## Courthouse And Jail

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q - Will the Courthouse and Jail be built?

A - Definitely.

Q - How will it be financed?

A - It is approved by the State and Federal Government to be financed with revenue bonds.

Q - What is the reason for the bond issue then?

A - The bond issue is for the purpose of giving the County an opportunity to finance it on a cheaper basis.

Q - How much cheaper?

A - Revenue Bonds would sell on about a 4 1/2% interest rate and obligation bonds or the voted bond issue will sell for not more than 3 1/2% interest rate which will make about \$1750.00 a year difference. Over a period of 20 years there would be a big savings on interest.

Q - How will the revenue be raised if the bond issue does not pass?

A - By different means - The most likely would be the re-assessment of property.

Q - Just what would that amount to?

A - An example - We will say a person's property is assessed at \$3000.00 - If it was re-assessed, no doubt it would be raised to \$4500.00 - which is a fair guess.

Q - How much of a savings would that be for a taxpayer on that basis?

A - You can count the difference very easily as the bond issue would cost the tax payer \$4.50 a year. The raise in assessment would cost the difference between \$4,500.00 and \$4500.00 which would be \$150.00 raise. At \$23.25 on each \$1000.00, which is the tax rate, and that figures out to \$33.75 a year instead of \$4.50, if the bond issue passes. So you can see that it would be a vast savings for the bond issue to pass. No matter what your taxes are listed at, it is \$1.50 on each \$1000.00 with the bond issue.

Q - Is that the correct way to figure the difference?

A - Yes, as simple as that.

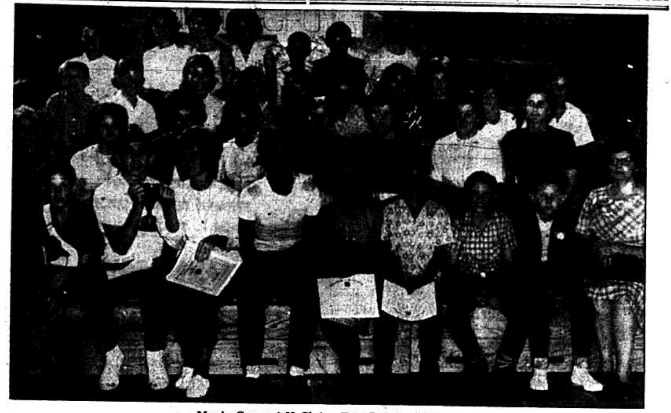
Q - Just how much money is the grant or government gift?

A - \$232,000.00.

Q - Will that have to be paid back?

A - No, that is an absolute gift on condition that we finance the balance. You know we can not afford to not accept this proposition.

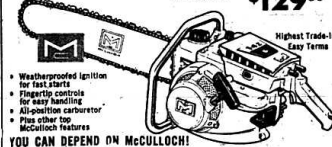

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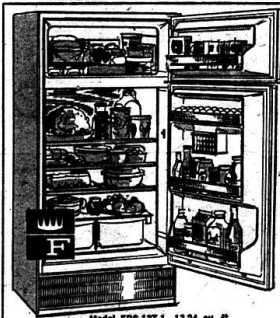

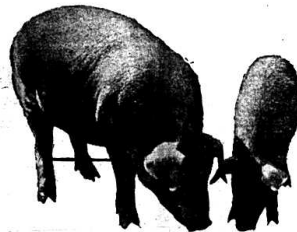

## Letter To The Editor

We, the members of the City Council of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky have done our utmost to give the citizens of Mt. Vernon, fair, and just leadership. Often this was done with a need for sacrifice on everyone's part. Ours was well as yours. To make any progress, sacrifice must be made, regardless of degree.

In recent weeks there has erupted, unfair, untrue, unjust and completely malicious reports. This is NOT a new occurrence. At any time in the History of Mt. Vernon, when a new and progressive movement is proposed, a group, and we must add, often the same people, have risen up to block any progress the town might attempt. We are saddened by this but we solemnly promise our citizens we will do our utmost to go forward not backward, or even stand still.

Your City Council must take issue with a few of these reports.

FIRST: We have never even considered an occupational tax. You may prove this to your satisfaction by reading, any or all of the minutes of the City Council of Mt. Vernon. Remember this, the minutes are yours, and are open to you, you may read them at the City Clerk's office whenever you desire.

SECOND: Let us further explain that there has been no tax measure designed to raise money to pay Mr. Jack Crawford for the survey for the sewer system. His pay will come out of the money granted to the city by the government.

THIRD: As to the water rate increase, you can't service customers today at some prices as the city did in 1937, when the original water rate was established. Labor is higher, chemicals, pipe, and materials are higher today. Everything is higher. And there has been more footage of pipe laid in the City of Mt. Vernon since the new rate increase than there has ever been in any six months period before, with less indebtedness. Thereby giving more service to more people than we had been able to do before.

If Mt. Vernon or any small town is going to grow it must be progressive and willing to go forward. The sewer system is needed and we must put it in. A sewer system will be a drawing card for future industry.

However, there seems to be some confusion as to the rate to be charged for sewer service. The sewer rate has been established at one-half of your water bill. For example, if your water bill is \$3.40 per month, then your sewer charge will be only \$1.70 per month. If you are not on the sewer line then you WILL NOT be charged for sewer service.

The job of a City Councilman is a great and solemn one, we feel our efforts are not unappreciated. Regardless of the unfounded reports of a few biased people to whom progress is repulsive. We feel an overwhelming number of the citizens of Mt. Vernon wish to go forward and we have listed three points we wish you to consider.

(1) A new sewer system (an inevitable event, regardless of opposition), the town will have a sewer system, as the State Department of Health, will make it mandatory. The question is: Should we accept the aid of the government? or should we do it by a higher local tax?—You, the voter, must answer that question, in who you vote for this fall.

## Health Tax Discussed

1. What is it?  
A Tax on property which can be used only for the maintenance and operation of your County Health Department.

2. What is its purpose?  
To provide an adequate financing system for your Health Department. You may not be aware that your lack of operating funds, is in danger of being closed for lack of operating funds. In fact, through the effort to pass this proposed public health tax, we are striving for our very existence. We're fighting to keep our Health Department. The Fiscal Court, under existing tax resources, has not had and will not have enough funds to support the Health Department. As you may know, we have had to seek help from various sources. Some of these sources of money, from which we have literally begged help, are exhausted. We have no other recourse but to turn to the people of Rockcastle County for help through the public health tax issue. The establishment of a public health taxing district for the county by a majority vote in the November election would insure the continued operation of the Health Department. In addition, through this small amount of tax, it would qualify us, under Kentucky Health Foundation Plan, for our receipt of state and federal funds. It would also enable us to expand present programs and undertake needed ones the county has never had.

3. What property would be taxed for this purpose?  
Any personal and real property that is now subject to county taxation.

4. What is the amount of the tax?  
Ten cents (10¢) of each \$100 of your assessed property valuation.

5. How much would the individual taxpayer have to pay per year under the levy?  
A person whose property is assessed at \$500 would pay 50¢ per year for the health tax; or if his property is assessed at \$1,000 he would pay \$1.00 per year.

6. How does the Health Department feel about the proposed courthouse and the library tax issues?  
The Rockcastle County Health Department wholeheartedly endorses these issues. It plans to lend its support to them. It strongly feels that the passage of the measures, along with that of the proposed public health tax district, are necessary for community progress. The Health Department Staff urges all voters to support these measures.

Q - We understand the Courthouse and Jail have been condemned, Is that true?  
A - Yes, and there is an emergency clause in the contract so stating.

Q - There is a question about the commodities being stopped. Can you give any answer to that?  
A - Yes, and I am glad you asked that. Of course if the bond issue fails, we might have to take the amount used for distributing the commodities, which amounts to about \$3800.00 a year and apply it to the revenue bonds. We do not want that to happen.

Q - If the bond issue passes, then the commodities would still be distributed, is that true?  
A - Yes, as long as the government furnishes them.

Q - Do you think it would be to the advantage of the commodity receivers to vote for the bond issue?  
A - Yes, more than anyone else.

Q - Why?  
A - Well, I do not know that we could take care of them if the bond issue fails.

Q - It has been said that the franchisees would pay about one-third of the bill if the bond issue passes. Is that true?  
A - Yes, the franchisees of this county amounts to almost one-third of our revenue.

Q - Will you sum up the whole thing in your judgement?  
A - I will be glad to.

FIRST - The Courthouse and Jail will be built.

SECOND - We can not afford to pass up this opportunity to build with the government making this kind of a grant.

THIRD - It will furnish work for a number of people in the county.

FOURTH - The Courthouse and Jail has to be built in the future due to the fact both have been condemned.

FIFTH - This project is for the future and will be the biggest boost for our county that has happened in the past 100 years.

SIXTH - The younger generation believes in moving ahead.

## Dear Hunting AT BGAD

Col. C. A. Cozart, Commanding Officer, Blue Grass Army Depot, Richmond, announced that deer hunting will be permitted on the Depot this year. This is the result of a cooperative plan for conservation and development of fish and wildlife resources on military reservations recently signed by the Depot, the Kentucky Department of Fish and States Department of the Interior Fish and Wildlife Service. This plan is in keeping with the Department of the Army policy which provides that, wherever possible, installations containing suitable land and water areas be made available for controlled public access.

The deer season will be the same as that of the state with the exception that hunting will only be permitted on the week ends. Archery season will be Oct. 19, 20, 26 and 27 Nov. 2 and 3. Shotgun season, using slug ammunition, will be Nov. 30 and Dec. 1.

Persons wishing to hunt on the Depot must submit their requests on post cards only to the Provost Marshal, Blue Grass Army Depot, Richmond, Kentucky. A separate request will be required for each day of hunting, however, only one post card per person for each day will be accepted. Requests will be accepted by the Provost Marshal until 4 p. m., EST, Oct. 4, 1963.

Inasmuch as there will be a limit on the number of people allowed to hunt on any one day, a drawing for permits will be held after all requests are received. The Provost Marshal will advise each applicant by letter of the date he is kept to hunt and the area that he will be permitted to hunt in.
