Colson, West Point Cadet, In Training
Cadet Robert M. Colson, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clay Brodhead, is this summer a cadet (sophomore) at the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, N. Y., undergoing two months of extensive practical combat field training at the academy's Camp Buckner, ending Aug. 29.

Each year the third classmen train at Camp Buckner, a large tract of rugged, undeveloped mountainous New York terrain, during July and August. The summer training program, begun in 1942, is designed to train each cadet in the capabilities, limitations and needs of tactical employment of the infantry, armor, artillery, engineer, signal and transportation branches of the Army, to one of which he may be assigned when he is commissioned a second lieutenant upon graduation from the academy in 1967.

Mrs. Williams, Directs Pupil Personnel

The "strait officer" of yesterday is the "director of pupil personnel" of today. Mrs. Nancy Williams, Rockcastle Superintendent of Schools, is typical of personnel directors in every school district in the state, working to coordinate the efforts of the classroom.

The whole image has changed from her "run-toting" days to a "holding hand" period. The result is that parents and the general public view her more and more as looking after the welfare of the workers as helpers.

Dr. Frank Bean, director of the Division of Statistical Services in the Kentucky Department of Education reported 197 fulltime and 42 part-time directors in the State. Large districts have more than one director.

The director of pupil personnel, he said works "as the coordinator of the school, school, child, teacher, principal, home and coordinates the whole attendance program."

Statistics show high school dropouts led the list of school-agers not enrolled. Mrs. Williams said that the difference of students' parents or both. Physical and mental health is a major concern. Dr. Bean said. And the most trouble comes from the school.

The personnel officers get the list of absentees from school principals. The workers are concerned by state law, with those absent for three consecutive days without excuses.

Then they visit the home to determine the reason. If the cause is financial, lack of money for clothing, or shoes or lunch, or all three, the school worker tries to set up a solution with some local organization or civic minded individuals who understand the second hand clothing or funds.

In all cases, the personnel officers counsel with the parents and children. The value of education is stressed and all possible means of keeping the youngsters in school are explored.

The procedure with chronic absentees is this-if the home visit and determination of the trouble shows no valid legal reason for the youngsters' absence, a final notice is issued.

"Then if no response is made within 24 hours," Dr. Bean says, "the state law issue, a warrant for arrest of the father, as a last resort. The first day of a last sentence costs the father a \$10.00 fine and each day constitutes a separate offense unless the father is in jail. Parents can be jailed, if they don't pay."

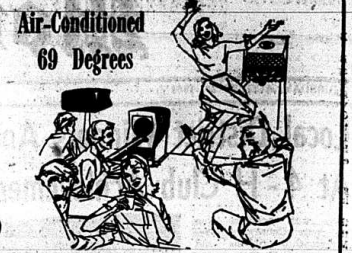
