Seaman Harris In Operation Backpack

Prior to the assault, aircraft of the Seventh Fleet will soften beach defenses. In addition, support ships will conduct anti-submarine warfare exercises and the area surrounding the beachhead will be cleared of any obstruction and mines.

"Backpack" is similar to those exercises conducted periodically by units of the Seventh Fleet with SEATO and other allied nations in the Far East to improve their proficiency in coordinated amphibious warfare operations and to maintain working relationships with allied nations.

County Agent's Notes

WHY TEST SOIL

Buying fertilizers should be like buying groceries. Before going to the grocery store the homemaker checks the pantry and the refrigerator to determine what is needed. In essence she is taking inventory of what she has so that she can buy foods that are needed.

Likewise a farmer should make an inventory of his soil before he goes to the fertilizer dealer. He makes this inventory by having his soil tested in the local or nearby soil testing laboratory.

If a farmer expects to get the greatest returns on each dollar invested in fertilizers, he must be sure that the fertilizer has the plant nutrients in it that his soil needs and in the proper balance for his soil. Also he must be sure that the land is properly limed so that whatever plant nutrients are applied are not tied up in the soil but are available for plant use.

A soil test made on a good soil sample will tell the farmer if limestone is needed and how much, if any, phosphate and potash fertilizers are needed.

If a farmer applies fertilizers to a strongly acid soil, a large portion of the nutrients are not usable by growing plants. Therefore, the first step in good farming is to take care of the liming

needs as determined by a soil test. Furthermore, farmers should avoid over-liming since the plant nutrients are not usable by growing plants in such soils.

Many times farmers do not get response to the fertilizer used because they did not buy the nutrient or nutrients that were limiting crop production. For instance, a phosphate fertilizer will not increase yields if either nitrogen or potash are in short supply. Therefore, farmers should supply those plant nutrients that are needed to balance the ration for the crop to be grown.

TAKE GOOD SOIL SAMPLES

Farmer—Be sure the soil sample you take to the county agent's office represents the field or area to be limed and fertilized. It takes time to get good soil samples, but it is worth it. A farmer who is not willing to spend the time and effort to get good samples should take no sample at all.

A soil sample should be made up of small amounts of soil from at least ten spots in the field, garden, or lawn. The spots should be spread over the entire area that is being sampled. From each spot, take a thin slice or core of soil from the top of the ground to a depth of six inches or as deep as the area is usually plowed. Put several small cores in a clean box or pail, crumble and mix well. Take about a pint of this soil for the soil sample. Spread this sample on a clean paper to dry. It can be dried in the sun, in the basement or on the porch. Do not dry it in the oven before an open fire or over a radiator.

Once the soil sample is dry, mash it into very fine crumbs with the hands and put it in a paper bag or box. Put your name, address, the field name or number on the outside and take it to your county agent. Be sure to fill out the information sheet.

Give the county agent the soil sample well in advance of the time you want the results. It takes time to test soil. The time will be shorter if the sample is dry, well crumbled and labeled properly.

Ask your county agent for Miscellaneous 197 or L-aflet 39 for instructions on how to take good soil samples.

RENOVATE PASTURES THIS SPRING

The best pastures have a clover in them. The cheapest pastures to maintain have a clover in them.

Clovers can be put back in grass pastures if:

1. The soil is tested and any lime, phosphate and potash is applied before diking.
2. The land is diked by March 1 and diked to the extent that no more than 40 to 60 percent of the grass is not uprooted.
3. The clover seed is broadcast and covered before April 1. Red clover (6 pounds per acre) and ladino clover (one

pound per acre) is a good mixture to put in old grass sods.

4. The grass is kept short by pasturing or mowing until the clovers start growing.
5. When the clover is putting up true leaves, livestock are removed for two or three weeks to give the clover a chance to establish itself.
6. No nitrogen fertilizer is used. Nitrogen will promote the grass to an extent that it will smother the clover.

Pastures renovated this spring will produce more feed this year than the pastures left alone. They will produce twice as much feed next year.

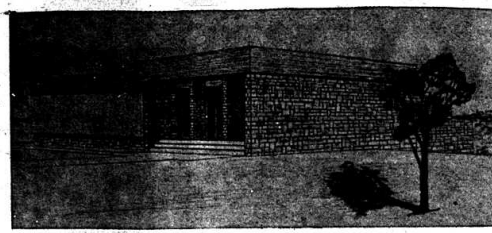

Museum To Have Civil War Relics

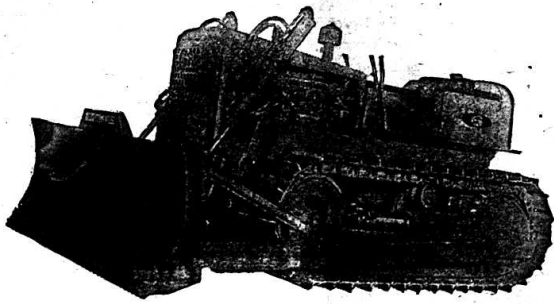
