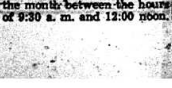
Airman Tallant, who enlisted in the Air Force a short time ago, has completed his initial basic military training here. He is a 1963 graduate of Mount Vernon High School.

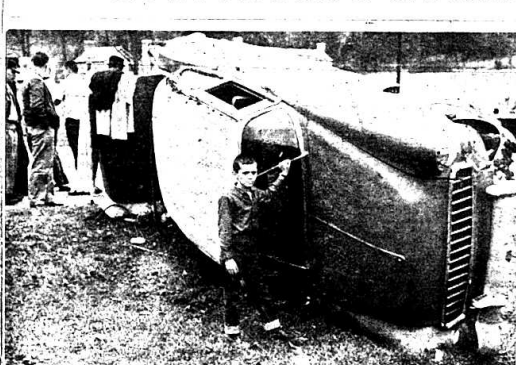

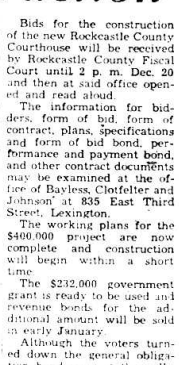

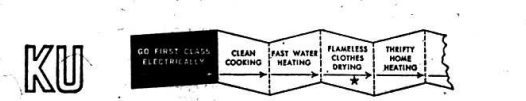
