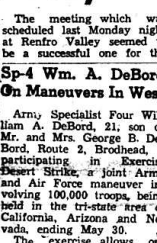

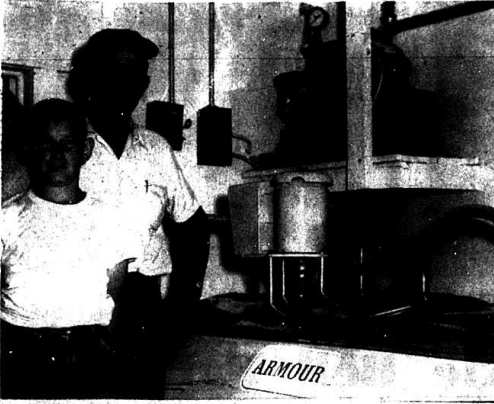

A Permanent Building Program

A lot of sentiment is being generated in Mt. Vernon in opposition to the construction of make shift classroom units instead of a central high school which was promised for Rockcastle County at the time the school system was merged some eight years ago. At that time it was said that a central high school was planned and that Mt. Vernon would become an elementary school.

It is now rumored that two or three single class rooms are to be built as additions to the old cannery class rooms.

The existing additions were built at an approximate cost of \$20,000. It seems to us that a very good surplus should have been put into the building fund over the past eight years and it would be a waste to build any temporary structure.

Where is the central high school building which Rockcastle County was promised a few years ago???

Mrs. Neuvale Miracle, Superintendent of Rockcastle County Schools has presented a complete report on the new proposed building projects scheduled for this summer. She stated that it was her desire to work with the Recreation Council on their problem. (The proposed rooms would project into the playground ruining the ballfield). Mrs. Miracle stated that she had not been aware of the objections of the council until they were pointed out to her this morning (Wednesday). She said she was sure that Frankfort Education officials would go along with the Council in solving the problem.

We would like to see a permanent building of which we can be proud instead of additions to the additions. This is no longer a time of shortages of material and we should have enough money for at least one superior building.

We sincerely hope that Mrs. Miracle and the School Board are planning some fine permanent structure and not another make shift.

We realize the necessity of some temporary facilities due to the increased number of students and the importance of meeting minimum foundation program requirements, however, we believe the time is now to begin a permanent program.

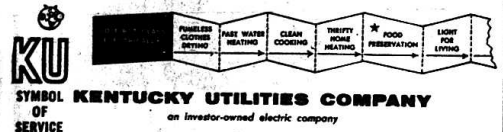

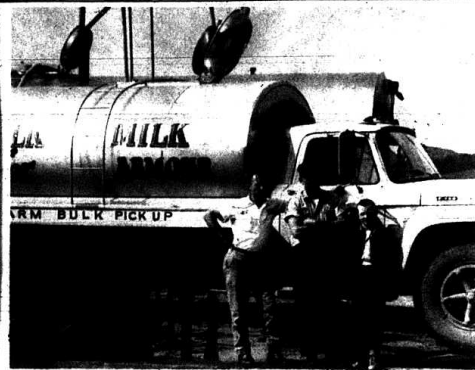
