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Price Now On Probation

Carl Samuel Price, who has been tried on three previous occasions for willful murder, pleaded guilty last week to an amended charge of voluntary manslaughter "by reckless use of firearms."

A Pulaski County jury sized Price's sentence at five years in prison, but was prohibited under the following conditions: 1, continue good behavior; 2, refrain from violating the law in any respect; and 3, report in person at least once a month to the probation officer.

Price, a native of Rockcastle County, was accused of murdering his sister-in-law, Mary Rose Vance, in a field on a December Sunday morning in 1961.

The case was transferred from Rockcastle Circuit Court after attempts failed in securing a jury.

In the first trial, Price was acquitted of murdering her and a jury fixed his punishment at 10 years in prison. In the two trials which followed, the jury failed to reach verdicts. According to testimony given in earlier trials, Price and Vance were in the hillside field looking for deer. Price testified that some deer were seen in the field and that Mary Vance attempted to take the gun away from him to shoot the deer. He said in the scuffle the gun discharged and killed her.

Local Man Grazed By .38 Caliber Bullet

Ed Waugherty, 30, of Route 2, Mt. Vernon, accompanied 14-year-old Bobby Prewitt when he suffered a bullet wound in the head, Saturday night at Richmond.

The youth died Monday morning in St. Joseph Hospital at Lexington. Richmond police said Ethel Woods, 63, Heath Street, was charged with murder in connection with the shooting on Saturday night.

Assistant Police Chief Zena Douglas said Miss Woods fired three bullets from a .38 caliber revolver while standing on her front porch and one of the bullets struck the boy in the right eye. He said another narrowly missed Daugherty, grazing his pants.

Daugherty said he and the boy had gone to Miss Woods' home to talk with her but were stopped in the front yard by the shots.

A police dispatcher said Miss Woods telephoned that two persons were coming into her yard and she was going to shoot at them. The dispatcher said Miss Woods called him back two minutes later and said one of the persons had been shot.

Miss Woods told police she was shooting at Daugherty and that he had been both grazed and shot.

The boy was rushed by ambulance to the Lexington hospital after police found him lying in a gutter in front of Miss Woods' house.
