Burdette Helps Rescue Fellow Worker

Jack Burdette of Lafayette, Ind. was instrumental in rescuing a fellow painter recently. (Burdette is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Coleman Burdette of Wildie.)

Witnesses said Dana Masterson, 20, a Kokomo, Ind., painter apparently was overcome by fumes blown from a nearby chimney while he was painting the upper portion of the pipe, which rises at a 45 degree angle from a 15 foot high roof to the top of factory.

Burdette said that Masterson slid halfway down the pipe, where his fall was halted by two guy wires.

He stayed there, unconscious and with his arms hanging; on either side of the pipe, while Burdette stated that he rescued him with the aid of a piece of rope.

Burdette said it took him 15 minutes to reach Masterson because of the pipe's smooth surface.

Using the guy wires for support, Burdette started Masterson's unconscious form. Then he grabbed the end of a rope tossed by several other painters from atop the roof of the plant and tied it around Masterson.

The two men remained together on the pipe for some 20 minutes while firemen manipulated the extension ladder into place and a fireman climbed to the top of the pipe to assist the fireman get Masterson on the fireman's shoulder and the firemen to slowly lower him to the ground. Historical Society Erects Signs

A Rockcastle County Historical Society was organized Friday night in the studio of WRVK radio station.

The first official act was to erect two historical markers. One was located on U. S. 25 about 10 south city limits, Mt. Vernon. It tells the part Mt. Vernon played in the Civil War.

The second sign was erected at Burr where the road turns left to Salt Lick. The sign gives the date of the last use of the cave.

Mr. Lair said that the group is asking the county folks to get their local cemeteries, open up the list of names of those buried there, list their birth and death date and mail to John Lair, Renfro Valley, Ky.

Family histories are also welcome. He said. The association will type the history, file it for future reference and send a copy to the person who sent in material.

In cooperation with the historical society and by the grace of material provided by Mrs. Willis Craig, the Signal plans a series of historical articles, beginning with the next issue.

City Authorizes Atty. Clontz To Sue For Delinquent Taxes

The Mt. Vernon City Council has authorized Atty. Carl Clontz to file suit against the 10 highest delinquent city tax payers. Suits will be filed this week. After these ten are collected other suits will be filed.

Bills range from 49 cents to \$196.00 for a single bill. Each person who is sued will also have to pay court costs which amount to about \$20.

A total of some 100 delinquent city taxpayers are on the books with some \$760,000 outstanding in taxes. This money should be in the general fund which is exhausted.

Councilmen said that for the past several years there had been more and more delinquent taxes piling up and they decided to file suit to recover taxes for the past five years, which is as far back as a suit can be filed.

Letters have been sent out to everyone who is subject to suit. Atty. Clontz has already collected a good portion of the money without bringing suit.

For the past two months the city has been unable to pay her chief of police, Walter Shepherd, because there were no funds available in the general fund. The two largest sources of expense in the town have been and are the police and street lights. The costs of services have grown and been expanded while sources of revenue have remained constant. Thus the general fund is depleted, it is explained.

The City Council has authorized the process of bringing similar action for their delinquent city taxes.

Water Works

At the City Council meeting Thursday night a hassle came up over how many water services are allowed on one meter.

Water superintendent Jack Craig asked the council for a resolution as to how to go about getting a waterline to the houses owned by Bob Gentry on New Street (just to the left off High Street). The question was whether the line should be run under the concrete line, over the line, or in line and the additional waterline cut in there.

Jimmy Bales was present and would cost \$25, causing using the one she now uses (which is in Jim Weaver's name). Bales will put up the \$5 meter deposit for Weaver's present meter. At present Dr. Noble, Lynn Weaver, Jim Weaver, Cabel Bales and Henry Bales use water off one meter.

The Council instructed Water Supt. Craig inform Dr. Noble that she must get her own water meter; to go over and under Cabel Bales' waterline to get water to the Gentry houses and to allow Cabel Bales to put up \$5 for a meter deposit on the meter which is in the name of Weaver's name.

The water works funds were in good shape. At all their bills were paid some \$1500 was still in the fund. Atty. Clontz informed the council that Court Costs would be refunded the city in their suit to raise the water rate in order to get a sewer. The amount to be returned was not disclosed.

Crain asked for a 10c and 15c raise respectively, per hour, for his assistants, Charles McFerron and Junior Powell, with a raise of \$5 for Sunday pumping. The rate is now \$5 per hour. The council will set the council to \$10 per Sunday, and a blanket 10c raise made for both assistants.

Official Arrest Pair After Chase

State Trooper Gary Godby and Deputy Sheriff, Tip Reppert went to Brush Creek to serve a warrant on Red Mason and Mervile Brown, Friday evening.

When officials arrived at the scene they found Brown's car blocking Brush Creek Road; about one mile off U. S. 25. Mason was standing beside the car.

According to Godby, Mason started running through the yard of a neighbor as Godby and Reppert approached. Godby said he chased Mason who jumped a fence about three feet high and fell. Mason got up, started running again and fell against a tree stump and some rocks. During the course of his falls, Godby reported, Mason received cuts on his head.

"Weat" caught up with him," Godby reported, "he was bleeding." He was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital treated and lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail.

In the meantime, Reppert had arrested Brown. Brown was charged with driving three feet high and fell. Mason was charged with public drunkenness.

Resigned

Councilman Floyd Owens sent his letter of resignation to the Council, Tuesday, Sept. 3. He said his was not a sudden decision - he had no ill will toward the council which appreciated the cooperation he had received from the present council. His reason for resignation was, he stated, the need to devote more time to pleasing personal duties.

City Atty S. F. Bowman resigned as City Attorney. He stated as a practicing attorney, he believed it is his duty to retire and let a younger man take over. A request was made for a resignation and I wish you all good luck and a happy ending."

Stolen Auto Recovered After 5 Injured In Wrecks

Three charges were placed against a former Rockcastle Councillor Sept. 4 after he was involved in a collision on U. S. 25 while being pursued by a trooper after an earlier car wreck. In all, five persons were injured.

State Trooper Gary Godby said John Canada Lewis, 26, Hazel Park, Mich., a native of Rockcastle county, was charged with drunken driving, operating a vehicle without a driver's license and car theft.

Lewis was guarded in the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital two nights suffering cracked ribs and a possible ruptured spleen. He was then turned over to Madison County authorities to be held.

The vehicle driven by Lewis collided with an auto driven by Max Lewis, 23, of Cincinnati, Ohio, about 6:30 p. m., less than a mile north of Mt. Vernon.

Mrs. Smith suffered a right knee injury. Her husband Owen, about 45, and their daughter, Carolyn, 18, complained of neck and shoulder pains. The Smiths and Lewis were admitted to the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital.

The collision occurred while Trooper Godby and Deputy Sheriff Tip Reppert were pursuing the car driven by Lewis.

The chase began, Godby said, when he attempted to flag down Lewis' car as it crossed a yellow line at a work zone about six miles north of here. There, Trooper Johnny Sims was investigating an accident in which Donna Bullen, 17, suffered a broken ankle and minor head injuries. She was taken to the Berea College Hospital. Miss Bullen's car plunged over a 200-foot embankment after it was struck by Lewis' car. Sims thought the weaving was probably caused by a flat tire.

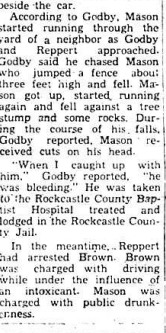
