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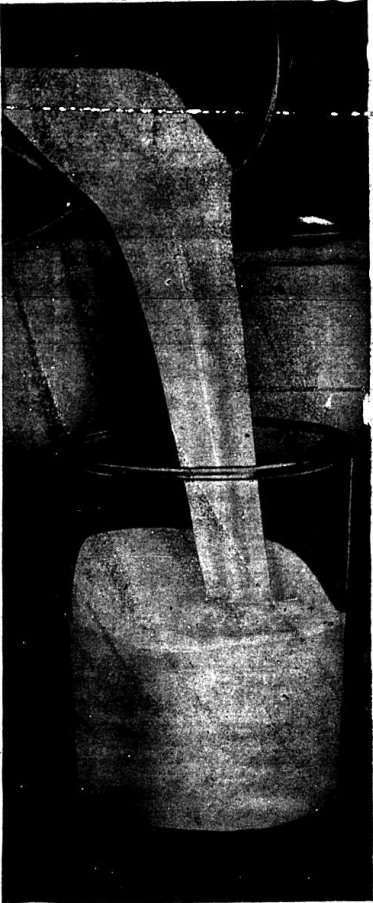

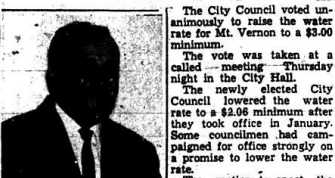

### DeMarcus Named To Rules Committee

At a meeting of Kentucky delegates to the National Republican Convention at Lexington Saturday, William Harlan DeMarcus was elected a member of the Rules Committee of the Republican Party in the United States.

He will serve a four year term. One state delegate from each of the 50 states is named to the National Rules Committee.

The state representative for the 80th District of Lincoln and Rockcastle counties was nominated by Ted Harwood of Lexington, president of the State Central Executive Committee, the ruling body of the GOP.

"I think the delegates assembled here should nominate Representative DeMarcus on the strength of his outstanding record in the recent session of the General Assembly," Mr. Harwood declared.

During the latter part of the legislative session Mr. DeMarcus was appointed Minority Party Whip and was heard on numerous occasions when Assembly rules were violated. He was also active in introducing and helping to pass a number of bills.

Mr. DeMarcus is also one of the two delegates voted to attend the GOP National Convention at San Francisco beginning July 19, when a presidential and vice-presidential candidate will be selected for the forthcoming general election in November.

## Public Works Program To Employ About 200

A public works program has been set up in Rockcastle County by County Judge Charles C. Carter and Sneed Yeager of Frankfort. The program will employ an estimated 150 to 200 people and bring some \$300,000 to \$400,000 into Rockcastle County every year.

The program, called the Aid to Families of Dependent Children Who Are Unemployed, becomes effective July 1 and is planned to continue for an extended period.

Anyone is eligible for the AFDCU program, male or female, if they are the head of the household. Participants must not have a bank account of more than \$500 or more than \$2,000 in personal property.

Judge Carter emphasized that this is a Federal project and there is no politics involved. The County Judge and Mr. Yeager will set up projects to be worked on.

They plan to begin with road work so buses can get children to school. Judge Carter said right-of-way will be cleared, gravel spread and state equipment will be available for general road repairs. Roads to Churches, Schools and Cemeteries will have priority.

Those interested may sign up with the Public Assistant Office in Mt. Vernon, the latter part of June.

Workers will not be asked to travel more than five or six miles to work. They will be required to furnish their own tools, such as pick, shovel, briar scythe, axe, wheelbarrow.

Wages for these jobs will be \$1.00 per hour for 40 hours a week up to \$160 per month. Checks will be mailed to the employee monthly.

Persons who are on welfare may work on this program. Their welfare allowance a portion will be deducted from the AFDCU checks.

Commodities will be mailed because a person is in this program.

Judge Carter and Yeager said they felt this was the best program ever to come into Rockcastle County. It is somewhat similar to the WPA program of the 30's except that the County is not required to furnish materials.

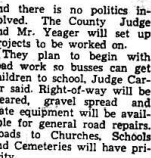

Cost-Share Assistance Available to Farmers. Individual farmers, or groups of farmers, with conservation problems on their land would do well to discuss the matter with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Company, Chairman, Mr. Steve Mullins, Mt. Vernon, said today.

Many times, the cost-share assistance available under the Agricultural Conservation Program makes it possible to carry out projects that farmers cannot accomplish alone. And, many times, pooling their own resources and the available ACP assistance is the only way a group of farmers can solve a problem that extends beyond the boundaries of a single farm.

Mr. Mullins explained that with the 1964 ACP well underway, work has already been started on formulating the 1965 program which will be in effect this fall and next year. ACP applies to farmland throughout the 50 States, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. It is especially effective since it is formulated by local people to deal scientifically with the soil as well as national conservation problems.

Needed conservation measures are recommended by the country's most extensive conservation program - mechanical measures are important, and ACP has helped farmers terrace and install other erosion-control structures on millions of acres. Vegetative cover, however, is the most widely used and adopted method of controlling erosion. ACP helps with about 20 million acres of vegetative cover establishment or improvement each year.

Where lands should be converted to trees or wildlife habitat, or where existing timber stands need to be improved, ACP may help through cost-sharing for tree-planting practices or timber stand improvement on farms and woodland holdings.

In controlling erosion of farmland, the country's most extensive conservation program - mechanical measures are important, and ACP has helped farmers terrace and install other erosion-control structures on millions of acres. Vegetative cover, however, is the most widely used and adopted method of controlling erosion. ACP helps with about 20 million acres of vegetative cover establishment or improvement each year.
