A Conway man has filed a \$35,650 civil suit in U. S. District Court in London against an Ohio woman.

Lloyd E. Clark of Conway filed the action here in Elsie G. Woods, Troy, Ohio, operated her car in a negligent, careless and reckless manner and caused the crash which struck the car in which he was a passenger.

The mishap occurred on U. S. 25 about two miles north of Berea.

Name Planning Commission Elects Pike

Four Mt. Vernon men were appointed to a Municipal Planning and Zoning Commission at a special meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council last Wednesday night.

Chosen for the new commission are Shannon Franklin, Larry Travis, James Robinson and Clifford Bales.

The four were among eight names placed in a hat and drawn. Mayor Clyde Linnville then appointed the four whose names were drawn.

The four remaining men will be appointed to another committee later, Mayor Linnville said.

The new planning commission will have the say over future building in Mt. Vernon, but very little is expected to be done until the commission meets and discusses its plans.

Also serving on the commission will be Mayor Linnville, Councilman Bob Jasparr, and City Attorney Carl Clontz.

The commission was set up at the request of the federal government in order to obtain federal funds for a city housing project to be constructed at a still undetermined location. The city must meet several requirements in order to be eligible for the federal funds, among them, a planning and zoning commission.

GIRL, FATHER ALSO INJURED

Two Rockcastle County people were killed and two others injured when the auto in which they were riding crashed head-on into a truck early Saturday at the south Livingston city limits.

Killed instantly were Billy Gene Sandusky, 29, of Mt. Vernon, and Mrs. Thelma Mason Bullock, 38, of Orlando.

Injured critically and hospitalized at St. Joseph's Hospital, Lexington, was the driver of the auto, William Anderson, who was a member of the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital suffering from fractures, ribs, and a broken leg, is Anderson's daughter, Shirley Anderson, 13.

Driver of the tractor-trailer, Fred Newton, 43, of Persia, Tenn., was not injured. He was not charged by State Police.

According to State Trooper John Anderson, the accident occurred at 12:30 a. m., in a sharp curve at the south end of Main Street in Livingston near Burdine's Gulf Service Station.

Trooper Anderson said Anderson was traveling north when his 1946 auto struck the right shoulder of the road, went out of control, and skid on the wet pavement for 194 feet in the south-bound lane.

The impact knocked the car backward about 10 feet. The motor was in the front seat, Anderson said the car traveled out of control about 194 feet before it hit the truck.

Mrs. Bullock was riding in the front seat on the right side. Sandusky was in the back seat on the right side. The Anderson girl was on the left side in the back seat.

Trooper Anderson said charges against Anderson are that he was driving too fast for weather and road conditions. The deaths raised the traffic toll in Rockcastle County during 1964 to ten.

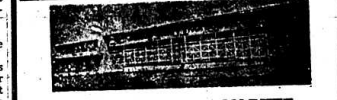

Used Tobacco Stalks Can Be Beneficial

When the 1964 Kentucky tobacco crop has been stripped out, there will be about 17,000 tons of stalks containing 2 million dollars worth of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium around barns. Practically all these nutrients can be recycled by proper handling of stalks, says George Corder of the U. K. Agriculture Extension service. Spread these stalks on lawns, pastures, meadows or small grain fields, this fall or keep them under shelter until they are spread next spring. If spread this fall on lawns, pastures, etc., living root systems will pick up the nutrients as they leach out. Next spring there will be little loss of nutrients. These stalks are spread on cultivated fields and plowed or disked in. Stalks from mosaic susceptible varieties or black shank infested fields should not be spread on tobacco beds or tobacco fields.

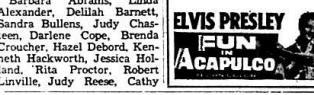

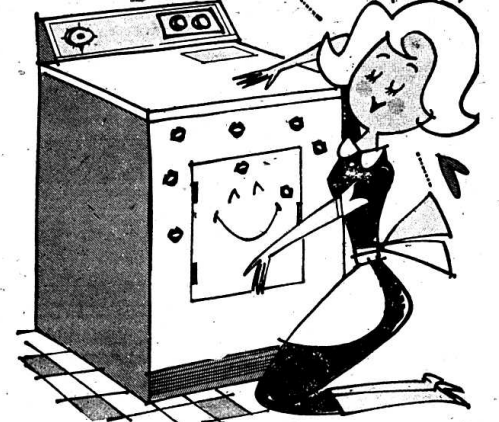
