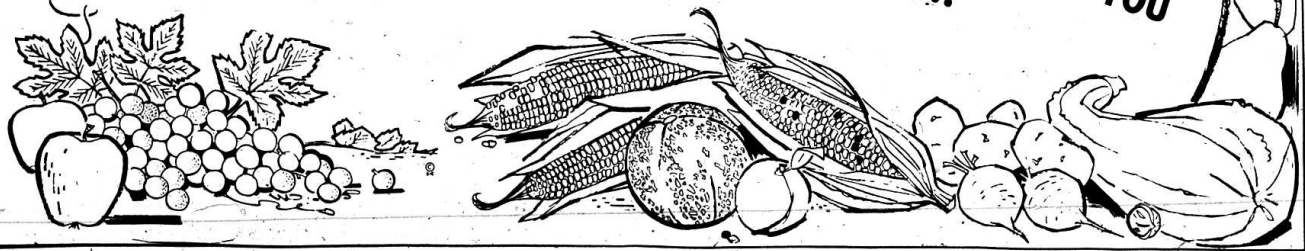

KU Rates Reduced

Kentucky Utilities Company will reduce electric rates for more than 200,000 customers beginning Jan. 1 under a \$1,435,000 a year rate reduction K. U. filed Friday, Nov. 20, with the Public Service Commission.

One purpose of the reduction is to pass on to the customers the full effect of the tax relief provided by the lower federal income tax rate, according to W. H. Skinner, K. U. vice-president. The company's income tax rate will be decreased from the current 50 percent to 48 percent Jan. 1, 1965.

In addition to passing on the tax relief, the reduction contains a further downward adjustment in rates made possible through increased operating efficiency on the part of the company and the increased use of electricity by customers, Mr. Skinner said. This added adjustment accounts for \$867,400 of the annual rate reduction.

The current reduction, which affects city and rural residential general service, light and power and mine power users, is K. U.'s fourth rate reduction in the last three years. This brings the total savings through rate reduction since February 1962 to more than \$9,800,000 a year.

The reduction just announced is to become effective Jan. 1, 1965 and will result in a saving on all bills to residential customers using more than 50 kilowatt hours a month and to the majority of commercial and industrial customers.

More than 90 percent of K. U.'s 225,000 customers in areas in 78 Kentucky counties will have some savings under the rate reduction.

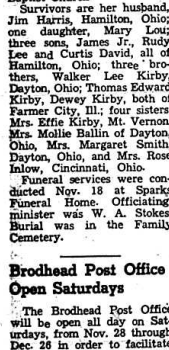

Glen Pittman Sentenced 12 Years On Charge Of Wilful Murder; James Denney Found Not Guilty

Glen Pittman was sentenced to 12 years in the state penitentiary and three confined at hard labor for an indeterminate period of not less than 12 years, in Circuit Court at Mt. Vernon, Nov. 23.

The sentence was passed after Pittman was convicted Nov. 20 on a charge of wilful murder.

James Denney was found not guilty by the jury on a charge of wilful murder with Pittman in connection with the death of Lloyd Eickbom, who died of knife wounds, Nov. 20, 1963.

Pittman and Denney have spent about a year in jail at Mt. Vernon and Somerset awaiting trial. Pittman is scheduled to be taken to Le Grange in the next few days, according to deputy sheriff Wayne VanHook.

Denney is in jail awaiting trial on a child desertion charge.

Some 50 jurors were summoned from Madison County for the trial of the number 28 appeared, one was excused and all but two were examined by attorneys before a jury was accepted.

The trial was in session for two days. The jurors spent the night in Seenic View Motel in the custody of deputy sheriff Tip Repper.

The jury brought in a unanimous verdict of guilty for Pittman and not guilty for Denney even though both pleaded not guilty.

The charge against William Thomas for possession of liquor for the purpose of resale was dismissed because the search warrant was insufficient.

Delmo McClure was found guilty on a charge of breaking and entering because the evidence failed to establish proof that he had broken in the house. He said he bought the articles from other boys.

Roy Jones for possession of alcohol for the purpose of resale was dismissed because the search warrant was insufficient. Another case on the same charge was "captured" until December.

The case against Dee Ramsey and Glen Pittman for gambling was dismissed. Alonzo Nelson was charged with selling alcohol in local option territory, drawing a deadly weapon and assault.

Continued to December were the case against J. L. Finley for obtaining money under false pretenses, Floyd Parker and Lee Harold Durham for storehouse breaking, Clay Latham for larceny.

The case against Bill Morris for damaging the fence of another was set for trial Nov. 24.

Cases tried Tuesday were: Aris Graves for driving under the influence of alcohol, Aris Graves, Ray Childress and John Childress for drinking in a public place. The case was dismissed for lack of prosecution.

The case against Boston Brewer for cutting and taking lumber was dismissed by the court for failure to survive a line on the property.

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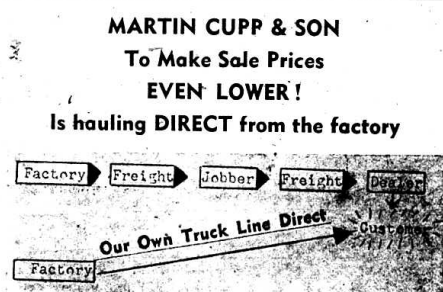

Wool Marketing Deadline Dec. 31

Growers were reminded today to complete all details of marketing wool and lambs not later than Dec. 31, 1964, in order to receive payments for the current marketing year.

R. O. Wilson, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, points out that marketing completed after that date will be eligible for payments for the 1965 marketing year.

Since the wool marketing year now is on a calendar-year basis, the sale will not be considered as taking place in the 1964 marketing year if any part of a sale of lambs or wool is not settled by Dec. 31.

This means that all the information needed to complete the net sales proceeds for wool has to be determined and available by Dec. 31 in order to be eligible for wool program payments for the 1964 marketing year. Under program regulations, wool is not marketed until title has passed to the buyer, the wool has been delivered to the buyer either physically or through documents which transfer control to the buyer, and all the information, such as price per pound, weight, yield, etc.—needed to determine the buyer's total purchase price is available.

Payments for the 1964 marketing year will begin about April of next year, after the program payment rates are determined, based on the average prices received by producers for shorn wool sold in 1964. Payments for the 1965 marketing year on marketings taking place after Dec. 31, 1964, will be made in the spring of 1966.

Wool producers may file applications for payment for the 1964 marketing year with ASCS County Offices any time between now and the end of January, 1965.

RECC - KU Sign Power Pool Agreement

East Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative and Kentucky Utilities Company signed a power pooling agreement this week scheduling the future additions to generating capacity for the continued interconnected operation of their systems.

This agreement is designed to benefit the rate payers of both systems and supplements the arrangement for the interconnected operation of the two systems which has been in effect for more than 10 years and resulted in important savings to both systems. Alex B. Vesch, East Kentucky R. E. C. C. president, and W. A. Duncan, K. U. president, said in a joint statement issued at the signing in Lexington.

Under terms of the agreement, East Kentucky R. E. C. C. will install a second unit in its Cooper Station at Burnside, when the anticipated power purchase requirements of the cooperative exceeds 106,000 kilowatts. Requirements for the second unit are purchased from K. U. prior to that time.

Kentucky Utilities will purchase power required above its capacity from East Kentucky, under the agreement, as surplus power is available and will then construct additional units in its system. East Kentucky will in turn purchase surplus power from K. U., thus delaying the need for additional units in its system.

The agreement extends to January 31, 1974.

Kentucky Utilities serves 245,000 customers in Eastern Kentucky by R. E. C. C. a generation-transmission cooperative financed by loans from the Rural Electrification Administration (REA) provides wholesale power to 18 distribution rural electric cooperatives which serve 155,000 members.
