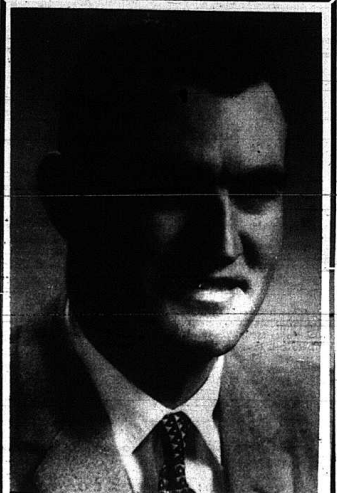

I don't want to see our young men have to leave their homes and go into other states to get a job. I want them to have jobs right here at home. I know that if our people have jobs here they will take roots here and build homes here, and raise their family and make good neighbors and good citizens of our county. But we senior citizens of this day and time MUST begin to make some effort toward paving the way for our people NOW.

I don't want to see our children limited on their education just because grandpa was. We must fight for more schools and better conditions on which to educate our young. We must fight for higher pay for our school teachers so that our teachers will stay here in our county and teach and not go to another state because our pay is not equal to that in other states.

I don't believe that our generation should ride a mule to town just because grandpa did. I don't believe that our sons should have to stand on

my streets whittling and chewing tobacco all day because they do not have anything else to do, just because grandpa did. I don't believe that we should sit here for another generation with a do nothing attitude just watching the tourists drive by, just because grandpa did.

I don't believe in just sitting around here growing older and doing nothing toward helping to get some industry in our county, just because grandpa did.

I believe that all pensions for our old people should be more, because I don't think they receive enough money to give them all the necessities of life that they should have. I believe that the Commodities in food and clothing for our needy should be more, for I don't think the allotments for our people and children are enough for them to receive the proper nourishment that their bodies require to keep them normal and healthy. I believe that our people with no means of support should have medical and hospital care paid for by the state and federal government. I think that it is a shame and disgrace that some of our old and needy people can't get the proper medical care, and sometimes die, just because they don't have any money to pay a big hospital bill. I also believe that our handicapped people, both adults and children, should receive free medical care paid for by the state. I believe we should have more free school books and school supplies in all grades for our children, together with more free lunches and milk. I sincerely believe that with the very high rate of Tax that we all have to pay, that more of this high tax dollar should get back to us in the forms that I have stated here.

I am not telling you that I can get every one of these things done. But I am telling you that these are the things that I stand for, and these are the things that I will fight for. But if we can get part of these things done it will be a start, and a start toward real lasting progress in our county is something that I can't ever remember. There are those who will say Baker sure is talking High and Mighty for our county, and they will be right, for I am thinking High and Mighty because I for one am tired of thinking of it as "Hopeless and Broke." I will work for the best interests of all of us, but I will not be led around by my nose by some small pressure group or any uncertain clicks.
