All tuition, fees and books are furnished by the Navy, and the student receives a retainer of \$50 a month for not more than four years. During the summer the student goes on interesting training cruises as a midshipman. After successfully completing a four-year college course, he is commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty as a career officer with the Navy's modern fleet. Immediate challenges of election commissions before the absentee ballot box is opened, she said.

Members of the U. S. services are authorized to register in person or in absentia before the election, which means they may register during a period of time the registration books are closed, Miss Stovall said.

Speeding too fast for road conditions but under the posted speed limit - 3 points.

All other moving hazardous violations - 3 points.

A driver accumulating as many as six to nine points will receive a letter from the Department advising him that immediate action should be taken to improve his driving.

Upon accumulating nine points through 11 points, the driver is placed on "probation" and may appear for an interview with a representative of the Department of Public Safety, to determine the drivers real driving problems.

A driver accumulating 12 points within a three year period, dating back from the latest conviction, will have his license immediately suspended for six months.

For any violation for which the suspension of the driving privilege is less than six months for the first offense, the second conviction for a

similar offense shall result in suspension period of not less than one year.

Some offenses which are mandatory that license be revoked are: driving under influence of alcohol or narcotics, manslaughter or reckless homicide, perjury or false affidavit to Department of Public Safety, felony involving use of motor vehicle, reckless driving - three convictions within 12 months, leaving the scene of an accident - failure to stop and render aid. Driving while license suspended or revoked, operating a motor vehicle without an operators license.

### Land/Grazing Dates Moved Month Ahead

Grazing of land diverted from wheat and feed grains in Boone County may start Oct. 1, instead of Nov. 1, according to Shelle Mullins, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The earlier date has been set because of the serious drought in Boone County. The county farmers who divert such acreages under 1964 programs may use them for grazing without any downward adjustment in diversion program payments. The previous release date in the county was Nov. 1, 1964. In cases where deductions have already been made from program payments, following County Committee approval for emergency grazing of such acreages, pro rata refunds provided they are in excess of \$3-will be made.

The Chairman explained that the relaxation of the program provision in the county follows the determination of the ASC State Committee as specifically authorized by the Secretary of Agriculture - that the shortage of forage in the county is severe and that the action will be helpful in maintaining present livestock herds.

### Veterinarian On European Tour

Dr. J. P. Rieber of Masapequa Park will participate as a member of a Goodwill People-to-People Mission of forty New York State Veterinarians, visiting some of the leading veterinary educational and research centers and private veterinary practices in eastern and western Europe. Meetings for the Mission are scheduled in Brussels, Belgium; Copenhagen, Denmark; Stockholm, Sweden; Moscow and Tbilisi in

the United Soviet Socialist Republic; Warsaw, Poland; Budapest, Hungary, and Berlin, Germany.

Although groups of people with specialized interests and backgrounds have participated in similar missions ever since the People-to-People program was conceived by President Eisenhower in 1956 and fostered by Presidents Kennedy and Johnson, this is the first mission of its kind for veterinarians. If it is as successful as is anticipated, missions of veterinarians from other states will be arranged in subsequent years.

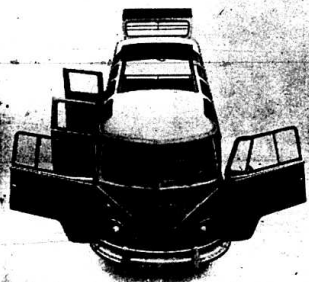

Dr. Solomon C. Davis, M. D., was born of French and Welsh parentage, Jan. 16, 1814, in Northern Virginia. His father, Joseph N. Davis, a native of Wythe County, Va., was born June 9, 1814. He was a minister of some note in his native State, an excellent school teacher, a graduate of Bethany College, Bethany, Va.

# Kentucky Stone Plants Closed; Worker's Strike

Kentucky Stone Company 21 out at the Mt. Vernon plant in strike. Office personnel, Harry B. Mullins at Mullins Station and Roy Cummings at Mt. Vernon are 24 employees out at the Mullins Station quarry and still working.

The strike is state wide and was called because a new contract which is mutually acceptable to the United Mine Workers and the Kentucky Stone Company has not been worked out.

The 1963 contract expired. Among other benefits workers are requesting in the new contract is a pay increase.

Besides the plants in Rockcastle County there are five other quarries out on this strike. Plants at Russellville and Laurel County are still working.

# Stiff Penalties Imposed Under Driver Point System

Governor Edward T. Breathitt has moved to cut down the number of suspensions which way accident toll by stiffening penalties imposed under the state's system of assessing "points" for traffic violations.

Under the system, put into effect in 1957, varying numbers of points are assessed for various types of violations. The more serious the offense, the greater is the number of points assessed.

If a driver accumulates 12 points during a three year period his driving privilege is suspended for six months. Points assessed for any violation remain on driver's record for three years and then removed.

In signing the order stiffening penalties for most violations, Breathitt explained that the changes were designed to hit hardest at those traffic violations primarily responsible for the spiraling increase in traffic deaths and injuries on Kentucky highways.

Statistics compiled by the Department of Public Safety's Bureau of Records show that speeding--the prime target of point system--remains a contributing factor in 26 per cent of Kentucky's 568 fatal traffic accidents recorded last year were caused by speeding.

From January through May 1964, there were 6 fatal traffic accidents in Rockcastle County. Traffic fatalities for
