## Feed-Grain Sign-Up Near

The sign-up for the 1968 feed grain program soon will be underway in ASCS county offices. George M. Nelson, state executive director, has announced.

The sign-up period starts Feb. 4 and will continue through March 28.

The Director explained that the program for 1968 is basically the same as in 1964. It is voluntary, and combines corn, grain sorghum, and wheat in a single feed grain program. "Participating farmers will qualify for diverted-acre and price-support payments, and they will be eligible for price-support loans.

Producers who take part in the program may divert for payment as small an acreage as 20 percent of the farm's feed grain base or as large as 100 percent. The base is the base—25 acres, if this is larger.

Two rates of diversion payment are offered. The lower rate applies to the first 20 percent of the feed grain acreage actually diverted. The higher rate applies to diverted acreage in excess of the minimum. If both the intended diversion and the acreage actually diverted are equal to at least 40 percent of the base, the higher rate applies to the entire acreage diverted.

New provisions in the 1965 program include (1) an opportunity to substitute feed grains for wheat or wheat for feed grains by growers who take part in both programs, and (2) a special provision for designated varieties of malting barley. Under certain circumstances, producers may apply to overplant malting barley acreage by 10 percent. A producer electing this option will be eligible for the full county barley support rate, based on a national average of 96 cents per bushel, but he will not be eligible for barley diversion or price-support payment.

Applications to take part in the 1968 feed grain program may be filed in the ASCS County Office from Mondays through Fridays.

## Rockcastle Provides Mental Retard Class

Rockcastle County is one of the 65 Kentucky school districts providing special classes for mentally retarded children.

Dr. Stella A. Edwards, director of special education in the State Department of Education, listed this total in the first report of her task force on school and classroom programs to the Kentucky Commission on Mental Retardation.

Some of the districts have classes for both the educable and for those able only to be trained.

Kentucky has some 17,946 retarded children in its school census of 763,171 youngsters between the ages of six and 21. The U. S. Office of Education.

During the last school year, 3,692 children between the ages of six and 21 were taught in special school classes. The 65 districts teaching retarded children are 32 per cent of the total of 204 school districts in Kentucky.

The Kentucky Department of Mental Health is working a master file to determine the number, case histories, and other data on all mentally retarded persons in the state. Dan S. Tuttle, acting mental health commissioner reported.

In addition, occupational training workshops for the mentally retarded and other disabled workers have been set up on a demonstration and research basis in five counties. Ben T. Coffman, director of the State Education Department's Bureau of Rehabilitation Services, said these are in Jefferson, Harlan, Floyd, Rockcastle, and Bourbon counties.

## 60-Cents A Bushel

## Tourism Meeting To Discuss Funds

A regional meeting to plan distribution and management of State matching funds to boost tourism was staged in Monticello, Jan. 28.

The special travel promotion funds approved by the 1964 Legislature, will be available for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Under a formula devised by the Public Information Department, each multi-county region will receive \$1,000 plus \$415 per county, plus \$0.15 per resident in the region, based on 1960 census figures.

This region 7 includes Casey, Adair, Cumberland, Russell, Clinton, Wayne, Pulaski, Rockcastle, McCreary, and Whitley counties, can receive \$7,498.07 in State funds to be matched 50-50 by funds raised by the cities, counties, individuals or organizations within the region.

The State funds can be used to cover half the cost of radio, television, newspaper, magazine, and billboard advertising; preparation and printing of press kits and promotional folders and postcards for these items; production and printing of movies, filmstrips, and such presentations; construction and display costs of exhibits at major sport and travel shows in the United States and other projects submitted by the region and approved by the Public Information Department and the Governor.

The regional managing committee, to be organized by the January 28 meeting, must submit its proposed advertising and promotion plan to the Public Information Department by April 1.

Miss Miller added. The recommended basic managing committee will include a chairman, vice-chairman, in charge of advertising, vice-chairman in charge of fund-raising, secretary, and treasurer, plus at least one committee member representing each county in the region.

With its application for funds, the committee must submit a list of local funds raised or pledged, the commissioner said.

## REQUIRE HOG SHOTS BEFORE SELLING

New regulations in Kentucky's hog cholera program started Feb. 1.

Basically, the regulations require that all hogs must be vaccinated at least 21 days prior to shipment, or they must be vaccinated at an approved stockyard.

This applies to hogs to be sold for interstate shipment. Animals being sold for immediate slaughter or hogs being bought by a farmer for home slaughter need not be vaccinated.

By starting such a program now, hog farmers will have a two-month jump on the new Federal regulations which go into effect April 1. If farmers begin a program of vaccination now, they will not run into difficulty when they ship hogs after April 1.

Eradication of hog cholera in Kentucky is an important project, and will mean many dollars to farmers when our State is declared hog cholera free.
