Motion Denied To Set Aside Sentence In Bank Robbery Case

A motion to set aside a 15-year federal sentence for bank robbery given a 19-year-old Brodhead youth was denied yesterday by U. S. District Judge Mac Swinford.

James Terry Eldridge was sentenced last September in Federal Court at Richmond after he and two defendants pleaded guilty to robbing the First State Bank at Eubank last June.

He asked that the court set aside the sentence because his court-appointed attorney Charles Co. Richmond, had told him that the district attorney's office promised that if he pleaded guilty, he would be sentenced under the Youth Corrections Act, which permits an indefinite sentence of no more than six years.

In denying the motion, Judge Swinford commented that "the record refutes his claim. His plea of guilty was entered freely after he had an opportunity to discuss his case with a competent attorney."

The judge also commented on moral responsibilities, saying that people often speak of 18-year-olds as being too young to know what they are doing.

"We call them boys," he continued, "but they are men—voters and legally responsible adults. The court can't be guided by maudlin sentimentality."

Eldridge testified yesterday that he had no advance knowledge that his two companions, David Malcolm Spears and William Lewis Foster, planned to rob the bank.

He said he drove them from Indianapolis to Brodhead, where they had breakfast with his aunt the morning of the robbery, and then drove them to the bank at Eubank in order to cash a check.

Under questioning by U. S. District Attorney George I. Cied, Eldridge admitted that he drove them in a car belonging to someone else so if the check were bad, it couldn't be traced to him.

His first knowledge of the bank robbery came, he continued, when his companions came out of the bank and gave him "\$6,000 or \$7,000."

Eldridge said he pleaded guilty before a U. S. commissioner at Richmond because he was told that his bond would be \$100,000 if he pleaded not guilty and \$25,000 if he pleaded guilty.

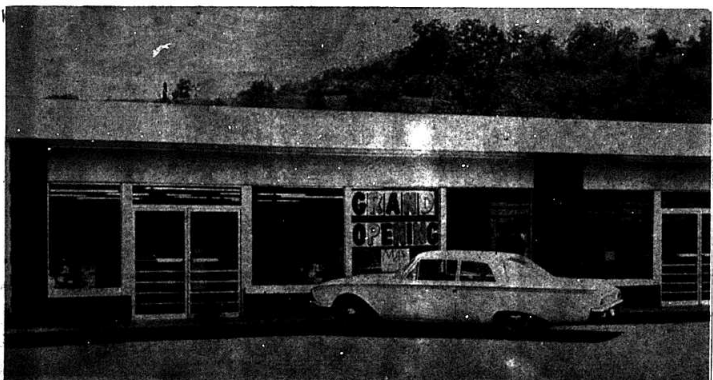
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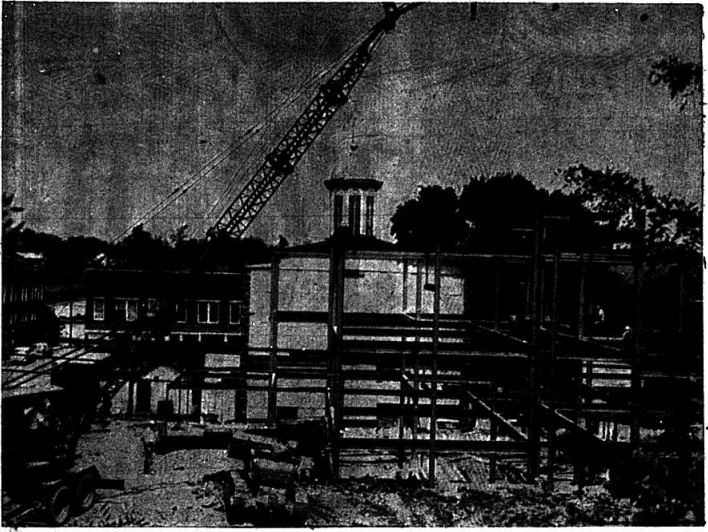

Mr. Henderson said that

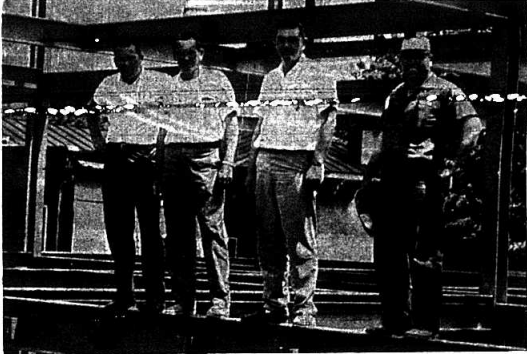

No mishandling of funds is involved in a Monroe County School deficit, an official of the state Department of Education said this morning.
Charges of waste and irregularity have been made against Dr. Tim Lee Carter of Tompkinsville by another candidate for Congress, Joe McCauley of Middleboro. Dr. Carter is a member of the Monroe County school board.

State finance officer Joe Alsip said today audits made four and five years ago by the state indicated there had been some "aimless accounting but this happens in more districts than one."
Recommendations made by the state auditors have been complied with for several years, Alsip said.
"No serious accusation had been made in the audits against Dr. Carter," Alsip pointed out. The findings did not reflect on Carter's integrity, Alsip said.
Charges
Some of the charges are misleading. For example, McCauley said Carter in-terfered more than allow-able expenses for attend-ing school board meet-ings. Alsip said the audit then pointed out that Dr. Carter refunded the extra money as soon as he was told it was not allow-able.
The deficit first occurred in 1958, Alsip said, when the Court of Ap-peals "allowed" pipe like companies a large re-duction in their franchise taxes. This was a serious blow to the Monroe coun-ty school system, and it has never fully recovered from the loss of in-come.
