Mrs. Allen Heads Drive

ADD \$10,000 TO CITY LOAN

An additional \$10,000 loan to the city of Vernon's sewer system has been approved by the Housing and Finance Agency, Atlanta, Ga.

The \$10,000 was approved because of a bond over-run. The money will take care of increased costs for materials that has occurred between the awarding of a sewer contract over a year ago and a second contract awarded September. The contract was held up the year because of delays by several water customers.

The additional loan will not affect water and sewer rates.

The city has now borrowed \$410,000 from the federal government and has a \$51,000 State Health Department grant to construct the sewer system.

State Gets Street Problem

The problem of street width and curbing in front of the new courthouse at Mt. Vernon is to be left to the State Highway Department.

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted last week at a special session to ask the State Highway Department to increase the width of the street to 70 feet.

The city then expects to establish horizontal parking in the block similar to the remainder of Main Street.

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Court Sets Janitor Duties

Keeping the new, and bigger, courthouse "spic and span" will be no easy task, and no one knows this better than Janitor Sam Hoskins.

In a resolution Tuesday, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court set down rules and regulations to guide Janitor Hoskins in his janitorial job for which he is allowed a modest \$150 a month. Also from the \$150 must come the salaries of those whom Hoskins would hire to help him.

The resolution, approved by all the magistrates, pointed up the big job that lies ahead for Janitor Hoskins. It reads:

"He will keep the county court room clean; all the county offices; circuit court judge's chambers; all rest rooms, both public and private; required to mop all hallways and stairways once a week and more if necessary."

"He is required to dust all furniture in county offices; county offices mean circuit court offices, jury rooms, and witness rooms, etc. In addition, to county offices."

"He will be required to do janitor service for the county health office, child welfare office, county agent's office, and ASC office."

"He is to wax floors in all offices and keep them in good condition."

"He is to clean the restrooms in the courthouse and Olla Collett's building on Main Street."

Burley Fees Assailed

A Republican legislator said yesterday that warehouses are charging farmers excessive fees for selling burley tobacco, according to a report by Ray Ramsey in the Courier-Journal, Ohio. The accident occurred at the intersection of US 25 and Wilder Road. The Worley's were treated and released.

The other major burley-producing states set maximum commission rates which go no higher than a 3.5 percent fee, plus 25 cents a basket in North Carolina.

"Kentucky is the largest burley producer, yet has no law limiting the commission rate," he said.

Agriculture Commissioner Wendell Butler said comment by him on DeMarcus' statement would be premature until a Legislative Research Commission study had been completed. "I have had no complaints about the charges," he said.

"I believe the study will reveal some important information, and could lead to significant legislation, Butler said.

Officials of the Burley Auction Warehouse Association could not be reached for comment. (Continued on Page 3)

DeMarcus said his contention that warehouses fail to post fees and discounts is based on a personal check. "The law says the rate must be posted conspicuously," he said. "Just ask the average tobacco farmer when he last saw one."

The posting statute provides for a fine of from \$50 to \$100 for each day of violation.

DeMarcus also said warehouse sales invoices to farmers in several instances he checked showed only the amount of money involved. "Not the rate or how it should be arrived at," he said.

"No one has yet given me a sound reason why the Kentucky farmer has to pay quite a bit more to sell his burley than in any other comparable state," the legislator said.

There is no special situation which justifies this, DeMarcus represents Lincoln and Rockcastle counties, where burley is the biggest cash crop.

A legislative research commission, report on tobacco marketing, ordered by the 1964 Legislature, will be ready for consideration at the 1968 session.

The survey will cover all stages—from the farm to the buyer. It will compare Kentucky with other states.

The L. R. C.—composed of Senate and House leaders—is expected to make recommendations on the report.

This is a departure from the usual practice of simply releasing findings and giving no guidance to the Legislature.
