Stille, Jr., Louisville, former chief justice of the Court of Appeals; Charles W. Farnsley, Democratic former Mayor of Louisville, and Judge Marlow W. Cook, Republican County Judge of Jefferson County.

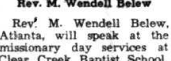

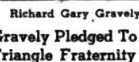
Meridians To Select Star Citizens

KU Stock Now Listed On New York Exchange

Common stock of Kentucky Utilities Company, 52-year-old utility serving 240,000 electric customers, was listed for trading Feb. 17 on the New York Stock Exchange. The ticker symbol is KU.

Taking part in the initial trading ceremony were three KU officials: F. L. Fairman, president; A. Clay Stewart, vice president; and E. D. Adams, assistant and treasurer, all of Lexington, and Keith Funston, president of the New York Stock Exchange.

The first two 100-share blocks of KU stock sold on the Exchange were purchased by Mr. Fairman and Mr. Stewart, in the ceremony which marked the start of trading.

Listed on the NYSE are 5,267,500 shares of the company's common stock. Kentucky Utilities common stock has been traded on the over-the-counter market since 1949 when it became an independent operating company. Its 48 percent preferred stock has been listed on the Philadelphia-Baltimore-Washington Stock Exchange for a number of years.

Kentucky Utilities became the only Lexington-based company and one of the few in Kentucky listed on the New York Exchange and lists a select group of some 1,200 corporations including most of the nation's leading industrial and utility firms whose shares are listed on the NYSE.

KU has 40,701 shareholders distributed throughout the United States and in several foreign countries.

In order to qualify for listing, KU met a series of strict Exchange requirements concerning standards of business conduct and practice, and of full information on all phases of company operation.

Tobacco Allotment Allocated 10 Percent

Burley tobacco allotments for most farms in 1964 will be about 10 percent less than for the 1963 crop, Mr. Wilson, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, has announced.

The State allotment for 1964-crop Burley tobacco is 203,996.72 acres, which represents the State's share of the national allotment of 314,263 acres. It compares with the State allotment of 248,062.26 acres for the 1963 Burley crop.

Allotments for some farms on which the Burley acreage has increased in recent years are less than 75 percent of the farm's allotment will be reduced to about 10 percent of the 1963 allotment. Except where marketing quota violations are involved, however, the law provides that no allotment may be reduced below the smallest of (1) the allotment established for the farm for 1963, (2) one percent of the cropland in the farm.

The chairman explained that substantial increases in per-acre yields in recent years necessitated the reductions in farm acreage allotments. During the 3 year period 1960-62, Burley yields averaged 1,820 pounds per acre, yields for the past three crops have averaged 2,097 pounds per acre. With increased yields per acre, a smaller acreage is needed to obtain the desired production.

As in the past, a small acreage has been reserved for establishing allotments for farms having no Burley tobacco acreage history during the past 5 years, for adjusting inequities.

Prices for the 1964 crop of burley tobacco will be supported at an average of 58.3 cents per pound. The 1963-crop prices were supported at an average of 58.3 cents per pound.

Mrs. Matlock explained that clothing forwarded to Frankfort will be placed in the clothing shop, a new volunteer project which is part of the hospital's effort to replace regimented institutional life with the feel of community living.

The clothing project is a logical follow-up to the recent \$1,000 given to the hospital by the Brodhead Sheriffs Association. The money is being used to buy materials for construction of 264 wardrobes for teenage boys and men.
