Opportunity Council Formed Here To Guide Federal Aid Programs

Three Fires Are Reported

A local group, incorporating and calling itself the Rockcastle County Economic Opportunity Council, Inc., agreed at a first meeting last week to take advantage of federal financial programs... about \$500,000 or more annually to the county.

The council will sponsor programs of human development rather than physical or material development. Listed as incorporators are: County Judge Charles C. Carter, County Agent H. Lee Burman, W. E. Hunt, Atty. James Lambert, Dr. James Rold, county health officer; Roy Brown, of Louisville, and Robert Winn of Stanford, representative of the Farmers Home Administration.

Officers for the new council were elected from the incorporators. They are: Roy Brown, president; Clyde Linville, vice president; and Atty. James Lambert, secretary-treasurer. Also on the Executive Committee of the council were the three officers and Mrs. Neurell Miracle.

Mr. Linville and Mrs. Miracle were also chosen as the new officers of the Rockcastle County on the Cumberland Valley Economic Opportunity Council, which is a state-wide organization.

The first grant expected to be applied for by the new council is for a \$12,000 money to hire a developer and administrator for the county. Mr. Durbin also plans to ask for about \$12,000 for his salary, and other necessary items.

Mr. Durbin, a professor from Indiana University was hired as developer. Already in the works is a Sheltered Workshop program that was applied for through the new council.

The program will now become part of the council's work. The workshop is expected to cost about \$121,000 annually. The Sheltered Workshop, directed by Tom Payne, will undertake to train physically and mentally handicapped people for employment in useful jobs.

The workshop will be strictly supervised, the word sheltered, in this case means supervised. The workshop classes are expected to be held in the former Country Store at the Valley Incorporated of the Sheltered Workshop are John Lair, N. M. Smock, and Carl Brown.

Mr. Durbin hopes to have the workshop in operation in July. Three programs connected directly with Rockcastle County Schools are expected to be applied for by the council.

One program is a workshop for youths 15 to 21 who need extra money to continue their education. (Continued on Page 2)

The tuberculin skin testing program of the Rockcastle County Health Department is expected to be completed this week. Miss Ellen Morris, Nurse, Office of Tuberculosis Control, State Department of Health, has been working with Mrs. Mullins and Mrs. Norma Lyons, local public health nurse, in an attempt to skin test every first grade student in Rockcastle County.

All students in one room schools and the students in the first four grades in the two-room schools were requested to come to the test. The TB skin testing of first grade children is another method of trying to locate unknown cases of tuberculosis in adults.

The first grade child who has a positive TB skin test has probably been infected by someone with whom the child has been in close contact, but this does not mean the child has tuberculosis.

The parents of a child who has a positive TB skin test will be urged to visit their family doctor for further study before a final diagnosis can be made.

300 Fill Courtroom Here To Talk On Cucumbers

It can never be said Rockcastle County farmers are not interested in cucumbers. About 300 persons filled the Rockcastle Circuit Courtroom to hear a processing company buyer and a horticulture specialist discuss how county farmers can add to their income by growing cucumbers to sell for pickling processing.

The meeting brought out the largest crowd for a meeting of any kind since a hearing on a Rockcastle River dam was held about three years ago, and attested to the interest in agricultural efforts in the county.

Speaking at the meeting, and obvious elated over the turnout, were Woodrow Wilson, a representative of the Hirsch Pickle Company, of Louisville, and manufacturer of Paramount Pickles, and Hubert Davis, horticulture specialist at the University of Kentucky, Lexington. Helping them on was Les Durham, Rockcastle County agent.

When the talks were over, 103 persons had signed contracts to grow cucumbers, representing 26 and a half acres. Based on an estimated \$10,000 an acre, growing cucumber could add approximately \$1,000 to the county's economy.

County Agent Durham has blank contracts for those who wish to sign and who were unable to attend the meeting. A second meeting to discuss the details of actually growing cucumbers for processing will be held in the courtroom at 1:30 p. m. March 1.

Mr. Wilson told those present if they did a "good job" of growing cucumbers, they would be eligible for a bonus of about the same amount of money as a half-acre of tobacco.

Some of the points made by Mr. Davis included: (1) The best soil is a clay-loam or a sandy-loam, high in organic matter, and well drained. (2) Over-fertilization is dangerous. Fertilizer will cause the cucumbers to grow more than necessary, and too much vine means the cucumbers will be hard-to-find.

He noted that a buying station would be set up at Mt. Vernon and cucumbers would be bought each day. The farmer would receive his money at the time of the weighing and selling. "We'd like for you to consider raising cucumbers year after year. You won't make a great deal of money the first year, but you will as time goes by. If you don't make money, it will be your own fault," Mr. Wilson declared.

Mr. Davis told the group growing cucumbers for processing is much different than growing cucumbers for home consumption. He emphasized that farmers should learn the necessary steps that will bring a profitable crop.

work of growing cucumbers is found in the harvesting, and 35 per cent in the preparation and growing.

(4) Almost all picking is done throughout July. Best time to start a crop is about May 1.

(5) The field that is in tobacco last year is ideal for cucumbers this year.

(6) Break sod land as early as possible; leave it to lay in the row, and then disc it as soon as the weeds begin to grow.

(7) Most planting and harvesting is done by hand.

Mr. Davis said at the March 1 meeting, he would show a film on growing and harvesting cucumbers, and urged all prospective growers to attend.

program will provide jobs with the hope of keeping drop-outs at a minimum.

The second program is a remedial program which will help young people who are behind academically in school. It includes tutoring and summer classes.

The third program will be a kindergarten.

The three programs could cost in excess of \$200,000 annually.

The three school programs, as well as other programs will be developed by the administrator that will be hired. He will also act as a go-between the county, the district council, and Washington.

The federal government lists at least 25 different kinds of programs that can be applied for, and leaves the door open for consideration of any kind of human

development program suggested by the local councils. Considerable federal money remains in this year's budget that is earmarked for many Eastern Kentucky communities to use. The money will be lost June 30 if the communities do not take it through planned programs.

Mrs. Miracle is now working on by-laws and other necessary incorporation papers. The council has called her work "a splendid job."

grains, and his diversion payment will be based on the per-acre rate which applies to the grain diverted. Minimum diversion under the program is 20 percent of the total feed grain base; maximum diversion is 50 percent of the base—25 acres if this is more.

While participation in the 1965 feed grain program is voluntary, Mr. Hockenmuth pointed out, the price-support payments and loans, as well as the diversion payments, will be available only to growers who sign up and carry out the program's provisions.

Signup for the program started Feb. 8 and will continue through March 26.
