Only a minor portion of the farm fields have been tested and before ultimate benefits can be derived from the county as a whole, all fields should be tested.

The next step then is to time and fertilize according to soil needs as indicated by the soil tests and to follow up with crops suited to the land. These crops must be grown according to the precepts of good crop management and marketed through high quality livestock.

Now for some months this feed and livestock production program has been talked about and some phases of it have already been put into action. Rockcastle county is presently involved in a campaign to have all farm-

ers test their soils.

It seems to us that it behooves every farmer to cooperate in this activity which can only benefit, yet costs little in either time or money. We have experts to aid and assist and always be available as this program progresses. So let's release the genie by having our soils tested and take advantage of the opportunity to reap more profit through the upgrading of our feed and livestock production.
