

## Dr. Hiatt Named Research Scientist

Dr. Andrew J. Hiatt, a plant physiologist in the Department of Agronomy at the University of Kentucky has been awarded a postdoctoral research fellowship by the National Academy of Science in Washington, D. C.

## 1887 History Of Rockcastle County

(The following article is in part from a book evidently printed in 1887 in the private library of Ralph Griffin.)

Rockcastle County was created in 1810 from parts of Lincoln, Pulaski, Madison and Owen counties, and was the 52nd in the order of formation. It was named for Rockcastle River, which flows into the southeast. It is situated in the southeast middle part of the State, and its boundaries are as follows: to the east by Jackson and Laurel; to the south by Pulaski, Lincoln and Garrard; and in 1880 it had a population of 9,470.

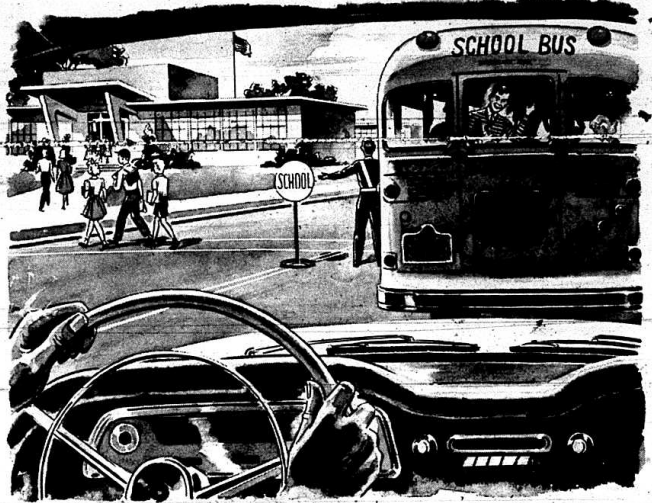
