## Soil Conservation Essay Contest Now Underway In High Schools

Kentucky school principals have until Monday, Dec. 2, to turn in entries in the 1963 Soil Conservation Essay Contest. The 20th annual competition sponsored by The Courier-Journal, The Louisville Times and WIAS, Inc., offers \$3,475 in U. S. Savings Bonds to Kentucky grade and high school students who write on the subject, "Forest Conservation - How It Can Benefit My Community." The writer of the best essay will receive \$200 in Savings Bonds. The second place winner will receive \$100 in bonds and the third place winner a \$100 bond. The three top winners, along with their parents and teacher, also will be guests of honor at the 26th annual Farm Awards Luncheon in Louisville where the prizes will be awarded. This all-expense-paid trip will take place next February. In addition to the state-

## Tobacco Sales Average High

The Blue Grass Burley Belt made up of seven Central Kentucky local sales centers outside Fayette Co., reported an average price of \$29.94 a hundred pounds. This is only three cents less than the opening-day figure, last year. The average was established after the sale of 4,893,896 pounds of tobacco, for which growers received a gross \$3,073,430.49. No tobacco was sold Monday in keeping with the mourning attitude of the nation for the late President John F. Kennedy. Sales will continue daily for an extra half hour until the Christmas recess in order to make up for the time lost. In general the crop is reported poorer than expected but still reports an increase over last year. The Federal-State Market News Service, which compiles reports throughout the eight-state sales belt, said prices by individual grades were lower than on opening day last year for about two thirds of the grades. Losses ranged chiefly from \$4 to \$7 a hundred and were seen mainly in leaf, tips and nondescript. Increases occurred principally for flings and 1 u g s and generally were \$1 - \$2 per hundred.

## Mount Vernon Joins Nation In Mourning President's Death

President John F. Kennedy has been buried in Arlington Cemetery after being assassinated last Friday in Dallas, Texas. The accused assassin, Lee H. Oswald was fatally shot while being moved from the Dallas jail by Jack Ruby, a Dallas night club operator. Lyndon B. Johnson, former vice-president of the United States, has been sworn in as the new president. He was sworn in at 11:35 a. m. Monday in mourning the death of President Kennedy. Mt. Vernon joined the rest of the nation and world Monday in mourning the death of President Kennedy. Practically all businesses closed for the day. Religious services were conducted throughout the day over WRVK by various County ministers. (Millions have watched the funeral procession on television but it seems fitting that we recollect some of the events as a tribute to a great man. Ed. Note.) Washington, Nov. 25. — The world's men of title and power went side by side to John F. Kennedy's grave Monday in a demonstration of tribute and unity the living President never enjoyed. Then they turned, Kings and Communists, dark men and light men, in sash and turban and uniform and morning frock, to pay their respects to a widow in the White House and to queue for the first words with the new leader of the world's most powerful nation, President Lyndon B. Johnson. De Gaulle in Forefront Towering above them all in the procession of the famous and in the attentions of the overwhelming American hosts was the tall and uniformed figure of Charles de Gaulle, President of France. De Gaulle, who had been among the first dignitaries to arrive Sunday, was among the first to leave Washington Monday night, but only after he had become the first chief of state to confer privately, if briefly, with Johnson. The two men had met 30 months ago in Paris and De Gaulle showed great deference to the then Vice-President. "What have you come to hear?" he asked Johnson coldly. ## Hunting Season Schedule Told

Hunting seasons that were interrupted by the recent fire hazards in Kentucky have been amended so that hunters will be permitted to enjoy the full number of days originally designated. Minor changes in the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, reported following a poll of members of the State Wildlife Resources Commission. The archery deer hunting season closing was extended from Nov. 24 to Nov. 20 because hunters lost 15 days. A later season opens on Dec. 6 and extends through Dec. 15. Hunting is permitted in the 48 open counties. The first phase of the squirrel season was due to close on Oct. 31 but hunters lost 13 days. These days have been added to the end of the second phase of the season which opened in both the eastern and western zones on Nov. 21. The new ending date for the western area is Dec. 15 while for the eastern zone the season will end on Dec. 31. Twelve days were lost to the archery deer and turkey (Continued on page 8)

## Livingston Defeats Tynar 65 - 52

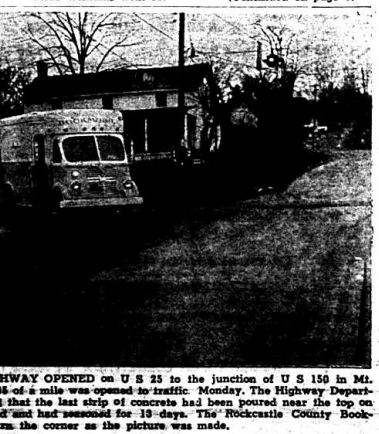

## Everyone Wonders - Why ?

During the Thanksgiving season most of us think how fortunate we are, between bites of turkey and cranberry sauce, that we live in the land of plenty. This year we have reason to consider with more somber sincerity our blessings.

We all know that "the Lord moves in mysterious ways, his wonders to perform." Could it be that He had allowed such tragedy as the assassination of our president so near the Thanksgiving season to remind us that we who have such abundance can lose it in one deft stroke.

Americans take too much for granted, their privileges in our land of surplus. We think the best thought we have heard on the whole sordid murder was made by a bitter political enemy of Kennedy. He said the heinous act transcends any personal disagreement or political issue. The act of murder must have been committed by a mad man, he added.

Kennedy had, seemingly, everything - money, power, influence, a fine family, good health and religious faith. Mrs. Kennedy has lost her husband but in so doing has enthralled people of the world with her composure. Her example of fortitude, reverence, queenly and heroic endurance surely must be born of strength which comes from some inner faith. She has lost and she has gained the sympathy and admiration of people in all lands.

Everyone, we have been shocked, unable to believe and grieved at the colossal audacity and unparitotic act committed upon our president. The political party he belonged to was covered over by the fact that he is our Chief. He represents, as president, our Country. Therefore, any act committed upon his person brings humiliation and disgrace to us all.

Perhaps, the Lord, in his infinite wisdom is bringing us a difficult lesson in humility. There is surely also a lesson for everyone in the composure, dignity and devotion of Mrs. Kennedy.

Last Friday afternoon an assassin's bullet took the life of President John F. Kennedy in the city of Dallas, Texas, in the United States of America. As news spread quickly across the United States and around the world, many people could not believe what they were hearing over the radio and television - that the President had been shot.

Immediately many people turned over in their minds the question, What kind of a person could do a thing like this? Who was he? What was he doing there? What could possess a man to commit such a crime?

As the final word came that the president was dead

many motorists who were driving along the highway and listening to the car radios, pulled over to the side of the road to calm themselves. Merchants left the store to be near a radio. Crown men with their checks red and eyes moist, talked in a low voice of the tragedy. I do not know of a single person who was not shocked and disturbed by the killing of President Kennedy.

Lee H. Oswald, 24-year-old Dallas worker, was arrested and accused of the murder only a short time after the fatal shot was fired. I wonder if the killer knew what he was taking the life of a great young man who was a friend of the poor, the young and the old, a man who worked so hard for peace, and in promoting the American way of life.

So, time must go on. The Presidency has been taken over by Lyndon B. Johnson, a man who knows the problems of the administration and their programs. He is an experienced leader in the Senate. Since taking office as vice-president he has had first hand knowledge of foreign affairs. We feel sure that he has more knowledge of the American system than any other vice-president before him. As the whole nation watched television, last week end, many turned over in their minds, Why? Many people thought of Mrs. Kennedy and her small children, but there was still no answer.

This week as the torch of national leadership is passed on to Lyndon Baines Johnson, after the youthful president was shot down by a sniper's bullet and his accused slayer met death only two days later by a bullet fired at close range, we still wonder, Why?
