

Pickles are a short-season crop. They take six weeks to grow and about six weeks to harvest. The seed is planted in early May. Harvesting begins in late June and usually lasts until early August. This crop fits well into many farm operations. The most of the labor is needed in harvesting. At this time other farm work is usually slack.

YOU'D BETTER WATCH OUT -- Parking Crack Down

A "get tough" policy against parking violations in Mt. Vernon was initiated by the Mt. Vernon City Council at a noon meeting Tuesday.

In an unanimous vote, the council instructed Police Chief Walter Shepherd to issue double tickets to motorists who double park on Main Street and leave their cars, and told the chief not to turn parking meters when he checked them.

The council voted to "strictly enforce" the double parking ordinance, which carries a \$5 fine, after councilmen deplored present parking conditions in downtown.

One councilman reported last Saturday a "near riot" occurred when the street was closed for nearly 20 minutes because of a double parked car.

Not only did the city get the blame for the situation at downtown Mt. Vernon to the cut on US 25 south of Mt. Vernon.

During the Christmas and New Year holidays, and last week end, traffic was at its heaviest. At times cars and trucks were backed from downtown Mt. Vernon to the cut on US 25 south of Mt. Vernon.

In the other action, the council instructed Chief Shepherd not to turn parking meters that show red, but to simply write the motorist a parking ticket.

One councilman said motorists have a "little racket" going by putting a penny in the meter and not turning it.

In the past, policemen have turned the meters thereby giving the motorist 12 minutes of parking. By the time the meter is re-checked again the motorist has usually returned and moved the car or inserted another penny.

City Clerk Gets Salary Increase

It can be said that Tuesday was a good day for Mt. Vernon City Clerk Mary Ann Bullock.

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted unanimous Tuesday at a noon meeting to pay her salary from \$100 a month to \$140 a month.

The increase was approved by the council on the grounds that the clerk will have considerable more work to do during the construction of the sewer system and because of second work connected with the new privilege tax ordinance.

The council agreed to charge \$100 of her salary to the Water Works Fund, and \$40 to the general fund.
