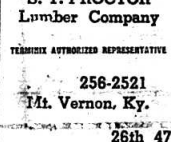

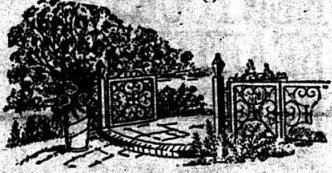

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James E. McCracken, forty-year-old London optometrist and native Laurel Countyan spoke out clearly today on what the issues are to be in this campaign for Congress in the Fifth District.

McCracken says that he is the only one running who has spoken out for Medi-care for the senior citizens and that this would be the key issue in this election. He states that his main opponent (whose name he doesn't wish to advertise by mentioning his name) has already spent thousands of dollars in his personal candidates all over the district to announce, so that he can ease in and cast one vote against Medi-care. These people opposed to Medi-care are the same ones who opposed to REA and to Federal Aid to Education. Furthermore, McCracken states that he is for including all retired people under a Medi-care, especially teachers and railroad employees.

He says that Social Security coupled with Medi-care will eliminate great pain, suffering and create decent hospitals and nursing homes for the elderly. This will pay the proper respect to our old folks as commanded by the Bible, says McCracken.

He states further that anyone can see that any administration in Washington, D. C., caters to minority groups and power blocks and he doubts the government will ever turn its attention to the mountains until the congressmen from the Appalachians form a voting block (regardless of party) and vote as such on key issues. Furthermore, he will attempt to organize an Appalachian group if elected.

McCracken says the government needs to create an authority (similar to T. V. A.) to turn the mountains from a land of desolation to one of the most beautiful wooded and lake areas in the world with vacation spots and game preserves. He states that money invested in non-productive land throughout the mountains and put in timber would later pay for itself tenfold in increased value of land and lumber. McCracken says private enterprise can't do this and that it's the government's duty when such conditions exist. He estimated a long range spending program of some fifty-billion by the authority in the Appalachian region to bring it into the 20th century economically.

He compares the economic conditions in the mountains to contingency in a healthy person and says it must be eliminated regardless of the cost so that the country can be whole again.

McCracken, a veteran of World War II, says that the war did not end with the signing of the peace. The battle had only begun in serving to the needs of disabled veterans, widows, and orphans of the war. He says to this cause he has been dedicated, having served some ten years as Service Officer for the American Legion and that as a member of the National Rehabilitative Commission of the American Legion did cause to become low certain legislation benefiting veterans. Congressman Siler and Senator Cooper both voted for this and know this to be a fact.

McCracken is married and father of four children. He is a Baptist, member of Knights of Pythias and is active as a Service Officer for the American Legion, and sight conservation work with the Lions International and the Knights Templar of the masonic order. He resides at London, Kentucky.

DeMarcus Reports On Political Policy

Representative William H. DeMarcus of Stanford asked that this Republican policy stand covering the action in the 1964 session be released to his constituency. The Republican Party, acting as the responsible opposition and the only duly elected official critics, feel qualified to make their own assessment of the 1964 General Assembly.

From the Republican point of view, this session will go down in the record books as a notorious "Do Nothing" session, but we must point out that there were some pieces of legislation worthy of note. The minority party places the major legislation in three categories:

- (1) Educational and teacher's benefits, including a teacher tenure law, increased teacher's pay, and the passage of a major portion of the K. E. A. program.
- (2) The Constitutional Revision Assembly to draft a proposed new Constitution. Although having had only one meeting, we feel that this is a progressive step in modernizing Kentucky's ancient and outmoded Constitution.
- (3) New strip mining law for conservation and preservation of natural resources. However, it must be noted that existing strip mine laws were not adequately enforced in the past.

(4) The formation of a "Widow's" committee to investigate State spending. This committee has already uncovered Henry Ward's private elevator and a secret financial dynasty controlled by Commissioner Felix Joyner.

(5) Reorientation toward more economy in State government, and a renewed look at the business interests over the State, brought about by unified Republican insistence on sound management and fiscal responsibility.

(6) Absentee voting laws. The "defeat Senator Morton failed now restores voting privileges to all eligible Kentuckians.

(1) Senate Bill 23. The fiscal analysis research committee to advise on State government spending. This bill was beaten in the House by Governor Breathitt and his Administration by a very narrow margin.
