



Can you imagine how one clerk manages to keep Rockcostle County's "Human statistics" - records of births and deeths, and reportable diseases besides handling the other necessory health department records which tell such things as how many shots, and what kind, each of our children has had, and when the next shot is due? In addition she also takes care of the health department's correspondence, answers the telephone, receives the visitors, and many other duties.

it is well known that our county has only two private physicians to take care of it's 11,600 citi-zens. Yes, we have a County Health Officer, too, but did you know that on the present budget we can only afford his services one day a week?
