#### Berea Woodcraft In ARA Program

The Berea College wood industry was one of ten projects recently approved by the U. S. Department of Commerce to help attack chronic unemployment and boost economic growth in nine states. The project involves a Federal investment of more than \$2.3 million. Funds from the Department's Area Redevelopment Administration will be used for four industrial loan-guaranteeing 361 direct and indirectly related jobs in new or expanding businesses in Colorado, Maine, Minnesota and New York.

Six technical assistance programs will aid areas in Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Ohio and West Virginia to find new methods and processes, additional means of developing natural resources, and new paths to industrial development.

The Berea project gave approval for a \$13,730 technical assistance project financed by a management development program in the wood industry for 20 Berea College students. The students will receive training in the Louisville area, but will be expected to locate eventually in the wood industry in Eastern Kentucky.

Processing and fabricating of wood offers great employment potentials for the Eastern Kentucky region, however a major block to growth in this business is a lack of trained management to capitalize on expansion and development opportunities.

In addition to the ARA funds, Berea College will contribute approximately \$2,500 in teaching salaries.

### Search For Civil Rights Workers

#### Ordered Upped By Johnson

PHILADELPHIA, Miss. (AP) The search for the three civil rights workers who vanished nine days ago was stepped up today at the direction of President Johnson.

The Mississippi Highway Patrol also made it clear it was in this red-clay hill country of east central Mississippi to stay until authorities find out what happened to the missing trio.

Rita Schwerner, 22, wife of Michael Schwerner of Brooklyn, Mich. Schwerner Monday to send 5,000 men to Mississippi to join in the search.

Mrs. Schwerner, after meeting with the President at the White House, told newsmen Johnson advised her he couldn't send so many.

Schwerner, 24; Andrew Goodman, 20, another white New Yorker; and James Chaney, 22, a Negro from nearby Meridian, were last seen June 21 when they were freed from jail here after posting a \$20 bond in a traffic case.

Before Mrs. Schwerner visited at the White House, press secretary George Reedy told reporters that efforts to find the trio had been stepped up and expanded.

Mrs. Schwerner said the President assured her that the federal government is "doing everything in its power."

The President, Mrs. Schwerner added, said if he "considered it useful to send more men, then he would send them."

Federal and state authorities, joined by 100 sailors from the Navy arrived at Meridian, have lined their search in the hills and snake-infested swamps of Neshoba County.

State game wardens, using radio-equipped skiffs, drugged the muddy Pearl River and other bodies of water in the area.

"We've covered 55 miles of the Pearl itself and haven't found even a net," said Dewitt Patton of the State Game and Fish Commission.

The FBI ordered several thousand circulars of the three youths distributed in a five-state area. The circulars asked anyone with information to call FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover or the nearest FBI office.

The circulars went to Alabama, Tennessee, Louisiana, and Arkansas as well as Mississippi.

The only clue to the baffling disappearance was the finding last Tuesday of the charred hulk of the station wagon driven by the three youths.

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY ESTABLISHING RATES, FEES AND CHARGES FOR THE USE OF AND THE SERVICES RENDERED BY THE MUNICIPAL WATERWORKS SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY AND PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION AND ENFORCEMENT OF SUCH RATES AND CHARGES.**

Thereupon, the mayor declared that the motion had carried, that the ordinance had been duly and regularly passed and adopted, and ordered a copy spread upon the official records of the city, signed by the mayor and city clerk, and published as required by law.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION 1. MONTHLY RATES.**

That there shall be and there are hereby established from and after the respective dates hereinafter referred to, monthly rates of charges for the use and services of the municipal waterworks system as follows:

**A. MONTHLY WATER RATES**

(1) MINIMUM MONTHLY RATES

The minimum monthly water rate for all customers shall be three dollars (\$3.00) for which minimum monthly charge, each customer shall be entitled to 2,000 gallons or less of water in each month, and also if water bill is paid by the 15th of the month there will be a ten percent (10%) discount and if water bill is not paid by the twentieth (20) of the month there will be a ten percent (10%) penalty added.

(2) METER RATES FOR USE OF WATER

For water delivered in addition to the first 2,000 gallons per month, there shall be charged the following additional charges:

Additional Gallons of Water Delivered after the First 2,000 Gallons	Additional Monthly Charges, in Addition to the Minimum Bill of \$3.00 Per Month
For the next 8,000 Gallons	\$.85 Per 1,000 Gallons or part thereof
For the next 40,000 Gallons	\$.65 Per 1,000 Gallons or part thereof
For the next 50,000 Gallons	\$.55 Per 1,000 Gallons or part thereof
For all over 100,000 Gallons	\$.45 Per 1,000 Gallons or part thereof

(3) WATERWORKS CONNECTION CHARGE

The waterworks connection charge shall be Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) for all residential size connections.

(4) FIRE HYDRANT RENTALS

All stand-by hydrants (public or private) shall be billed at the rate of seventeen Dollars (\$17.00) per year, and the city will pay the sum of \$17.00 per year for each fire hydrant maintained by the city, said sum to be deposited in the same fund as all other revenue of the municipal waterworks system are deposited in. Such payment shall be made in twelve (12) equal monthly payments on the first day of each month.

**SECTION 2. RIGHT ON PAYMENT OF WATER CONNECTION CHARGE**

The payment by a property owner of the prescribed water connection charge shall entitle the owner of such property to have a water line brought to the nearest edge of his property line. Such property owner, if he desires water service, must bear the cost of running a water line from the building located on said premises to the point in said property line where the city has brought the water line.

**SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATES FOR WATER CHARGES**

The foregoing water rates and charges shall be effective as to existing water customers for the monthly billing beginning immediately after the effective date of this ordinance, and shall be effective as to the respective premises of new water customers beginning on the respective dates upon which the owner connects his premises to the water line made available to such premises.

**SECTION 4. ALL CUSTOMERS METERED**

It shall be mandatory for all customer of the waterworks system to be metered, and the schedule of rates herein prescribed shall be uniformly charged to all customers of the waterworks system regardless of whether such customers are located within the city limits or elsewhere.

**SECTION 5. METERS READ MONTHLY**

Water meters shall be read monthly commencing on the 15th day of each calendar month or as soon thereafter as weather and other conditions and circumstances may reasonably permit, and shall continue expeditiously as possible until all of the meters have been read.

**SECTION 6. DEPOSITS**

A deposit of \$500 shall be made with the city by any applicant for water service for residential property, before such applicant shall be entitled to such service. A deposit of \$10.00 shall be made with the city by any applicant for water service for commercial or industrial property, before such applicant shall be entitled to such service. The amount of such deposit, less any unpaid charges, and without interest shall be refunded to each customer, whenever such customer notifies the city legally to disconnect or terminate service to such customer.

**SECTION 7. OWNERS PAY CONNECTION CHARGES: OCCUPANTS PAY RATES**

Connection charges, where applicable, shall be the personal obligation of the owners of the respective properties. All personal obligations, collectible by law, of the occupant of the lot, property or building receiving the benefits of such use and service so long as the same continues, and the said liability of any party shall be a discharge of the liability for which the payment is made.

**SECTION 8. BILLING: COLLECTIONS: PENALTIES**

The rates or charges aforesaid shall be billed monthly and all bills for such service shall be considered due and payable twenty (20) days after rendition. If a bill is paid by the fifth (5) day of the month then a ten (10%) discount is applicable. If a bill is not paid within such twenty day period, there shall be imposed a penalty on each bill not so paid, in an amount equal to ten percent (10%) of the face amount of said bill not so paid, for each period of thirty (30) days thereafter that same remains unpaid. If a bill is not paid within the first thirty day period after said due date, the charges shown on such bill shall be deemed delinquent, and the city attorney is hereby authorized and directed to enforce and collect any such charges remaining delinquent for a period of thirty days. If a bill is not paid after remaining delinquent for thirty days, the superintendent of the project shall thereupon turn off the water of such user according to the current practices existing at the time of the time of the turnoff for delinquents.

**SECTION 9. DELINQUENCIES DISCONNECTION OF SERVICE**

If a person owing a bill does not pay same within the thirty day period in which such bill is delinquent, the city shall have the right, at its option, immediately thereupon to cut off the water facilities of the city until payment in full is made. That if such water service is cut off by the city, reconnection of such service shall not be made until the owner or user pays all charges and penalties owed plus the amount of Five Dollars (\$5.00) as a disconnection and reconnection charge.

**SECTION 10. DELINQUENCIES: ENFORCEMENT**

In the event the person owing a bill fails to pay same within the period of thirty days after it first becomes delinquent, the city shall have the right immediately and at any time thereafter to collect said unpaid charges plus all additional amounts which may become due because of the unpaid charges, by suit, attachment or garnishment proceedings in any court of competent jurisdiction. That when water services are cut off as so any person owing a water bill, such water service shall not be reconnected until all unpaid water charges, including the applicable disconnection and reconnection charges, have been paid in full.

**SECTION 11. DEPOSIT IS NO EXCUSE FOR DELINQUENCY**

The foregoing provision are intended to and shall apply regardless of the availability of any initial deposit required by this ordinance.

**SECTION 12. SEVERABILITY**

If any clause, provision, or section of this ordinance be ruled void or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder thereof is intended to be enacted and shall be in full force and effect notwithstanding.

**SECTION 13. ALL FORMER PROVISIONS REPEALED**

All city ordinances or parts of ordinances insofar as same may be in conflict herewith, are repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and approval, and publication as provided by law.

Commissioner Ward said, both dams (the one at Renfro and at Buckeye) are under consideration. Nothing definite has been done nor can it be done until a complete geological survey has been made. It must be ascertained that the proposed lakes could hold water. We don't want to run into an underground cavern and flood property out of the lake area.

There is adequate time to complete the study before a final answer can be had. There is as much time for the county as there is for the State. The state has not begun an appraisal of property and it is some time off, he said.

The deadline which was passed back in the spring was for the establishment of a sponsoring agency. The state had to have someone with whom to deal.

There is nothing that can be done at this time, he added. It takes time. When the time comes to build, the sponsoring agent will have to have titles to all land to be inundated before construction can begin on the dams.

## Appeals Court Reverses Local Water Rate Decision

The City of Mt. Vernon won the right, last week, to reverse a decision of Rockcastle Circuit Court invalidating an ordinance that fixed a higher rate schedule. The ordinance also imposed a sewer rate equal to 50 percent of the total monthly water bill. The city was in the process of obtaining a federal loan to help finance the system.

The decision went against the city. The court contended that the proposed rates were unreasonable and exorbitant. Appellate Commissioner Robert Cullen said in a 5-2 decision.

There is no showing that the new rates are out of harmony with rates charged in similar communities in Kentucky.

Neither is it demonstrated that the new rates will inordinately burden users of water. Aside from the citizens' desire to continue receiving water at the lower rate, there is no evidence the new rates are confiscatory, unduly burdensome, discriminatory, economically unjust or unreasonable," he said.

The city had planned to build a new sewer system through a \$380,000 revenue bond issue and a loan from the State, and Home Finance Agency.
