KENTUCKY SCHOOLS
(Continued from page 1)
and the increased emphasis on upgrading the elementary school program in every public school district, he believes, is perhaps the most significant advance in public schools during the first decade of the Minimum Foundation Program.
Increased enrollment in non-public high schools during the 10 years have pushed the total of classes to 100 or more from five to 116. These statistics, Dr. Elswick emphasized, reflect enrollment increase, program expansion and consolidation in the public schools. These factors have contributed ma-

terially to the improvement of instruction, curriculum, and physical facilities.
In addition the National Defense Education Act of 1958 has contributed to the improvement of the areas of science, mathematics, and modern foreign language offerings.
"The final summation of most advances in education," Dr. Elswick concluded, "can be wrapped up in one price- less ingredient — the quality of teaching and learning. There is much evidence supplied by the class of 1964 and progress made by pupils of all grades that new levels of teaching and learning have been achieved by the schools of Kentucky."
