License Required For Some Go-Karts

Anything that uses a gasoline engine to get you from here to there in public thoroughfare must have a license plate, State Public Safety Commissioner Glenn Lovern has pointed out. Also, Lovern added, the operator must be at least 16 years of age and possess a valid Kentucky operators license. The applicant may take his driving test on a motor scooter, bike or cycle, he said, but if he does so driving privileges will be restricted to that vehicle. Registration plates may be obtained from the county court clerk and are renewable annually. Go-Karts are not required to be licensed, Lovern said, as long as they are not operated at a conveyance on public roads.

State Highway Department Employee Killed When Trucks Collide On Slippery Pavement



Sherman Gilbert Lovell Jr., 37, Mt. Vernon, Route 2, was killed instantly Tuesday morning when two State Department highway trucks were involved in a freak accident about three miles north of Mt. Vernon on U. S. 58 above the middle of Green Fish Hill.

Edward Falin, 50, Orlando, was taken to Rockcastle County Hospital and released. He had a bruised leg. State Police Trooper Gary Godby reported that the accident occurred at 8:50 a. m. when Lovell drove a two-ton dump truck, loaded with dirt, down the hill. Falin drove an empty two-ton dump truck up the hill and slid around on the wet road.

Godby stated that the tailgate of Falin's truck was down and as Falin's vehicle moved around the tailgate caught Lovell's truck. From the point of impact Lovell's truck traveled down the road 287 feet, went off the highway into a four or five foot fill at the end of a concrete drainage ditch.

Lovell's truck crashed straight into a rock wall, broke the frame and threw mud and dirt over the truck cab and on top of the rock wall.

The victim was pinned in the truck wreck by the jammed dash. Several minutes were required to extract the body from the wreckage.

Falin's truck was knocked loose from the frame and shoved to the right at a 45 degree angle.

No charges have been placed to date. Lovell was born in Rockcastle County, the son of a daughter, Cary, two sons, Michael and Harry Mitchell, and Dean Lovell, all of Mt. Vernon. Lovell's wife, Mrs. Minnie Ova, is a daughter of Mr. Vernon Cox of Mt. Vernon, Route 2. He was a Veteran of World War I.

No Acceptable Jury Found In Murder Trial

Sp-5 James R. Moore, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Basil Moore, Route 2, Pittman and James Glenn Pittman for willful murder came up Thursday and the judge was unable to get a jury. After the usual 32 jurors present had been rejected, some 59 of 75 others drawn from the county were summoned. The judge finally got 11 but some of those were not acceptable to both attorneys. Sheriff Lowell Clontz has been instructed to contact the Madison County Circuit Court Judge, Dennis and Pittman are charged with the willful murder of Lloyd Blackburn on Nov. 20, 1963.
