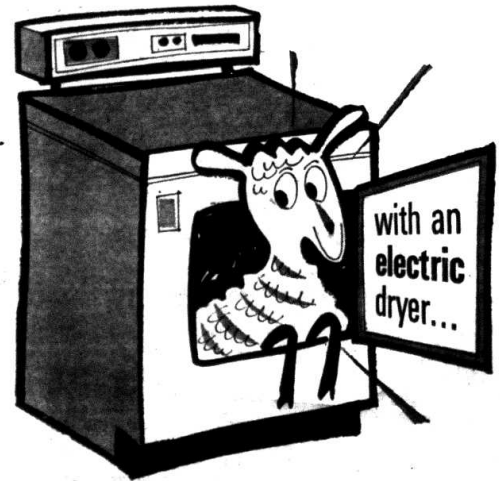

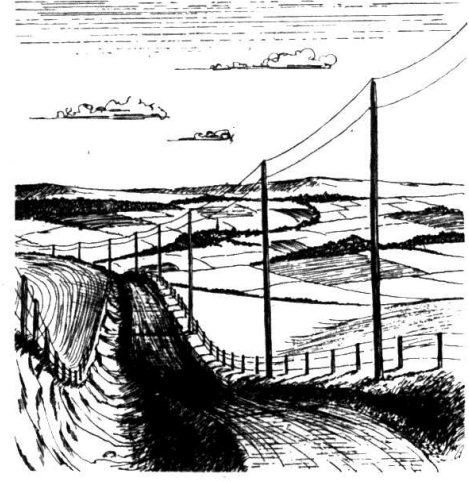

"When we signed up there was no electric power at any of our churches on Lucky Fork or at Mistletoe. Now we have dependable electric service at all our church centers and at the same rate as we would pay if they were in town."

Let's destroy some myths about rural electric co-ops:
The average revenue to rural electric co-ops is \$400 to \$500 per mile of line per year. The average revenue to private utilities is approximately \$6000 per mile per year. The average number of consumers on a co-op line is 3.3 members per mile. Investor-owned utilities serve 30 to 40 consumers for every mile of line.

Co-ops are not government owned, operated or supported. When they were organized in 1935, capital and operating money was made available by the Rural Electrification Administration on a 35-year loan basis. All this money must be repaid—with interest; and Kentucky's RECC's are up-to-date or ahead on payment. The same monies, same loans and same interest rates were also made available to investor-owned companies who chose to ignore the farmers' needs and the loan opportunities.

Lunch Program In Rural Schools

Fourteen schools in Rockcastle county will take part in an expanded special federal-state assistance program to provide hot school lunches to county children.

The expanded school lunch program started this month, after visits in December to various county officials and schools during which demonstrations were held showing teachers how hot lunches might be prepared.

Under the expanded program, children in many one and two room schools in remote areas of Kentucky will receive hot school lunches for the first time.

C. E. Beving, Director of the School Lunch Division, Kentucky Bureau of Instruction, said that it is hoped that 400 children in 48 schools of 8 counties will be receiving hot lunches under the program by February.

The basic food items for the expanded program—canned chicken, pork in natural slices, chopped beef, peanut butter—are provided by the Food Distribution Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service. USDA will also provide a maximum reimbursement of 15 cents for each lunch served.

The Kentucky Department of Education will administer the funds and distribute the food.

The expanded program is a joint effort of the Kentucky Department of Education and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Superintendent Miracle said the fourteen Rockcastle County Schools to be included in the special assistance program are: Blue Springs, Buffalo, Cave Ridge, Chestnut Ridge, Owen Allen, Poplar Gap, Red Hill, Sowers, Victory, Well Hope, New Chestnut Ridge, and Sand Springs.

Mt. Vernon Bank Installs Electronic Machine

Electronic machines for automatic processing of bank papers are now in operation at The Bank of Mt. Vernon, according to an announcement by N. M. Smock, president.

The new equipment, manufactured by the Burroughs Corporation, ended an era of traditional bank methods with electronic service taking over many of the time-consuming, manual operations of deposit accounting.

Mr. Smock said his bank expects to achieve new levels of efficiency and accuracy in its bookkeeping operations with the Burroughs Bookkeeping Machine, an advanced machine which automatically verifies the posting and printing of every item involved in deposit accounting.

The compact machine occupies little floor space, but does a big job, he said. It registers accumulated items of old and new balances, verifies correct account selection and posting, and determines the overdraft status of the account, all in rapid, single-run operation. The Electronic Bookkeeper utilizes an advanced magnetic stripe technique to store the account number, item count, account balance, line selection, alert notice and code checking information.

In addition to better customer services, automation will bring new economies to banking operations, the officials predicted, by reducing operator training time and eliminating many of the routine steps of verification.

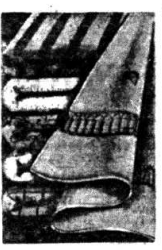

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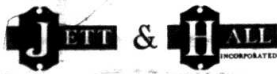
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
