father died without making a will, his estate — no matter how large or how small — would be distributed as provided by state law. It might be divided among his wife and young children, even though he would have wanted his wife to have complete control of the funds so she

could support and educate the children as they had planned. In such a case, the wife might then have to account to the courts for every penny spent of the children's "share."  
Drawing up a will should not be a do-it-yourself project, Miss Stallard says. You need the help of a competent lawyer. A will is a legal document and you must be sure

it will stand up in court. A lawyer's fee for drawing up a will is usually very moderate — and his services help insure the distribution of your

property as you want it distributed.  
Your lawyer can help you avoid many pitfalls, Miss Stallard notes. For example, many couples have the mistaken idea that wills are not needed if they own property jointly and have joint bank accounts. A lawyer will point out the uncertainties and possible tax disadvantages of such an arrangement. He also can explain the need for witnesses and who they should not be — such as anyone named in the will.

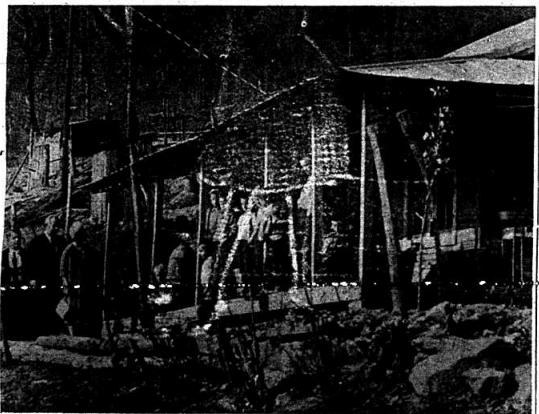

## McCauley in Congress Race, Charges Foe 'Wastes Tax \$\$\$'

### Will Debate Issues Anytime - Anywhere

Middlesboro Mayor Joe McCauley officially opened his campaign for congressman last Saturday, May 2, in Tompkinsville with a speech blasting a chief rival, Dr. Tim Lee Carter, as a waster of public money in his own hometown.

Speaking on the Monroe County courthouse square, McCauley challenged Carter to "debate anywhere in the district." They are two of 15 candidates seeking the Republican Fifth District nomination.

Deficit Spending  
The mayor asserted Carter, as chairman of the Monroe County Board of Education, was responsible for running up school system deficits for six consecutive years. One in 1960, was for \$105,297.

McCauley also charged Carter ignore the State Department of Education suggestions on fiscal procedures. Records show the Monroe board was cited twice for failure to keep adequate financial data and advertise for bids, McCauley said.

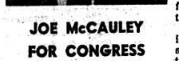
"It is now a fair question to ask of Dr. Carter," said McCauley, "do you, Dr. Carter, intend to handle the Monroe County Board of Education in the same manner as you have run the financial affairs of the school board of Monroe County?"

State audits showed the 1962-63 Monroe County school year ended with a deficit of \$68,704.44, said the mayor. He added in October, 1963, the state projected the current school year deficit as \$71,523.03. McCauley specifically charged Carter for the following: "The school board used credit cards for employees' business but no records were kept on which vehicles were serviced."

"Fire and gas charges on the cards. Records did not show which cars got the tires and the gas."

"The board made purchases in excess of \$500 without advertising for bids, as required by law."

"The board buys gasoline and sells it to employees' and bus operators without keeping proper receipts or records."

would work for the following: 1. Federal funds for highways. 2. Dams on rivers and streams for flood control, power and recreation. 3. Continuing support for farm, dairy, and tobacco programs. 4. Federal aid to education with the "least possible Federal control. 5. Temporary emergency relief programs. 6. A workable program of medical care for elderly citizens and the underprivileged. "I invite your help and advice," he said. "Let me know what you think should be done."

McCauley said there has been a lack of leadership in the Fifth District. It ranked 434th of the 435 congressional districts in family income, higher only than the 2nd District in Mississippi. The average youth in America, completes 10 1/2 grades of school, but in the Fifth District the figure is 8.0, he said.

"Why should we be at the very bottom in family income and number of years our children go to school before quitting or dropping out," he asked. "Surely 'a should have been a cause I alarm for our congressman of the past 19 years."

McCauley 24-Hour Worker  
McCauley promised 24 hours per day effort on the problems of the Fifth District when elected to Congress.

McCauley said, "I am registered a Republican, in a city with a Republican Council, in a county and county with a Republican State Representative and State Senator, all of whom I have supported. Further, I have supported and worked for Senator John Sherman Cooper and Senator Thurston Morton. McCauley has pointed out that several former registered Democrats have changed their registration to run as Republicans in this race."

McCauley pledges that a vote for him is a vote for a hard-working Republican and a full-time job for the 10th Congressman for the Fifth District, working both in and for the twenty counties, and in Washington for improving economic conditions in the Fifth District.

"Abide by the Law"  
"He is the leader, he's the chairman—he's the leader he now proposes to be for the Fifth District, he certainly should have been able to have the county board abide by the law in keeping the correct records of the business in this race in the Monroe School System."

In challenging Carter to debate, McCauley said the people "have a right to know all about the party who wants to be their congressman."

"I am happy to have my record as mayor of Middlesboro checked out by the Z. McCauley P.L.C. McCauley said if elected he

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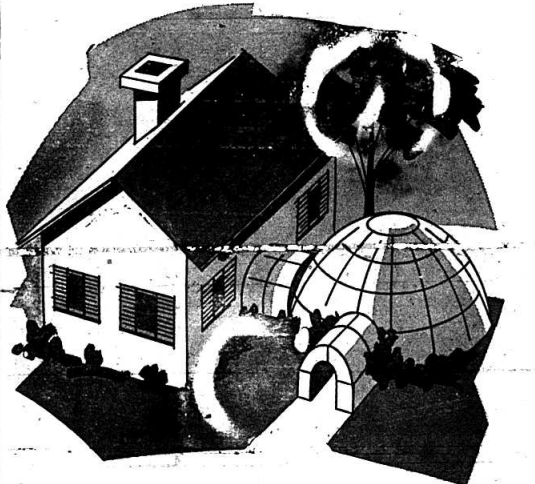
