SECTION II. That this ordinance shall not apply to Main Street or any other street where there are specially designated areas for parking.

SECTION III. Violation of Section I of this ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor, or with a penalty, upon conviction, of a fine of ten (\$10.00) dollars for the first offense and not less than five (\$5.00) dollars for each subsequent offense.

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
