

Dr. Carter Defeats 14 Opponents In 5th

Former Leslie County judge, Elmer Begley, came in fourth. Frances Jones Mills won the Democratic vote in Rockcastle by an overwhelming majority. She received 225 votes to 30 for Herbert Hoover Fowler. In the final count she had 1,877.

Of the 15 Republican candidates only five received more than 100 votes. Carter, locally, was first, Floss W. Mobley was second with 260. Mobley's final vote in the district was 1,824.

Gene Huff came in third with 223. McCauley of Middleboro, received 177 in the county, in the final tally McCauley had 1,319, Letcher T. White and 1,664 are registered Democrats and 3 independents.

Salutatorian is the 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Robbins. Mr. Robbins is principal of Brodhead High School.



1849 Auction Shows How Time Changes

How times have changed is depicted clearly by the following auction sale, which was printed in 1849. The sale was held in Woodford County, Ky., and offered for sale and conditions set forth were:

"Having sold my farm and 1 am leaving for Oregon Territory by ox team, will offer on March 1, 1849, all personal property, to wit:

All of ox teams except two teams, Buck and Jerry, 2 milk cows, 1 bay mare and colt, 1 pair of oxen and yoke, 1 baby yoke, 2 ox carts, iron foot of poplar weather boards, plow with wood mole board; 800 to 1,000 three-foot clapboards; 1,500 ten-foot fence rails; 60-gallon iron soap tacks; 65 sugar troughs made of white ash stainers; 10 gallons of maple syrup; 2 spinning wheels; 30 pounds of mutton tallow; 1 large loun, made by Jerry Wilson; 300 poles; 100 slip hoops; 100 empty barrels; 100 32-gallon barrel of Johnson Miller whiskey, 7 years old; 20 gallons of apple brandy; 40 gallons of apple brandy; 1 dozen real books; 2 hndle hooks; 3 scythes and cradles; 1 dozen wooden pitchforks, one-half interest in tan yard; 1 can califer rifle; bullet mold and powder horn; rifle made by Ben Miller; 50 gallon of soft soap; hams; bacon and 400 gallons of sorghum molasses; six head of fox-hounds all soft-mouthed except one.

"At the same time I will sell my six Negro slaves — 2 men, 35 and 50 years old; 2 boys, 12 and 10 years old; 2 mulatto wench, 40 and 30 years old. Will sell all together to same party as will not separate them.

"Terms of sale, cash in hand or note to draw 4 per cent interest with Bob McCracken as surety.

"My home is two miles south of Versailles, Ky., on the McCoups Ferry Pike. Sale begins at 10 o'clock a.m. Plenty to drink and eat.
