the Conference of Appalachian Governors, recently outlined the Kentucky State Government officials the timetable and the role of State agencies in drafting the report.

Whisman emphasized that the program will be a State-Federal program. He said the states involved will have as much responsibility as the Federal agencies.  
Whisman noted that he is encouraged by the action that work on the report has stirred in Washington.  
"In the years that I have been in and out of Washington, I have never seen cooperation such as we have had here," he said. "Peoples are working full-time toward the September 15 crash deadline for the first draft."  
The Commission was established on April 9 of this year to prepare a comprehensive program for the

hensive program for the economic development of the Appalachian Region. President Kennedy named Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., U. S. Undersecretary of commerce, as Commission chairman.

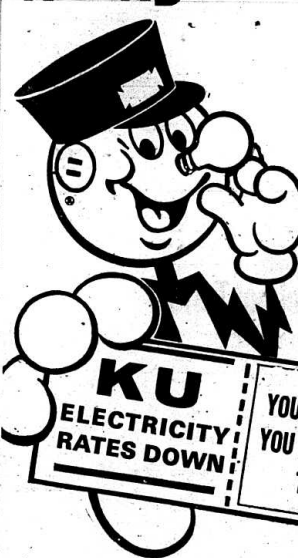

## HEALTH TAX

(Continued from Page 1)

"As used in the statute laws of this state, unless the context requires otherwise - (23) 'Shall' is mandatory."

Our Court of Appeals has stated in Stanfield vs. Wiloughby, 286 S. W. 2d 908 (1956), that in its ordinary meaning the word "shall" has a compulsory, imperative, or mandatory meaning. See 80 CJS "Shall" p. 136. When the word is employed in a statute, its ultimate significance depends not on form but on the legislative intent, which is to be ascertained by interpretation from a consideration of the entire act, its nature and object, and the consequences of construction, one way or the other. See Skaggs v. Yaffe, 286 Ky. 337, 98 S. W. 2d 884 (1936).

The purpose of KRS 212-720 through 212-740 is to establish public health taxing districts. Money derived from the assessment of such tax, which may be as much as per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation of all the property in the district, is to be used to meet the public health needs of the county. That such purpose is a vital and necessary function of government seems to be almost too obvious for comment. The legislature apparently realized this fact by inserting in the statute the mandatory "shall" rather than the permissive "may" directive in requiring the fiscal court to place the question before the voters of the county. For the court to refuse to place the question on the ballot is a violation of the express mandate of the legislature.

Therefore, it is my opinion that the fiscal court has no discretion in this matter but is compelled to place the question of whether there shall be a public health tax in Rockcastle County on the ballot if the county health board requests it to do so.

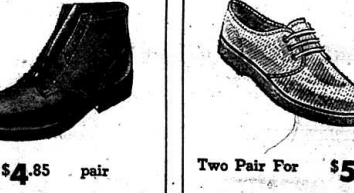

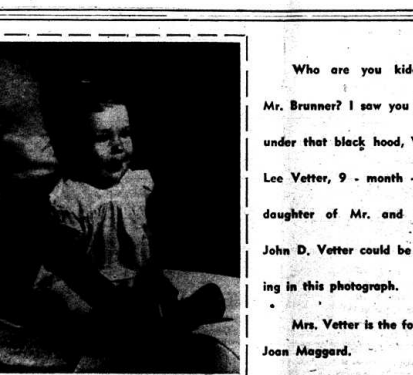

It was agreed records did show this will be the first educators controlled Kentucky company. As to date, there is only eleven (11) Kentucky bases and owned insurance companies.

Mr. Sweeney, in compliance to the security laws, does have to work with two limitations. We have a limited time and a limited number of shares in this organization, and of this number, each county is allocated a number of shares based on the population. Handicapped in this way, every effort will be made to contact everyone in this field as we have had splendid cooperation in the past in all departments in this direction. It was pointed out by directors of the company any amount of shares in any particular county not subscribed to by educators will be offered to other business people in order that the company may keep its commitment to the security department.

Proceeds for the sale of shares are held in escrow by the Liberty National Bank & Trust Company of Louisville, until the company receives certificates of authority. Mr. Sweeney will give a brief orientation as to capital stock ownership for the benefit of the Education Department and materials will be passed out on Thursday morning, August 22nd, at Sunnyside College, and for City teachers on the afternoon of August 29th at the City School building, Corbin City Schools morning of Friday 23rd. Orientation for Rockcastle County is scheduled for Monday, August 26, at 3:00 p. m., at the Mt. Vernon High School.
