These letters explain how the City and County governments and the Chamber of Commerce will cooperate in the development of the sites for industry. In other letters contained in the brochure, the local utility companies explain availability of existing facilities and their ability and willingness to extend facilities to the sites. Copies of the brochure have been given to the State Chamber of Commerce, the Kentucky Department of Commerce, railroads and utilities which have an active industrial development department.

Members of the Chamber of Commerce recently completed a membership drive which exceeded previous membership drive. A total of 60 paid-up members are in the organization which represents the following professions: teachers, farmers, doctors, lawyers, businessmen, bankers and motel operators. Membership chairman Edd Hunt reports that people ask why it is necessary to have a Chamber of Commerce.
