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## Production Standard Raised For Manufactured Milk

"Kentucky standards for milk production and processing must be equal to or superior to the standards of those states in which our products are sold," said Shelby Johnson, director of the Health Department's Food and Drug Program. "Otherwise, our milk and milk products can be excluded from these states in non-compliance with their laws and regulations."

"These new standards controlling production, packing, transportation, and sales are equal to, or superior to, those of the states in which Kentucky milk is sold."

"Other states are watching us in this new program, and if it works in Kentucky, many of them will copy it," Johnson said.

Last year, gross income from milk produced on Kentucky farms totaled \$101,096,000, the Kentucky Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Louisville reported. This total included 2,195,000,000 pounds of milk sold to plants and dealers for \$33,410,000, 1,030,000 pounds of cream to these outlets for \$494,000, 23,000,000 quarts of milk and cream reported by farmers for \$4,876,000; and 315,000,000 pounds of milk and cream used on the farms where they were produced and valued at \$12,316,000.

These statistics rank Kentucky second only to Texas in the dairy industry among 16 South Atlantic and South Central states.

Milk for manufacturing purposes is used primarily for cheese and evaporated milk. Kentucky last year for

the milk-for-manufacturing, U. of K. and the Health Department designed the new standards. These were submitted to the dairy industry and approved.

On that committee were Mennen, as chairman, and Dale Scott, Louisville, and Ernest Harris Crestwood, from the Farm Bureau. Representing U. of K. were Dr. T. R. Freeman and Wallace King. Industry's members were Herb Glenn, Maysville; K. F. Dietiker and Hewel Blair, Bowling Green; F. E. Horse Cave; Ed Pugh, Glasgow; Robert C. Faulkner, Litchfield; Herman Jones, Stanford; Charles Bowers, Newport; H. V. Marshall, Hopkinsville; J. H. Wallston, Murray; L. L. Phillips, Springfield; James B. Williams, head field man for Kraft Foods Company, Garland, Texas; J. C. Flake, chief of sanitary standards for the Evaporated Milk Association, Chicago; and Cecil E. White, Murfreesboro, Tenn., manager of the Carnation Company receiving plant there for Kentucky producers.

Previously, the State had helped the rapidly-expanding dairy industry by creating a State Milk Marketing Commission. This group prevents unfair competition among milk handlers, particularly by larger processors squeezing out smaller competitors.

Kentucky's 35,000 producers of milk for manufacturing purposes will benefit from new production standards, Dr. Russell E. Teague, commissioner of the State Department of Health, has announced.

Better quality milk and a steady increase in markets are the two biggest advantages of the new standards,

he added. This new program to upgrade milk for manufacturing is effective for plants January 4, 1964, and for farms July 4, 1964. It was designed by the Health Department in cooperation with the Kentucky dairy industry.

Gov. Bert Combs, in a conference here with a special committee representing the Dairy Products Association of Kentucky, Inc., the University of Kentucky Dairy Division, and the Kentucky Farm Bureau, said that the State "would accept responsibility in starting this important program."

He will appropriate from his contingency fund the money necessary for the remainder of the fiscal year. The cost for special State inspectors is estimated at \$35,000 per year.

K. E. Mennen, Springfield, vice president of D. P. A. K., estimated that the industry's cost in field supervisory personnel will be about \$500,000 per year.

### Kill Weeds In Lawns

From mid-September to

mid-November is a wonderful time for killing dandelions and plantain in lawns. Also it is a good time to begin treating for chickweed and henbit, according to County Agent Lee Durham.

The materials to use are 2, 4-D, 2, 4, 5-T and Silvex or combinations of these. 2, 4-D used alone is good, but a combination of two of these materials kills a wider range of weeds. It is especially desirable to include Silvex if chickweed is to be killed.

One advantage of fall application of these selective weed killers is that with the coming of cooler weather, they are not so likely to volatilize and thus, damage desirable plants.

One word of caution: These selective weed killers should not be used on grass

seedlings that are only a few weeks old.

All these materials 2, 4-D, 2, 4, 5-T and Silvex, should be used exactly according to the directions on containers.

**E & H Bond Sales Highest in 8 Years**  
 During October, sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds in Rockcastle County were \$6,237 bringing the cumulative sales for the year to \$89,004.

For Kentucky, sales of both series for the month totaled \$3,976,659 while cumulative sales reached \$46,985,802 or 82.8 percent of the State's annual goal of \$56,700,000.

Nationally, combined sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds reached \$395 million

which was 9.8 percent above those of a year ago and the highest sales for the month of October in 8 years—since 1955. At the same time, net redemptions were \$323 million plus accrued interest of \$59 million bringing gross redemptions to \$382 million, an increase of 4 percent over those of a year ago.

The total amount outstanding of both series was \$46,843 million, a new high and an investment gain of \$1,844 million, the largest gain in any 10-month period since 1955.

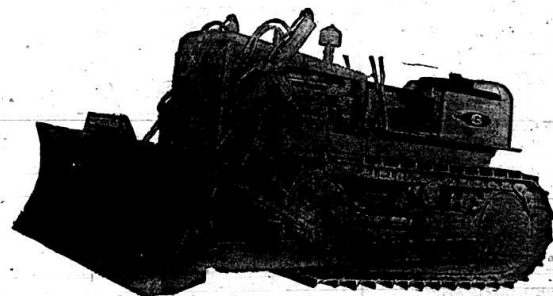
