### Visit Your State Parks

The announcement by Kentucky State Park Commissioner Robert D. Bell that a record 14 million persons visited Kentucky State Parks during 1964 is something which all Kentuckians should be proud of.

Mr. Bell's report on state parks shows that the 14 million visitors bettered by three million the record established in 1963. Receipts of some five million dollars in the 34 state parks and shrines topped 1963 by one million dollars.

In addition, Bell noted that tent and trailer visitations nearly doubled the 1963 total. Occupancy percentage—rooms and cottages reserved of the total available—for the main vacation months was also the best on record.

The chief reason for the increase, Bell said, was the new central reservation system which allows for direct communication to all vacation parks and between parks, makes it possible to proceed through other similar facilities when one park is full.

He said the state would continue to improve on operation and administration.

No matter in what state you are visiting, you can always hear a word of praise for Kentucky parks. You venture to guess the Kentucky park system would easily compare to any park system in the nation. The stress placed on state park improvement in the last few years is indeed paying off in dollars to the state and in improved public relations. Visitors are finding in the rugged beauty and modern accommodations of the parks exactly what they are looking for in the way of a vacation.

If this then is one of the keys to tourism and its accompanying dollars, counties and municipalities could well take a close look at their own possibilities—and begin to think in terms of public accommodations, lakes, improved roads, and points of historical and natural interest.

If you have never spent a few days in a Kentucky State Park, it's time you did. You'll be pleasantly surprised and amply rewarded.

versed the procedure from when Winchester had the highest average and Richmond the second highest among the seven.

Other averages yesterday and this morning from Monday were: Paris, \$62.08, up 62 cents; Danville, \$62.91, off 24 cents; Mt. Sterling, \$62.39, off a penny; Harrodsburg, \$62.32, up 46 cents; and Cynthiana, \$62.10, up \$1.31.

At London the price advanced from \$63.02 on Monday to \$64.08 on Tuesday.

The Federal-State Market News Service said burley marketing in the eight-state belt on opening day totaled 32,724,710 pounds for an average of \$62.80 per hundred. This was \$1.19 higher than last year's first day when 36,630,000 pounds was sold. The service said the main reason for the heavier volume last year was because of a half-hour more in selling time. Grade averages Tuesday were about in line with those of Monday. However, a few more losses than gains appeared with decreases centered on lower quality leaf and tips.

Most changes amounted to only 1 or 2¢ hundredweight. Volume continued heavy and quality was slightly lower as the percentage of good and fine tobacco decreased.

## Snow, Ice, Cold Keep County Bundled Up And By The Fire

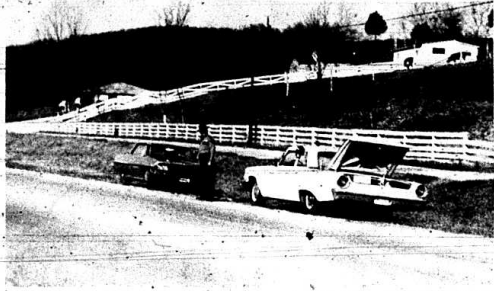
He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Hattie Hazelwood VanWinkle.
