Dr. Carter predicts resounding victory

Dr. Tim Lee Carter, Tompkinsville, Republican nominee for the 5th Congressional seat, today predicted resounding victory throughout all the twenty counties. 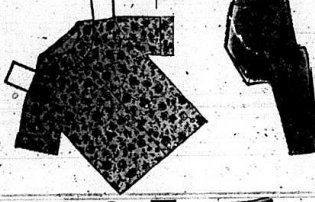

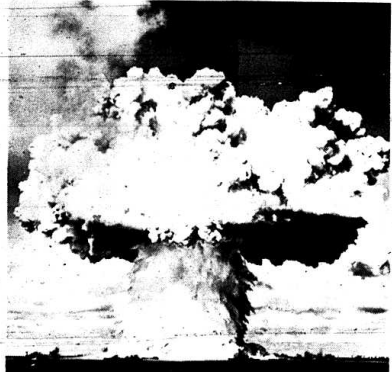

Heart Attack Fatal To Mrs. Ella McClure

Mrs. Ella Marie McClure, 52, of Stuart, Pa., and a long-time resident of Mt. Vernon, died Oct. 20 in a Stuart hospital following a heart attack a few hours earlier in Lexington.

She had been in apparent good health up until her last illness.

McClure was born in Carter County, Kentucky, Dec. 27, 1881, the daughter of Charles Boyd and Martha Glancy. But grew up at Elkton in Laurel County.

William K. Bullen Appointed Agriculture Census Crew Leader

William K. Buller, of Wilkie has been named a crew leader for the 1964 Census of Agriculture. Robert A. Yerkey, director of the U. S. Bureau of Economic Analysis, Dept. of Agriculture, announced today. The new crew leader is one of about 1,825 persons throughout the U. S. to receive this appointment.

The new crew leader will supervise a team of census enumerators who will visit all farms and ranches in Rockcastle and part of Pulaski county to collect information for the 1964 Census of Agriculture. He recruits and trains the enumerators, schedules and supervises the accuracy of completed forms, and conducts difficult interviews.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in years ending in "4" and "9" to gather information on the livestock inventories and crops an production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy.

Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops. The census also gathers information on farm equipment and improvements and income and some production expenditures.

The information will be published starting in 1965 for counties, States, and the nation.

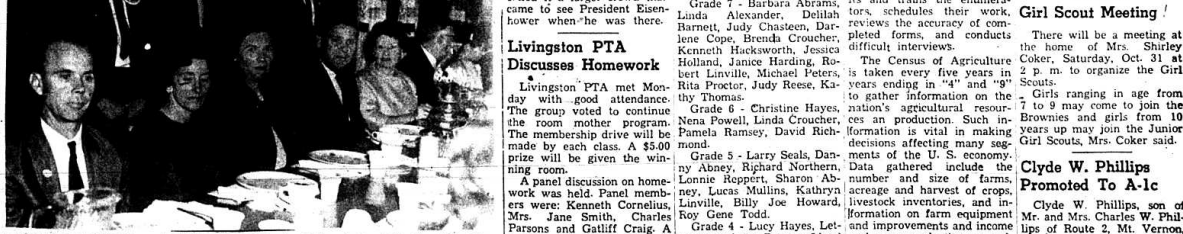
