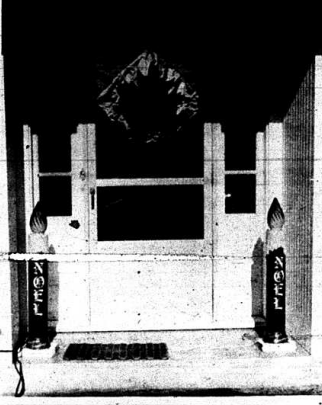

\$500 Bond Posted By Livingston Man

A Livingston man has been held to the May federal grand jury at London on charges stemming from the discovery of a moonshine still south of Livingston. Charles Lucy was released Tuesday on \$500 bond by a federal commissioner on charges of operating a moonshine still and possession of untaxed paid whiskey, a possession of four mash.

According to Deputy Sheriff Wayne VanHoy, Joe Bailey was arrested in connection with the incident, forfeited a \$100 bond in Rockcastle County Court Monday when he failed to appear to answer a charge of possession of unpaid tax whiskey.

The two were arrested over a week ago by Deputy VanHoy and Livingston Policemen McKinley Arnold and Richard Overbay. The officers confiscated a two-barrel still.

At this point, a reservoir on the Rockcastle River near Livingston is still very much in the mill.

Such was indicated this week by G. R. Bethurum, public relations director of the Nashville district of the Army Corps of Engineers.

A rumor has persisted locally for several days, that the "dam project" had been shelved by the Corps.

Bethurum reported the district office at Nashville has completed a draft of a preliminary report and survey and forwarded it to the Division Engineer at Cincinnati, Ohio.

When a study of the report and survey is to be completed and the results announced was not known, Bethurum said it could be a week, or it could be six months, or longer.

The decision whether the Corps will construct a dam on the Rockcastle River will be made on the basis of economic feasibility or whether the returns from the investment will outweigh the cost.

A question on the effect of the anti-poverty and the Federal Development Planning Commission programs in 1964, drew only a speculative reply from Bethurum.

He said he felt the Corps, at this time, will act on the survey as presented to the Division Engineer. He said however, the Corps has recently set up a group within the Corps called an Appalachian district group which is now busy inventing projects that could be undertaken in the area. He said the Rockcastle River project would be in the inventory.

He said the dam's feasibility would be developed and applied by the group remains to be seen, he said.

Anderson would not speculate directly on whether the Corps would be inclined to find a dam located in the Eastern Kentucky poverty pocket more feasible now than earlier. He reiterated that he felt the dam's feasibility would be determined solely on the water needs of Lumberland, but did not rule out the chance of a policy change in the light of the development programs.

Part of the survey now under study by the Corps does not include the dam's feasibility for all time. The project could be re-examined.

A report also has persisted locally for several days that a dam on Renfro Creek has been approved by the federal government. The report could not be substantiated at Frankfort.

the loan and payment division are as follows: Corn, \$1.25 per bushel (\$1.05 loan, 20-cent payment); barley, 98 cents per bushel (80-cent loan, 18-cent payment); grain sorghum, \$3 per cent, \$1.85 loan, 35-cent payment). The 1964 total supports were the same as 1963, but the division was: Corn, \$1.10 loan, 15-cent payment; barley, 94-cent loan, 12-cent payment; grain sorghum, \$3 per cent, \$1.85 loan, 35-cent payment. The greater reduction in the 1963 grain sorghum loan rate, which is offset by a higher payment rate, is needed to bring grain sorghum price-support loan values more in line with market prices of recent years.

With the acreage substitution feature for wheat and feed grain acreage, which is new to the program for 1965, producers will have a more flexible range of cropping opportunities and income possibilities. Since program participants help out government costs by diverting acreage to conserve use and thus reducing production, they can get a price support on wheat and purchases, but also loan and acreage diversion payments.

The program sign-up for feed grains and for spring wheat will be from Feb. 8 through March 26. During the sign-up period, wheat producers who signed up in the wheat program last fall may change their intentions, however, the intention is to plant wheat and sign up at that time, whether in the fall or spring.

"This committee is made up of dedicated people from every county in the state who are working to clean-up and beautify their local areas as well as the entire Commonwealth," Mrs. Quinn said.

"Every effort must be put forth to rid our state of litter and to improve its appearance in every way. This is one of the first steps necessary in our industrial expansion program and our tourist promotion program."

Plans are underway to hold a state meeting sometime in the early spring to prepare Kentucky's 1965 clean-up and beautification program. An estimated 1,000 people are expected to attend.

Tobacco Plant Beds Should Be Ditched

Many tobacco beds have been full-treated for weed control, and are ready for fertilizer and seeding next spring.

But they have not been properly ditched to keep off surface waters, says Ira Masie, U. K. Ag Extension Service specialist.

"Surface water flowing over these beds can destroy the good work already done in weed treatment, by bringing in weed seeds and disease organisms. Each year, many such fall-treated plant beds are lost during winter months because the proper ditching wasn't carried out from hard winter rains."
