### COLLEGE NEWS

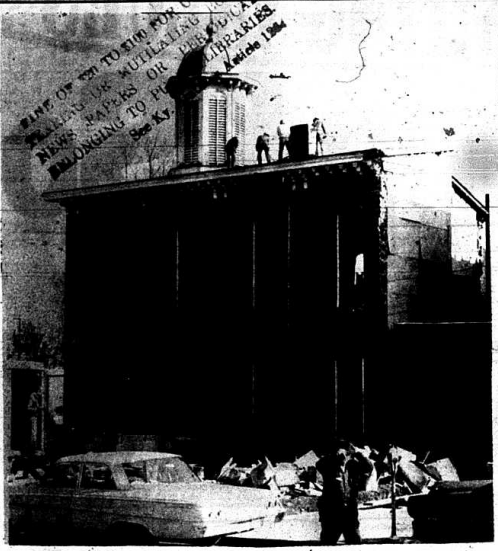
A branch campus of the University of Kentucky is expected to be open for classes at Somerset in September, 1965. Students can earn up to 67 hours at the new school.

## Tobacco Average Is Down, But The Price Remains High

The Blue Grass Burley 808,406 pounds. Second highest average at which rose to the highest point of the season Monday, sank to the lowest of the season Tuesday as the seven markets hit \$68.98, down \$1.51 from the previous day.

In reaching the season's highest point Monday, six of the markets had higher averages than on their preceding sales, and yesterday six of the seven had lower averages than the day before.

The long gainer yesterday was Mt. Sterling, up 95 cents to \$63.97, the highest average of the seven sales centers on Tuesdays auctions.

Averages on the other six markets fell from as little as 10 cents per hundred pounds to as much as \$5.96.

Volume was off only slightly from the preceding day, with 4,540,614 pounds being sold yesterday, just 95,042 pounds less.

Although volume was off slightly on the seven-market belt, made up of markets closest to but outside Fayette County, one of the sales centers topped the \$100,000-pound mark for the first time this season as Danville sold 100,000 pounds.

## City Notes Planning Board

### PLAN CHANGES IN PARKING

Action on future parking in front of the new courthouse was postponed by the Mt. Vernon City Council at its regular meeting Thursday.

The council wants to rearrange parking and widen the street in front of the courthouse in order to eliminate what was termed the hazard of present diagonal parking.

After a short discussion the council agreed to wait until landscaping is completed by the county before trying to solve the parking problem. In all probability future parking will be horizontal to the curb. It is doubtful if the street could be widened.

### CAP, RED CROSS JOIN FORCES

The Civil Air Patrol and the American Red Cross this month joined forces to support the Red Cross national mission of emergency relief.

Under the new agreement, the Red Cross may call on CAP resources directly through the U. S. Air Force.

The agreement provides that whenever the CAP is supporting the Air Force during an emergency, Red Cross will request CAP through the USAF designating mission coordinator controlling the CAP resources being utilized.

### CAN REGULATE CITY BUILDING

A Municipal Planning and Zoning Commission was established by the Mt. Vernon City Council at its regular meeting Thursday night.

By approving the seven-member commission to regulate and guard future building plans for Mt. Vernon property owners, the council in effect approved a federal housing project for the city.

The federal government has been waiting for action establishing the planning commission and other details before finally approving the project for the elderly, and families unable to pay high rent.

The new commission will be made up of Mayor Clyde Linnville, a city administrator, one professional (city clerk), one council member, and four members who are residents of Mt. Vernon.

Although the word "zoning" did not crop up in the night, in about two years the federal government will expect the city to get the zoning business in earnest, if the city expects to continue to participate in federally sponsored programs.

The planning commission is then expected to operate with a building code based on the Kentucky Standards of Safety Code that has been on the city books for several years but not enforced.

To date no one has said how far the city is prepared to go in enforcing building procedures, and regardless of the code, buildings already in existence could not be affected by the regulations, unless of course a building is declared by the commission to be a hazard and unsafe to the public or to adjacent property owners.

Basically, the success of a municipal zoning commission lies in its members and the council and the decision on how far the two bodies are prepared to go toward enforcement.

In all instances, the work of the planning commission must be approved by the city council, and if the two governing bodies are not in agreement in practices and procedures, then the planning commission's work is ineffectual.

The commission—or any new planning commission—will not have an easy task if it intends to operate to any noticeable degree.

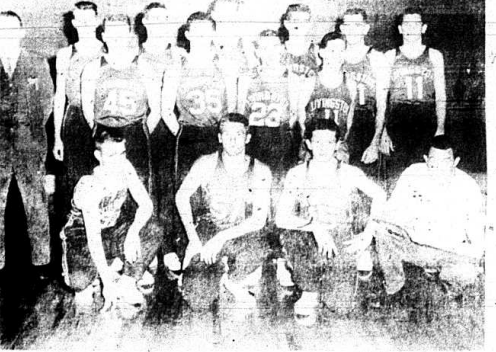

This does not mean the Mt. Vernon commission will ever be as highly organized. But it is of interest to see how these cities operate generally.

First a planning and zoning commission is established along with a city engineer (Mt. Vernon would not have an engineer) and a building inspector (Mt. Vernon's building inspector for the time being would be in the employ of the federal government).

The commission and the engineer would then obtain sectional maps of the city and indicate the "predominant" type of building construction already in existence in each section. These are usually classified in this manner: Residence-1 (of a high type); Residence-2 (such as apartment buildings); Commercial-1 (high type business); other commercial destinations, agricultural destinations, and a maze of other classifications. Some cities have as many as 50 classifications.

Carried out to the last detail, a zoning code specifies the type of construction allowed, including the type of materials, electrical,

and plumbing regulations. When to build a building in town where a building code is not approved, he must present a detailed construction plan of the proposed building to the planning and zoning commission for approval. The commission usually meets at over 100 city council or board meetings for examination and approval.

The location of the building is checked. If it happens to be in an area designated residential, the building is not allowed. If it is in a business area, it is found to meet location specifications, the plans are checked to determine if they meet construction standards in materials, plumbing and electrical.

If the building meets all the requirements, the contractor or property owner is issued a permit that must be posted in a conspicuous place at the site of construction in case of an inspection. Such a check is made by inspectors, such as subdivisions and downtown business buildings, usually must get the approval of the entire planning commission, but ordinarily, routine buildings need only the approval of the building inspector.

At least one expects Mt. Vernon zoning to reach so high an organized status as outlined above. At this point, establishment of the commission is only a first step to meet basic requirements for the city's proposed zoning project.

The city council did not discuss building code at its Thursday meeting. It merely agreed to set up the commission.

Proponents of zoning are always quick to point out that before any feasible growth is experienced in a town, a zoning commission and strict zoning law enforcement must be established. They point out also that there are several federal programs that a city can take advantage of if zon-

### ORDINANCE NO. 273

**MUNICIPAL PLANNING COMMISSION ORDINANCE NO. 273 PROVIDE FOR A MUNICIPAL PLANNING COMMISSION TO BE ESTABLISHED IN MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, AND TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, Kentucky in order to guide and accomplish a coordinated and harmonious development of the municipality which will in accordance with existing and future needs best promote public health, safety, morals, order, convenience, prosperity, and the general welfare as well as efficiency and economy in the process of development, that the Municipal Planning Commission is hereby established as authorized by Kentucky Revised Statutes, Chapter 100.010 and that the Commission shall be organized and empowered as follows:

### SECTION 1. MEMBERSHIP

The Municipal Planning Commission shall consist of seven members, three of whom shall be members ex officio. Said ex officio members shall be as follows: The Mayor, one of the administrative officials of the municipality selected by the mayor and a member of the legislative body selected by the legislative body. The four additional members shall be appointed by the mayor from a group of eight persons nominated by the Mayor. All members of the Commission shall serve, as such, without compensation, and the appointed members shall hold no other city office, except that one of the appointees shall be the mayor of the zoning board of adjustment. The term of ex officio members shall correspond to their respective official tenures, except that the term of administrative official shall terminate with the term of the mayor selecting him. The term of each appointed member shall be six years and until his successor takes office, except that the original terms of the four appointed members shall be one, two, three and four years respectively.

### SECTION 2. ORGANIZATION, RULES, STAFF AND FINANCES

The Municipal Planning Commission shall elect its chairman from among its appointive members. The term of chairman shall be one year with eligibility for reelection. The Commission shall adopt rules for the transactions, findings and determinations, which record shall be a public record. The Commission may contract with city planners and other consultants for such services as it may require. The expenditures of the Commission, exclusive of gifts, shall be within the amounts appropriated for the purpose by the city legislative body.

### SECTION 3. POWERS AND DUTIES

From and after the time when the Municipal Planning Commission shall have organized and selected its officers, together with the adoption of its rules of procedure, then said Commission shall have all the powers, duties and responsibilities as set forth in Kentucky Revised Statutes, Chapter 100.050, or other statutes relating to the duties and powers of municipal Planning Commissions adopted subsequent thereto.

### SECTION 4. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED

That this ordinance take effect from and after its passage, the public welfare of the municipality of Mount Vernon, Kentucky requiring it.

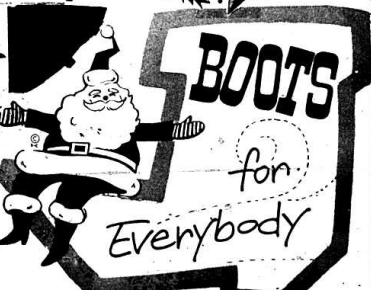
