WANT TO BUY A WATERWORKS? --

Try City Of Livingston

Want to buy a city water system? If you do, try the City of Livingston. They have one for sale.

Such was indicated last week when the Board of Trustees at Livingston voted to ask Livingston residents to bid on one problem—their water system.

Livingston's dilemma boils down to one problem—their water system. The city has a surplus of water and must pay interest on \$96,000 in bonds sold to build the water system in 1957.

In an ordinance published in the Signal the city says "it is deemed advisable for the best interest of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, to sell its existing waterworks system to the highest bidder at a sufficient purchase price to be received so as to retire all of the bonds secured by revenue of such a sale."

The Board says it will ask city voters in November to approve the sale. Just what the city expects to accomplish, or hopes to accomplish, by selling the waterworks is not clear. It is apparent, but bond attorneys have advised the city to pursue the sale as a means of financing. Probably, the city hopes to arrange some kind of financial aid, possibly through a government grant of some type.

The city's water problems stem from the early days of the system. When the system went into operation, there were only 80 customers out of the 180 who pledged to take water. Since the number who actually took water was lower (78) than the entire population, the city was thrown out of balance, resulting in a constant uphill fight to balance the books. There are 105 water customers. Since the opening of the system, only two \$1,900 bonds have been retired.

Livingston water customers pay a base monthly rate of \$4.53 (including tax) for 2,000 gallons of water, day or night, according to Mayor Webb reports. Those who have sewer facilities pay an added 75 cents per month.

According to Mayor Webb, the city will do everything possible to solve the city's water problems, and the city is in constant contact with bond attorneys. Various sources have been contacted.

Two Amendments Face November Voters

Kentucky voters will be asked to approve or reject two amendments to the Kentucky State Constitution in the November 5 general election.

One proposed amendment would remove the statutory provision concerning State elections, and the other would make it easier to amend or rewrite the Constitution.

The first amendment, which would amend section 24 of the Constitution, all State elective officers except the Governor are limited to \$12,000 a year; all circuit judges to \$8,000; and all other public officers (mayor, city and county) to \$7,200.

Constitutional amendment No. 1 would remove these salary limitations and stipend to the General Assembly the power to determine what the pay for these positions should be.

Constitutional amendment No. 2 is a three-part change. It would (1) change the number of members of the General Assembly to be called by one Legislature with the approval of the Legislature and a vote of the people; (2) require a third Legislature to call a convention; and (3) require ratification by the people of any changes enacted by a Constitutional Convention.

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Twin Calves Born

It was all quite a surprise for Teddy Brock, Route 3, near Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, when his Guernsey cow gave birth to a calf about three weeks previously.

In accordance with Dr. Rudolph Burdette, veterinarian, it is very unusual for cows to twin late in the year, which he reported it was the first time he had actually seen the delayed birth.

The calves were of average size and doing well.

Start Courthouse Floor Plan

Working plans for a new Rockcastle County Courthouse are now being drawn by Bayless, Conlister & Johnson, architects, of Lexington.

Officials of the architect firm are in the county last week for discussions of the proposed \$400,000 project.

The working plans will be included as quickly as possible. It usually takes about two months for completion. Bidding on construction of the courthouse will follow completion of the detailed plans and specifications.

Actual work will begin by December, or 120 days from the time the government awarded the county \$222,000 as a grant toward construction.

The project is expected to cost about \$400,000, but a cushion of \$20,000 has been added to take care of rising costs if a rise should occur. It is possible the extra \$20,000 will not be used.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court took a look at its financial plans at its last meeting.

The courthouse is to be financed with revenue bonds, and the project has been approved by all government agencies under revenue bond financing.

Should county people want a cheaper method of financing the courthouse, they would have to vote on a general obligation bond issue in the November election. The county has \$15 cents on the assessed \$100 property valuation.

Should the voters turn down the general obligation bond issue, at the polls, the court will proceed on the revenue bond financing plan.

Ken Hutchins, chairman of the county bond issue committee, said the project is a "good thing" and that the courthouse will be a "good thing" for the county.

Governor At Renfro Tuesday

The annual Governor's Tour, sponsored by the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, has Renfro Valley on its schedule for 1:30 p. m. Tuesday.

The tourists will be accompanied by Gov. Bert Coombs and Chamber executive vice president, James Zimmerman.

Renfro Valley will be the first rest stop for the group following lunch at Socca Tavern Hotel, Berea. While at Renfro, the group will be entertained a Renfro Valley Bandstand. John Lair will be official host.

"During the stop-over, the visitors will be told about points of interest by the members of the Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce, including industrial sites available.

The local chamber urges everyone to come to Renfro and welcome the visitors.

"This is our chance to show our county to the rest of the world, and to show its business and near-by states. If you are there it will show your interest in the county," chamber officials said.

Treated Tobacco Beds Bring More Dividends

Fall-treated tobacco plant beds will bring dividends to the farmer next spring, says Ira Maxson, K. Agr. Extension Service, tobacco specialist.

"There are some tips on this project:

- Blue mold was encountered last spring in plant beds on some farms. This means farmers should pick a new plant bed site this fall. Flow the site, then work in relation to how it will be treated; thoroughly worked if ditches are to be previous to cut down entrance to the field.
- Soil that is deep and fertile, with a southern or southeastern exposure, and in an open field.
- Plow the soil at least two weeks before treatment. Even earlier plowing is suggested. Plowing will eliminate all weeds and bring weed seed to the surface to be killed.
- Apply your treatment (against weeds, etc.) this fall. Use one of the following: Burning, methyl bromide gas, calcium cyanide, Vapor, allyl alcohol or Mylone.
- Ditch the beds thoroughly to cut down entrance of weed seed, disease organisms, etc. from surface drainage.

Fall-treated beds require considerably less watering the following spring.

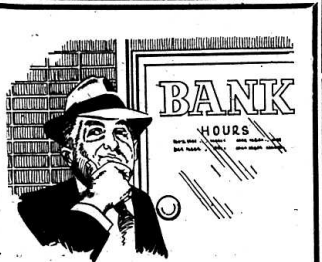

State Farmers Set Six Yearly Records

Kentucky farmers set six records last year in burley tobacco yield per acre and total crop value, corn yield per acre, soybean acreage and soybean production, and the total of cattle and calves. Agriculture Commissioner Emerson "Doc" Beauchamp has reported.

The 1962 burley tobacco yield of 2,000 pounds an acre topped by 250 acres the previous high of 1,800 pounds recorded in 1961 and by more than 500 pounds the 10-year average. In total value, \$263,738,000, the burley crop was at an all-time high, despite a sharp decline in prices, Beauchamp said.

Corn production of 58 bushels an acre average also shattered the 1961 record of 55 bushels.

The 2,354,000 cattle and calves on Kentucky farms at the end of the year was an inventory record and 5 percent above the 2,242,000 a year earlier.

1962 soybean production totaled 5,256,000 bushels, 5 percent above the 1961 aggregate. The 219,000 acres in soybeans also established a record, and this 9 percent increase in acreage over 1961 more than offset a slight decline—from 25 to 24 bushels per acre—in the average yield.

These records are listed in "Kentucky Agricultural Statistics, 1962," prepared by the Kentucky Crop and Livestock Reporting Service at Louisville.
