Because the courthouse and jail belong to all the people and not just a few.

Burley Sales Scheduled To Open November 25

The 1963-64 burley sales in the eight-state burley belt will begin Nov. 25. The Burley Sales Committee, meeting at Lexington Monday, set the opening and holiday dates. Auctions will close Dec. 20 for Christmas holidays and will re-open on Jan. 6, 1964.

The committee, in its resolutions, said sales will be 3 1/2 hours each day and the time of sales, order of sales and allocation of rotation will be set for each market by its tobacco board of trade or by a sales committee.

Sales times and rotation allocations will be set by local custom where there are boards of trade or a sales committee. Warehouses operated on a basket-selling basis should not sell more than 800 baskets an hour or 1,200 baskets a day for each set of buyers.

The committee adopted an optional resolution which asked farmers not to deliver and warehousemen not to receive and officially weigh any tobacco 10 days before the Nov. 25 sales season opening. This year there will be 18 sales days before the Christmas holidays and estimates are that 76 per cent of this year's crop (532,000,000 pounds) will be sold before Dec. 20. More than 75 per cent of last year's crop was sold before Christmas.

The sales dates this year are similar to those of last year with the 66 1/2 selling hours remaining the same. Sales this year will close Nov. 17 and reopen Nov. 29 for the Thanksgiving Holiday.

CITY WATER SUPPLY FAIR

NOTE "YES" FOR PUBLIC HEALTH NOVEMBER 5

Mr. John Houston, President of the Farm Bureau states that the Farm Bureau is giving its wholehearted support to the Public Health Tax. Mr. Houston said that the Farm Bureau had many reasons for supporting the Tax, but the outstanding one were these: "Our Health Department has been doing a wonderful job in preventing disease and disability, and generally keeping Rockcastle County towns well for a long time, but there's a lot that still needs doing. Maybe we should have said 'amazing' instead of wonderful for the services they have with such limited staff, inadequate facilities, and extremely low budget, have been truly amazing."

Have you ever wondered how one nurse could possibly give so many shots, hold so many conferences throughout the county, visit all our schools and still manage to find time to make home visits to tuberculosis cases, mothers and babies, do a weekly radio program and talk to groups, and all the other hundred-and-one things that the public health Nurse does?

Had you realized that all sanitation work-inspecting restaurants, groceries, testing milk and water supplies, etc.-is done by one sanitarian who spends only three days a week in Rockcastle County? We share our sanitarian with another county because our health department budget is inadequate to pay him for more than three days a week.

Can you imagine how one clerk manages to keep Rockcastle County's "Human statistics" - records of births and deaths, and reportable diseases besides handling the other necessary health department records which tell such things as how many shots, and what kind, each of our children has had, and when the next shot is due? In addition the also takes care of the health department's correspondence, answers telephone, receives the visitors, and many other duties.

It is well known that our county has only two private physicians to take care of its 11,400 citizens. Yes, we have a County Health Officer, too, but did you know that on the present budget we can only afford his services one day a week?

It's true, our health department has been doing an amazing job, especially considering that its staff, equipment, and budget are so terribly limited.

The health department is for our benefit, to maintain and improve the health of every man, woman and child in Rockcastle County. The Rockcastle County Health Department is ours and it's time for us to begin taking an active interest in it, and actively supporting it. It's up to us to see that it is adequately staffed and maintained. If we want better health for our county, it's our responsibility to provide better public health services.

Now is our chance. We can do something to improve our county's health. Every one of us who is eligible to vote can go to the polls on November 5 and vote "YES" for public health.
