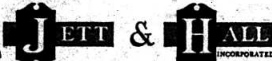

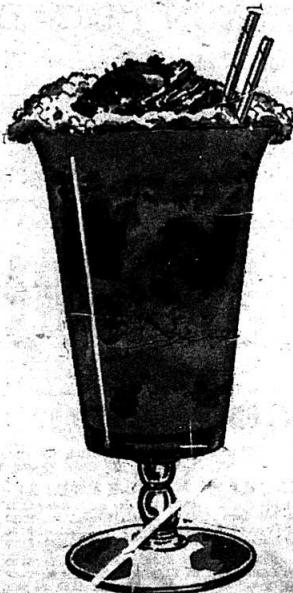

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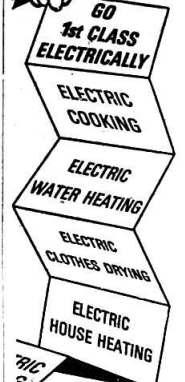

School Attendance Increased This Year

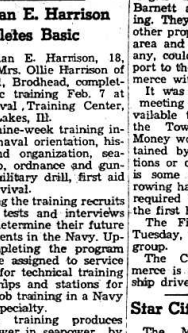
Average daily attendance in Kentucky's public schools for the first two months of the current school year was 63,826, an increase of 3,326 over the same period last year.

A report issued by the Department of Education on Tuesday represents a growth in average daily attendance of 1.8 percent over 1962-63, when average daily attendance for the same period was 62,500.

The Education Department's Division of Finance estimated this growth will cost the State approximately \$2.9 million for the additional 1,326 students. The money will be allotted school districts through the Minimum Foundation Program.

Rockcastle County had a six tenths percent increase in daily attendance this the first two months of this year over last year. Average daily attendance in 1962-63 was 9,081.8. In 63-64 it has been 9,310.1.

acidity is reduced slowly. For example, it may take three or four years for limestone to change a soil pH from 5 to 6. Thus, if a farmer applies limestone one year and has his soil tested the next year, the acidity is reduced very little. The limestone is at work and more is not needed.

Second, when phosphate fertilizers are applied, much of the phosphorus becomes so fixed in the soil that growing plants can't get it. Neither will this fixed phosphorus show up in a soil test. However, this phosphorus is released gradually and then growing plants can use it. Thus, if a farmer made heavy applications of phosphate fertilizers one or two years ago, he should have enough of the fixed phosphorus released during a growing season to give a good crop yield.

Third, a soil test on a field where rock phosphate has recently been applied will show more phosphorus than is actually usable by growing plants.

Fourth, a heavy clay soil needs more limestone than a sandy soil even though a soil test shows the same acidity level. Also more phosphorus is fixed in the clay soil.

Fifth, there is no soil test for nitrogen. The county agent makes his recommendation for nitrogen from the past cropping and fertilizer history. If a farmer plans to plow under a good clover-grass mixture and grow corn on the land, he can depend on about 60 pounds of nitrogen from the soil. A good grass-clover sod will provide about 20 pounds of nitrogen to the corn, but a farmer should count on little or no nitrogen from the soil where corn is grown continuously. Thus, the county agent wants the above information

PAST HISTORY AND A SOIL TEST

Farmers will get better fertilizer and liming recommendations when they have soil tests if they will fill out the information sheet provided by the county agent.

This information about the soil itself along with past cropping and treatment history is important from several standpoints.

First, the county agent knows that when limestone is applied to a field, the

so that he can give farmers credit for what they have already done to their soil. The past cropping and treatment history will not cause the county agent to increase fertilizer recommendations above what the soil test calls for but it may cause him to lower them.

Be fair to yourself and your county agent. Give him the information he needs to make good soil treatment recommendations.

Feed Grain Sign-Up Reported Heavy

The feed grain sign-up in all areas of the State is exceeding the expectations of the State Officials, according to R. O. Wilson, Chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

After two weeks of sign-up, farmers are still standing in line to file applications to divert their feed grain acreage in many of the ASC county offices. Wilson stated that if the present rate of sign-up continues, this year's participation will exceed last year's by at least 20 percent. Sign-up began Feb. 10 and continues through March 27.

To be eligible to participate, a farmer must divert at least a minimum of 20 percent of his crop, barley and grain sorghum feed grain base. The maximum diversion is 25 acres or 50 percent of the producer's base, whichever is larger.

Additional farmers who will be paid to rates who divert 40 percent or more of their base. Wilson stated that an important feature of the program is the advance payment. Farmers may secure 50 percent of their payment to be earned at the time they file their application.
