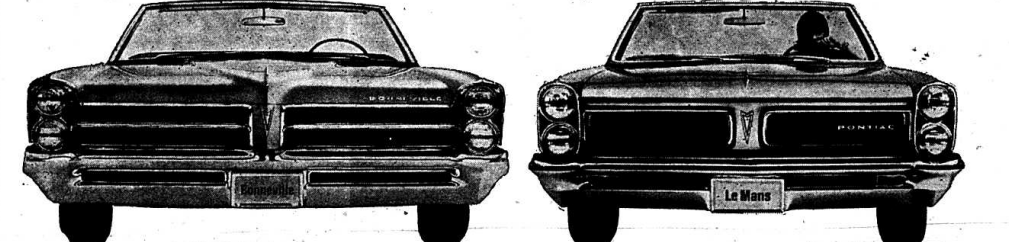

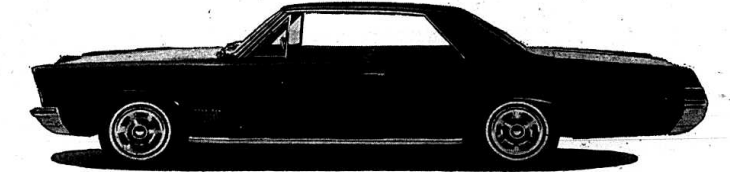

A total of 4.09 inches of rain has fallen in Rockcastle County since Sunday, according to the records of Bill Cooper who keeps an accurate record of climatological observations of this area for the United States Weather Bureau.

### Bids Open To Oct. 15 For Construction Of A Sewer System In Mt. Vernon

Sealed bids for construction of a sewage treatment plant and sewage collection system in Mt. Vernon will be received at the office of the city clerk at Mt. Vernon until Oct. 15. The plant would be 200,000 gallon plant. The rest of the collection plant would include one lift station, 46,000 feet of six and eight-inch sanitary sewer, 175 manholes, 2,000 cubic yards of solid signal.

The construction of the sewer system is expected to cost about \$19,000 and will be paid for through a federal government loan at a three and three eights per cent interest rate. #### VITAMINS

Mountain school children whose parents can not afford either a balanced diet or supplemental vitamins will receive immediate and direct aid through a donation of a leading pharmaceutical firm to the Council of the Southern Mountains, it was announced today. Six million vitamin tablets are en route to the mountain workers for distribution through recognized agencies.

School teachers and superintendents, settlement officers, nurses and physicians, ministers, social workers, welfare and health officers and similar community workers will be given the vitamins upon application to the Council's Health Educator William Saters, Jr.

This donation is in addition to the plan announced a week ago whereby the same company and the Council of the Southern Mountains will undertake a study of the effect of regular vitamin supplementation on undernourished school children.

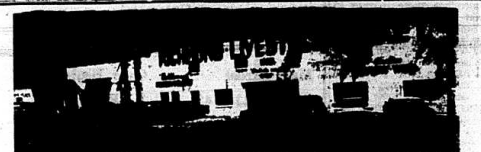

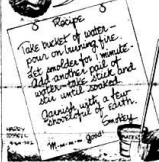
