## Water Level Is Very Low

Mount Vernon City Mayor Carl Brown and the City Council expressed concern Wednesday, that the reservoir of water is lower than it has been in many years. They appeal to the public to use their good judgment in water conservation practices.

They report, after investigating Wednesday, that the upper third of the reservoir is completely out of the water and dry. A conservative estimate is that water level is less than half of its usual volume.

Water level has been receding at the rate of 1/4 inch per day for the last 20 days and will go down faster as the level becomes lower.

Reports are that only one other time in the history of Mt. Vernon has water level been as low as it now is. Some services have been stopped washing cars until the shortage eases. Others will be asked to do so.

## Judge Carter Says -- We Have A Vote Of Confidence

I want to thank the people who voted for the courthouse and jail. I consider it a vote of confidence. There was a big majority given for this project.

Although we didn't get the necessary two-thirds of the votes cast for this bond issue we did get 68.8 percent of the votes cast, which is a wonderful majority at any time or in any election. When I know 68.8 percent of the people are behind me, I am not afraid to go ahead.

About five percent of the people who voted against this project are my personal enemies. About 10 percent voted against it because they thought they were doing right and the balance didn't thoroughly understand the issue. The people who didn't vote in it did so by oversight or by the voting machine being something new to them which they didn't understand.

The courthouse and jail will be built. The bond issue was just a matter of financing the project on a cheaper rate of interest and over a shorter period of time.

The architect has been in my office and informs me the plans will be finished by Nov. 25 and he will go immediately to Atlanta, Ga., to have them approved there. Bids will then be let for the job.

The Fiscal Agent has also been here and said sale of revenue bonds will be advertised and sold about Jan. 1, 1964. He assured me there will be no trouble as everything has been approved and our grant made.

Thursday, Clyde Linville and I went to Frankfort to talk with Mr. Magill, the State Local Finance Officer, and he assured us that everything was in order and that it would be foolish to not take advantage of this \$232,000 grant. He also said we could quote him on the above matter.


