

Let's destroy some myths about rural electric co-ops: The average revenue to rural electric co-ôps is \$400 to \$500 per mile of line per year. The average revenue to private utilities is approximately \$6000 per mile per year. The average number of consumers on a co-op line is 3.3 members per mile. Investor owned utilities serve 30 to 40 consumers for every mile of line.

Co-ops are not government owned, operated or supported. When they were organized in 1935, capital and operating money was made available by the Rural Electrification Administration on a 35-year loan basis. All this money must be repaid—with interest; and Kentucky's RECC's are up-to-date or ahead on payment. The same monies, same loans and same interest rates were also made available to investor-owned power companies who chose to ignore the farmers' needs and the loan apportunities.
