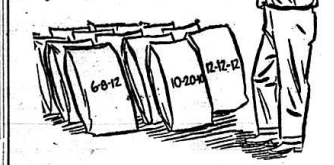

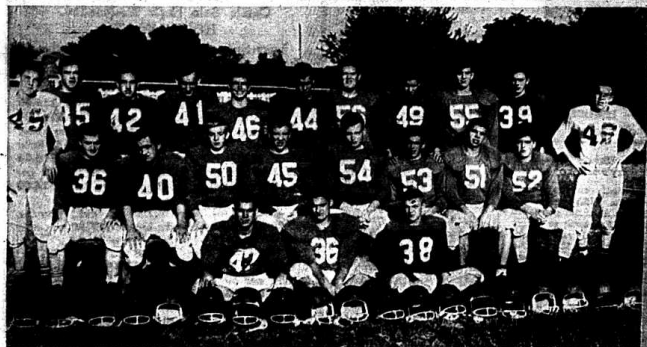

Payne is in the Central Baptist Hospital at Lexington, with right shoulder and arm pulled loose, multiple bruises and several cuts on his head.

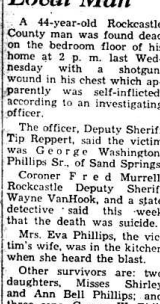
He underwent surgery Monday and is expected to remain in the hospital for several more days.

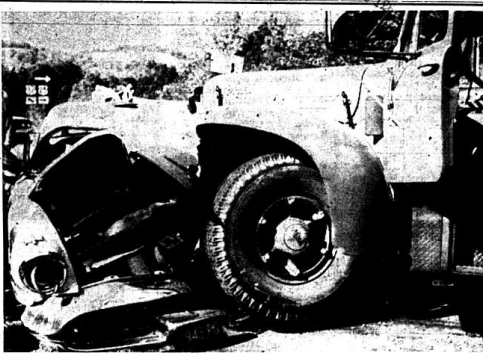

A Dayton, Ohio, couple was killed Sunday when their car collided with a truck near the intersection of U. S. 25 and Mt. Vernon's Main Street.

Killed were Thomas F. Huber, 72, and his wife, Mrs. Edith Huber, 65, the driver.

State Police said Mrs. Huber was traveling south at 2 p. m. and was leaving a detour to return to U. S. 25 when she ran a stop sign and collided with the truck.

Manuslaughter charges have been filed against the truck driver, Irvin Leon Gilstrap of Louisville.

The victims were taken to Cox Funeral Home at Mt. Vernon.

The couple were reportedly on route to Florida for the winter.

State police said the traffic toll for 1963 stood at 618 compared with 611 at this time last year.

DETOUR

Detours are always a problem and through traffic, especially, is having a hard time in Mt. Vernon since the short section of U. S. 25 in Mt. Vernon has been closed for repairs. This section is much needed. It has been a very difficult for the highway department to keep a surface there that would hold.

One couple has been killed in Mt. Vernon this winter leaving the detour another accident occurred Tuesday afternoon at the intersection of Church Street and U. S. 25 when an Indiana car was leaving the detour for Route 25.

The auto driven by Orville Stevens, 79, Angola, Ind., collided with the auto driven by Clarence Broyles, 67, Pineville, when Stevens drove up Church Street into the path of Broyles.

State Trooper Paul Blevins reported that the vehicle driven by Stevens "failed to yield right of way to oncoming traffic."

Jackie Morgan, granddaughter of Mrs. Ruth Hatmaker of Wallins Creek who accompanied Broyles was taken to the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital with a mangled nose. Another granddaughter, Patti Morgan, was not injured.

Stevens was accompanied by his wife, Millie.

No charges were filed. The State Highway Department crew took down a battered yellow stop sign and replaced it with a red stop sign at the intersection of Church Street and U. S. 25 about 10 minutes before the mishap.

Grazing Of Feed Grain Permitted Oct. 1

Effective Oct. 1, 1963 farmers were able to graze the acreage they diverted under the 1963 feed grain and wheat stabilization program without special approval, R. O. Wilson, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, has announced. This applies uniformly throughout the country.

He stressed, however, that this relaxation of program provisions applies only to grazing the feed grain and wheat diverted areas. Hay on such acreages still may not be harvested.

Further, the relaxation does not apply to acreage diverted under the Conservation Reserve program, which may not be grazed or harvested through the whole year.

Approximately 44,000 farms in Kentucky are participating in the 1963 feed grain and wheat stabilization programs.

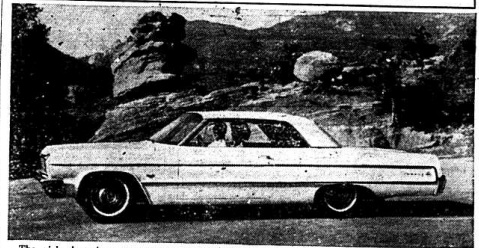

Letter To Editor

Livingston, Ky.
October 3, 1963
Editor, Mount Vernon Signal
Mt. Vernon, Ky.

Dear Sir:

A question in another newspaper as to what Jack Crawford's Crusade for Progress has done to the people of Livingston deserves an answer and I think that I am qualified to give a complete history of Mr. Crawford's association with the City. I was Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the City during 1946 and 47. I was City Clerk here from 1952 thru 1962. I have all the records of Mr. Crawford's Crusade for Progress in Livingston for the above mentioned years.

First: In 1945 the State Health Dept. condemned the local School because of inadequate Sewage disposal. Notice was served on the School Board that the School would have to be moved. This would cost the taxpayers over \$200,000. (Two Hundred Thousand Dollars). Local citizens at that time came to the City Board and with the School Board asked the City to study the situation. I, as Chairman, contacted Mr. Crawford and through his planning, engineering ability and diligence a Sewer System was planned, built and put into operation early in 1949 that served all of the West side of Main Street in our Town. The School was the first Tap

made on the new system. Later all of the East side of Main Street was added and in 1955 a Completed Sewer System covering every home and business in the City with the exception of two short streets that have less than 20 houses was completed. All of this work, Engineering and supplies cost the people of Livingston less than \$24,000 and to date there has been \$56, spent on upkeep. Mr. Crawford was paid \$520. for his services.

Second: In 1958 the City Council started plans for a City owned Water System. Three Engineering firms were contacted and the low City estimate submitted was a firm in Louisville, Ky. The price was in excess of \$178,000. The City could not swing a debt of this size and the record shows that Council abandoned the plans of all three Engineering firms. Late in 1958 Mr. Crawford was asked to submit his estimate of the costs of a Water system based on the plans that the other engineers had

used. Mr. Crawford, with the assistance of Clyde P. Mason Engineering Firm of Lexington, submitted plans and estimates of \$104,000 with the provision that the City obtain the signatures of 130 people who would tap on and use City Water. The signatures were obtained. The Bonds were sold and the system was built. To date only 103 people have availed themselves of Water Service, the other 27 who promised and didn't make good are the reason that the City had to offer its Waterworks for sale in an effort to obtain Federal Funds for refinancing. Mr. Crawford has received \$7,000 which had to be split with Clyde P. Mason, Eng.

Ask anyone in Livingston who knows all the story and they will tell you that Jack Crawford earned his money, here.

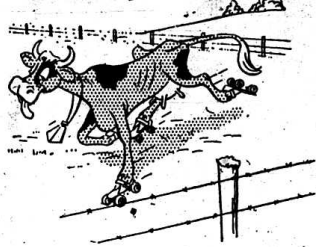

An Appeal To Voters

WE, the members of the Fiscal Court urge all voters and especially tax payers to vote for the Court-house Bond Issue.

WE, the people of the County, have been given \$232,000 for this project. Can we afford to throw this amount of money away? We say No.

The Court-house WILL BE BUILT regardless of how the bond issue goes.

The project is set up to be financed on a revenue bond issue, but the voted bond issue is a much cheaper way of doing it. A bond issue will just cost \$150 on each \$1000.00 of assessment. Now we all know that if the bond issue does not pass there will have to be a re-assessment of property and that will be done by the State.

The State doesn't want this to happen and neither do we.

This is about what would happen. Say a person's property is assessed at \$5000.00 and it is worth 35 or 40 thousand, it would have to be raised as much as \$10,000.00 which would be a total assessment of \$15,000.00. Now at \$5000.00 assessment, the bond issue would cost the taxpayer \$7.50. After the assessment raise it would cost the taxpayer \$225.00. Which would you rather pay \$7.50 or \$225.00?

This is a fair example of the assessment in this County. Examine your tax receipt and see if this is not true.

Some one may say what about the little tax payer. The same thing applies to them. Their property may be assessed at, we will say \$1200.00 and is worth \$6000.00, so you see he would have to be raised proportionately, up to about \$2500.00 which would cost him \$39.95 after the raise instead of \$1.80 by the bond issue way.

So we, the Fiscal Court Members, do not want to be forced to take these steps. We as members of the court are appealing to you as tax payers to work for this bond issue and urge every other voter to vote for it.

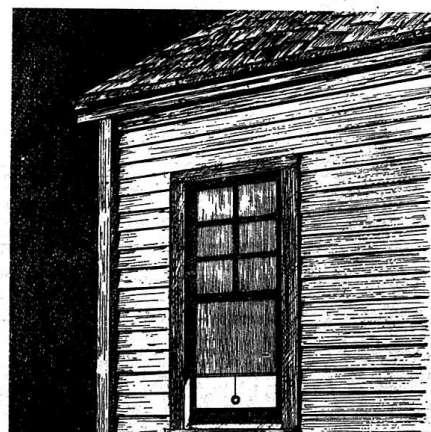

And out of this "co-operation" has grown a force powerful enough not only to help the farmer but to increase the prosperity of everyone in Kentucky.
