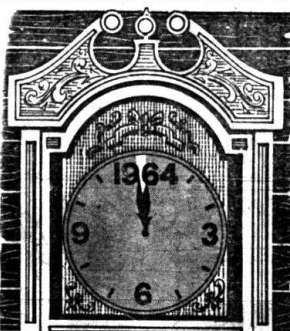

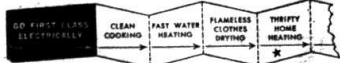

### Water Supply Critically Low

Mt. Vernon Water Superintendent Jack Craig today appealed to all water users to conserve water as much as they can. "The Mt. Vernon water supply is getting critical," he said.

A main water line to the reservoir broke all day yesterday morning and West Mt. Vernon's water supply had to be cut off until repairs were made.

Mt. Vernon is using about 110,000 gallons of water per day. This is the same amount that was used before Christmas, some 90,000 gallons daily.

The snow has reportedly not helped the water supply and the freeze has been detrimental.

### Brothead

The water supply at Brothead is still very low. The rumor that school in Brothead was closed is only a rumor. The school is open but that stringent conservation measures are employed in the school, on building a new pump house at Moore's spring to pump additional water to the reservoir and to increase their supply. A. H. "Cap" Reynolds, Brothead's water superintendent said, "I don't see any other temporary, emergency measure."

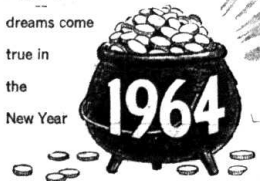


