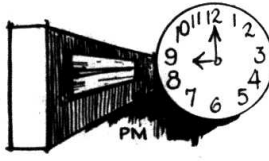

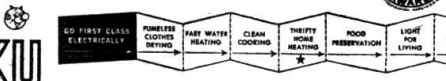

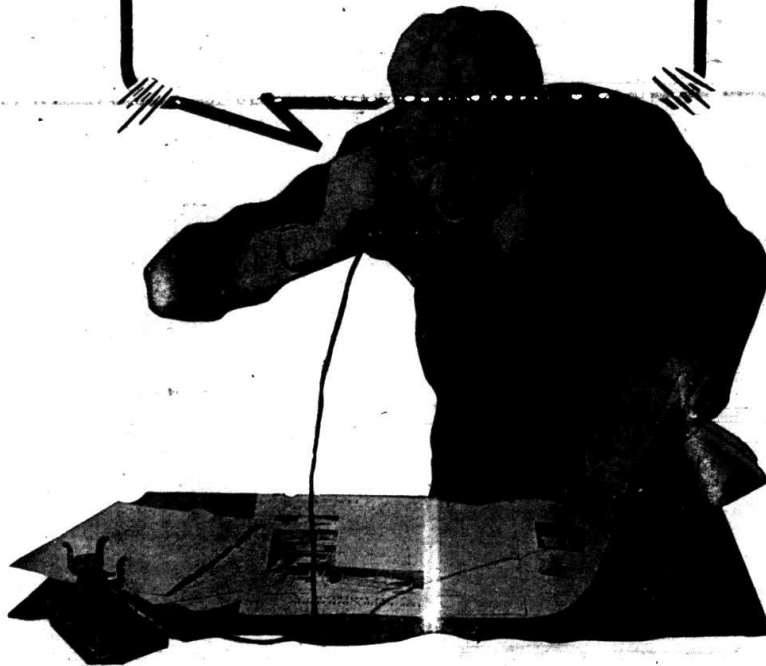

He is married to the former Miss Kathleen Bradshaw. They have a son, Billy Starr, 9.

Dr. Carter stated that he is a strong advocate of federal aid to education. He said he will support conservation measures and increases in medical aid to the aged and disabled under the Kerr-Mills Bill.

He declared that he has been urged to enter the Congressional race, and has been pledged support by party leaders of most of the district's 20 counties.
