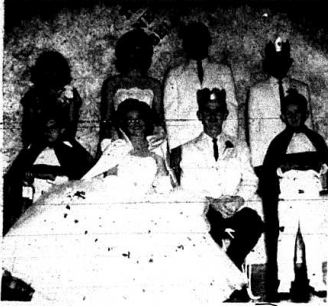

The great majority of victims are children and it is a tragic fact that, in them, the disease progresses more rapidly than in adults. Only a small number of them survive to maturity. Chief Cox added, "For these reasons, it is important that the County Campaign be highly successful and only you can make this possible through dropping in your contributions."
